

# Tariff Quota Probe Sought

Congressman Al Ullman (D-Ore) recently called upon President Eisenhower to authorize an immediate investigation of the present tariff quota on Alaska clover seed imports. Unless the president requests the Tariff Commission to make such an investigation, the existing quota will expire on June 30, 1959.

Producers in Oregon's 2nd Congressional District as well as seed growers in other producing areas throughout the nation will be faced with ravenous Canadian competition if the present quota is permitted to expire," Ullman said in his letter.

"Cheap Canadian land and low-cost Canadian farm labor have resulted in greatly increased foreign production of Alaska clover seed. The result has been a depressed world market.

"The same conditions that required the original quota still exist today and compel, at the very least, an extension of the existing duty on foreign imports," Ullman stated. He indicated that the tariff could be continued under the same escape-clause tariff procedure which was utilized when the duty was first imposed in 1954.

Representative Ullman pointed out that Oregon's 2nd Congressional District has long excelled in the production of top-grade Alaska clover seed. The region accounts for approximately fifty percent of the total domestic crop.

The Second District congressman urged the President to act promptly in requesting that an investigation be made. "Very little time remains if the producing operations of domestic growers are to be saved. Consequently, your prompt attention to this matter would be appreciated," Ullman concluded in his letter to the President.

## 4-H Delegate To Visit Here

Judy Hanson, an Oregon girl who spent last summer in Finland as an International Farm Youth Exchange delegate, will make three appearances in Klamath Falls this weekend.

The Oregon State graduate will speak Friday noon before the Klamath Falls Rotary Club, at 9:30 Friday night before the Shasta View Grange, and at 2:30 Saturday afternoon at the county fairgrounds.

The county 4-H office said the fairgrounds appearance would be an open meeting to which 4-H members, parents and any other interested person is welcome.

Miss Hanson, a resident of Clatskanie was one of five delegates to Finland representing the International Farm Youth Exchange.

During her visit she lived with farm families in different parts of Finland, helped out in the kitchen with the rest of her hosts' children, and attended social functions with her host "brothers and sisters."

One side trip took her to a town named Virolahti, very near the Russian border. Another visit was to Lapland in the north country where she saw lots of reindeer.

She learned to bake pulla, a Finnish coffee bread, and watched the making of sabtia, a festival drink made from wheat rye and malt.

Oregon farm youth are selected for the International Farm Youth Exchange program by the state 4-H club office. In the past eight years, Oregon has sent 28 exchange youths to 22 foreign countries.

## Court Okays Gravel Road On Klamath Reservation

Roads and gasoline were principal topics for the county court at its Wednesday meeting. The court accepted another gravel road on the Klamath Indian Reservation and accepted bid for the year.

The accepted road, designated as S-80, runs approximately 12 miles in the neighborhood of Knott Prairie east of Sprague River.

It begins at a junction with the Sprague River-Columbia road about a mile north of Sprague River and extends east-northeast over Knott Prairie to a point on Sycon Creek about three miles north of Beatty.

The eastern terminus joins an existing road going northwest, but is about three quarters of a mile short of the Goddow Springs Road north of Beatty.

The court said the Bureau of Indian Affairs planned a bridge across Sycon Creek at that point, and a short extension of the road, for construction next summer.

Eight companies submitted bids for gasoline sales to the county, the court said. Low bids accepted were:

Gasoline, Shell Oil Company, 10.47 cents a gallon; diesel fuel, Signal Oil Company, 12.92 cents a gallon; fuel oil, Peyton and Company, 14.25 cents a gallon; furnace oil, Western Oil and Burner, 15.4 cents a gallon; stove oil, Western Oil and Burner, 16.3 cents a gallon.

The price quoted for gasoline does not include federal tax, which the county is not obliged to pay.

The price does include a 6-cent-a-gallon state tax, which the county pays and which is later reimbursed by the state.

The county's gas, therefore, will cost 13.47 cents a gallon.
