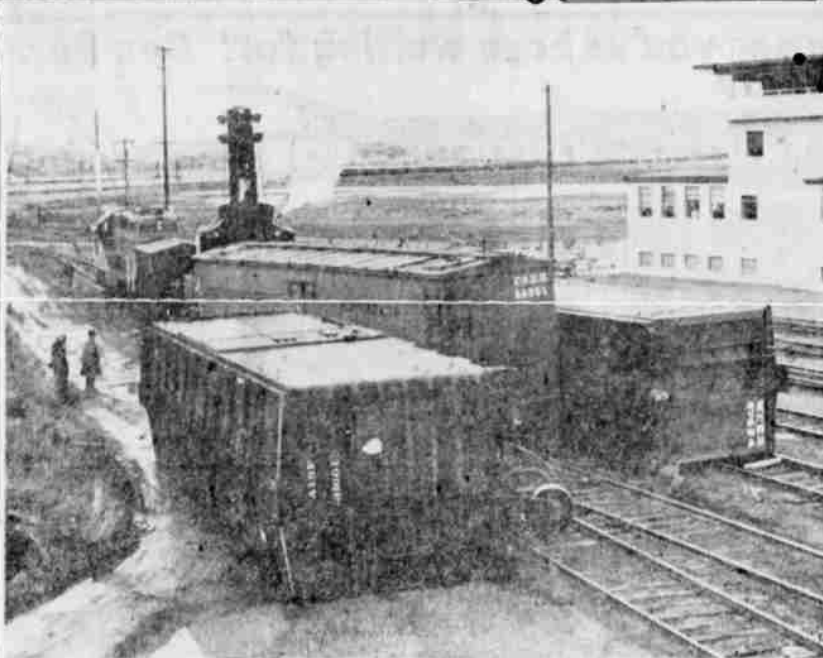
INFORMATION CENTER

Group To Eye Building Slate

SALEM (AP)—A special ways and means sub-committee was named Thursday to study the state's building program at colleges and institutions.

Sen. Alfred Corbett (D-Portland), co-chairman of the Joint House and Senate Committee, said the committee will explore combining the use of tax money and bonds.

That would combine the program of former Gov. Robert Holmes and Gov. Mark Hatfield. Holmes recommended the bulk of the state's building needs for the next two years be provided by issuing bonds. He asked for 2½ million dollars from the general fund.

Hatfield said the building program should be maintained by general fund appropriations and asked for more than 14 million dollars.

The committee will pay close attention to the new Downmash State Hospital near Portland, due to open next year.

Corbett said the hospital's second phase might be provided in the program for the next biennium by issuing bonds.

Named to the subcommittee were Rep. Keith Skelton (D-Eugene), Sen. Ward Cook (D-Portland), Sen. Francis Ziegler (R-Corvallis), Sen. Jean Lewis (D-Portland), Rep. George Annala (D-Hood River), Sen. Edwin Duran (R-Medford) and Rep. Leon Davis (R-Hillsboro).

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Grain Men Back Measure

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Al Ullman (D-Ore.) joined Wednesday with five other congressmen in introducing bills based on recommendations of the National Assn. of Wheat Growers.

The measures, according to Rep. Donald McGinley (D-Neb.), would replace the present acreage control system with a marketing control and bushel allotment formula.

The measures would give the Secretary of Agriculture authority to determine the amount of wheat that could be used in this country and the amount that could be exported.

A bushel quota would be given each farmer. He would market his domestic quota at 100 per cent of parity and the balance, which would be for export, would bring him not less than 65 per cent of parity.

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Others sponsoring the legislation in addition to Ullman and Wash., J. Floyd Breeding (D-McGinley were Reps. Carl Al-Kan and Phil Weaver (R-Neb).

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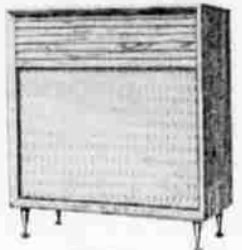
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
