The next meeting will be in charge of Blanche Petroff on March 7 at the Willard Hotel. New members will be initiated and the emblem ceremony presented.

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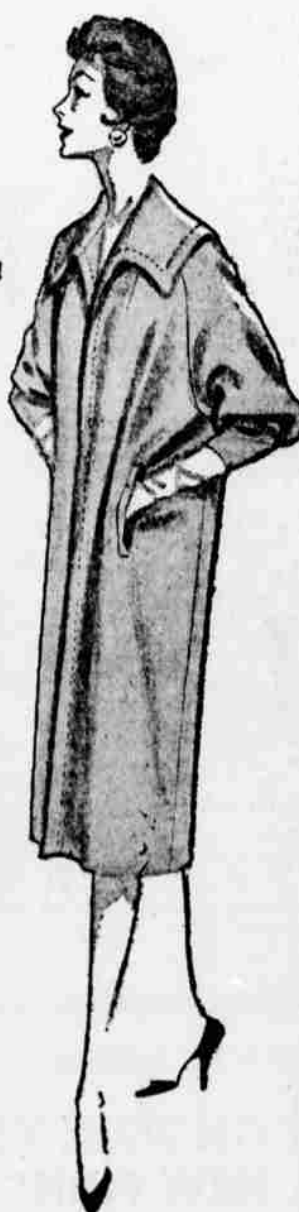
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
