UW Huskies, Stanford Chances Fade

United Press International Time is running out on the Washington Huskies and Stanford Indians in their efforts to catch long-leading California in the Pacific Coast Conference basketball race. All three teams are on the road this weekend. The Bears (8-2) invade the dens of Washington State tonight and Idaho Saturday. They are favored to edge these second division teams, but then face a tough one when they battle Oregon State (6-5) in a Monday night contest. The Beavers have been heartened by the announcement that all-Coast candidate Lee Harman will be ready for action. He missed the Beavers' last outing because of a bad ankle, but he scrimmaged Wednesday and looked fit. Cal knocked Oregon State out of the NCAA tournament last year after the teams had tied for the PCC crown during regular season play. The Beavers would like revenge. Washington (8-2) meets Idaho and Washington State. But the chief headache for the Huskies would appear to be an upcoming Associated Press Sports Writer Belmont Abbey's 10-game winning streak went by the boards at the hands of Presbyterian 36-52. Wheaton chalked up its 35th straight in the College Conference of Illinois by drubbing Elmhurst 81-34. In other games Massachusetts scored its second upset of the week, a 68-65 victory over Boston College, and Montana wall-poled New Mexico 84-39 in a Skyline Conference fray. Jim Peay, a 6-2 junior from Rye, N.Y., sparked Denver to its first win over Utah. He scored 20 points on 12 field goals and six free throws and snared 15 rebounds. Tom Sanders was high with 23 points and Cal Ramsey collected 13 to become the highest scorer in NYU history with 1,103 points. St. Johns, led by Al Seiden, with 31 points, and Tony Jackson, with 27, piled up a 70-56 lead before Niagara made a futile rally. Indiana State beat Butler on a free throw by Warren Ross that broke an 87-87 tie. The regulation game ended 74-74, and the first overtime 80-80. It was good foul shooting, too, that gave Massachusetts its victory over Boston College. Curt Teeter flipped in three charity tosses in the final Minute. Jack Sullivan's free throw with three seconds left to play gave the Quantic Marines a 51-50 overtime victory over Providence. (AP) — Young Wesley Ellis Jr. showed off for his home town Thursday — he shot a 5-under-par 66 for the first round lead in the \$20,000 Texas Open. But he said it may have been the worst thing he could have done. Golfers along the tour say the toughest tournament to win is in your home town. Ken Venturi of San Francisco and Stan Leonard of Vancouver, Canada, have been noted exponents of the theory. So Ellis, who grew up in San Antonio, played golf at the University of Texas, and now follows the weary tour out of Aldecres, N.J., quaked as he set out at the head of the pack in the second round of the ancient Texas Open today. Ellis was magnificent as he strode through a drizzle of rain and biting cold to a 2-stroke lead over the 150-man field in the opening round. He was getting the job done largely with a putter he borrowed from a fellow professional Gil Cavanaugh, last summer. It was this putter that carried Ellis to victory in the Canadian Open last year—his first on the tour. Stars like Gene Littler, Marty Furgol and Jimmy Demaret found Brackenridge Park's 6,400-yard layout difficult to handle and so did most of the others trying for the \$2,000 first money. 'Amateur' Net Star Income Figures Set By OSCAR FRALEY NEW YORK (UPI)—The long-debated question as to how much money an "amateur" tennis player may make annually in under the table payoffs was settled by professional champion Pancho Gonzales today at an authoritative figure of "from \$3,000 to \$10,000 yearly." Tournament sponsors are bidding for your services," Gonzales says. "You become receptive to the highest bid offered. Eventually you merely extend your hand and wait for it to be filled." A real investigation, Gonzales asserts, would "prevent participation in all major tournaments by any of the first 20 ranking amateurs." WRITES AUTOBIOGRAPHY The one-time amateur champion, who now boxes the professional welders with an iron hand, makes these disclosures in his new autobiography, "Man With A Racket," and also observes: 1. The fault is with an antiquated "amateur code" which provides too little expense money. 2. An open tennis tournament is unfeasible. 3. He personally will be a championship factor for at least three more years. Tennis for the ranking amateurs is as much a chore as it is for the professionals, Gonzales writes, because the amateur actually is "in business." "Missing is the exuberance," he says. "A tennis player (amateur) can suffer the same daily boredom as a CPA poring over columns of figures. Physically the game exacts its toll. He's dehydrated. His
