Northern Oregon beaches—Partly cloudy with a few showers tonight; mostly cloudy Thursday with a little sunshine at times. Bar winds southeasterly to southerly, 15-30 m.p.h. with gusts to 35 m.p.h., diminishing gradually through tonight and Thursday. Temperature range 46-54.

Board Ponders Admitting Lad

A district court sentence, handed down Monday, that called for attendance at school by a 17-year-old boy while he served a three-month sentence in the county jail, could not be implemented immediately, it was learned Tuesday, because of previous action on the part of the board of education of Union High School District 2.

E. D. Hickman, president of the board, said Tuesday that the current police investigation into a juvenile crime ring had been discussed at a special meeting of the board on Saturday. At that time, school authorities were directed by the board not to readmit to classes any student who was clearly implicated in any theft, act of vandalism or other misdemeanor that occurred on school property, without prior authorization of the board.

Thomas E. James, the KU student whom District Judge D. E. Van Vactor sentenced on Monday to three months in the county jail, had pleaded guilty to a charge of petty larceny involving the stripping of a car, when he appeared in court. However, police reported that he had admitted to involvement in a number of other illicit actions.
