Sheepmen Name Boss

LAKEVIEW—Jeremiah O'Leary of Paisley was named president of the Fremont Sheepmen's Association at the annual meeting held February 13 in the Memorial Hall of the courthouse. He succeeds Con Flynn.

Neil Taylor was elected to the vice presidency and Orin Ridd was again named secretary-treasurer.

The formation of range wool pool for the marketing of wool in that category was under discussion and was left open for further signatures, but if the majority of the operators are not interested at this time, there will be no further promotion of the matter this season.

The orderly marketing of lambs and presentation of the lamb situation on the West Coast was given in the talk by E. L. Slater of the Valley Livestock organization. Bruce Arnold of Pacific Woolgrowers outlined the wool picture.

The public domain picture was presented by Clayton L. Weaver, supervisor of the Fremont National Forest and R. C. Burgess of the Bureau of Land Management.

Weaver told that, under the multiple use program of the forest, the future indicates that more and more recreation areas will be taken out for the use of the influx of people from the larger cities. That these greater numbers will have more in the final say eventually of the use of the forests is indicated.

A brief talk on better management and use of the federal range was made by Burgess.

Grazing Fees Are Reported

LAKEVIEW—The grazing fees for the 1959 season will be 62 cents per cow month and 10 1/2 cents per sheep month.

Grazing fees on national forest land vary from year to year according to variations in feed and lamb prices. The preceding year, a base grazing fee of four and one-half cents per sheep month and 18 cents per cow month for the Fremont Forest was established in 1951. This base grazing fee is adjusted annually in proportion to fluctuations in lamb and beef prices received by the producers.

Fees for 1959 represent a one-half cent increase for sheep and a 13 cent increase for cattle over fees for 1958. The highest fee paid under this system was in 1952 when cattle fees were 79 cents and sheep fees were 13 1/2 cents. The lowest fee was paid in 1934 for cattle at 9.4 cents and in 1933 for sheep at two cents.

Grazing fees set by the Bureau of Land Management in Washington, D.C. for 1959 will be 22 cents for each cow month, 44 cents for each horse month and 44 cents for each sheep month. These are set annually on a sliding formula using as a factor the reports of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics on the market value of range stock for the last six months of 1958.

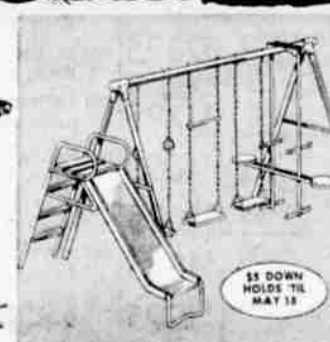
