Sig Answered By Assessor

PORTLAND (AP)—Multnomah County is free of blame for the problem of a shrinking state bonding capacity, Assessor Joe Hawkins said Thursday.

He referred to a comment earlier this week by state Treasurer Sig Unander that the proposed cut in the county's assessment ratio from 100 to 45 per cent of the true cash value will reduce the state's bonding ability.

Hawkins said the state had been able to increase its bond issuance for one year because Wiley Smith, who was assessor before Hawkins, had increased assessments to 100 per cent.

Hawkins said there is an easy way for Unander to maintain the bonding capacity—ask the Legislature to base bonding capacity on true cash value of real estate instead of on assessed valuations.

Youth Cited For Murder

OREGON CITY (AP)—Duane Anders, a 17-year-old Estacado High School youth, Thursday was indicted on charges of first degree murder and second degree arson.

The indictments, returned after three days of deliberation by the Clackamas County grand jury, accused the youth of fatally shooting his father, Hector Anders, 56, and then setting the barn afire to destroy evidence.

Young Anders, who is president of his high school student body, testified at a preliminary hearing that the Feb. 11 shooting was an accident. He said he was shooting rats in the family barn and his father was wounded fatally when the gun went off accidentally. He said he became frightened when he saw what he had done and set the barn on fire.

He is being held in jail without bail.

Firm Announces Sale Completion

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Transamerica Corp. announced Thursday completion of the sale of its interest in the Columbia River Packers Assn.

F. N. Beltrano Jr., president of the corporation and chairman of its board, said the sale of 100,000 shares of stock represented the final transfer of ownership in the seafood processing concern.

Castle & Cooke, Inc., Honolulu, acquired 80 per cent of this stock, he said, and Robert Dant, San Francisco, the other 20 per cent.
