**GOP Slated For Pasting**

**CHICAGO (AP)**—Mayor Richard J. Daley's powerful Democratic organization flexes its muscles in a dull primary Tuesday that appears certain to leave Republicans aching.

Daley, seeking a second four-year term in a city that hasn't had a GOP mayor since 1931, wants to roll up 775,000 Democratic votes to demonstrate his party's potency.

The Republican standard-bearer, former Congressman Timothy Sheehan figures some 130,000 GOP voters will turn out for their primary—the worst showing in years. Opposing each man is Lar (America First) Daly, a stool and chair jobber who for 29 years has made a habit of running for and losing races for every important political office, including president. He isn't given a chance.

Voters also will elect aldermen from the city's 50 wards and, there too, Republicans see little to be optimistic about. Democrats have controlled the City Council since 1931. In 1955 they won 37 seats.

Although the elections are tabbed nonpartisan and no party labels are on the ballot, most candidates are backed by either political party.

Election officials estimate about half of the city's 1,835,224 registered voters in 3,826 precincts will vote.

Daley, 57, and in politics for 30 years, has made only two talks—both at precinct workers' luncheons.
