Colavito's Power Major Expectation

NEW YORK (UPI)—Baseball's spring training swings into full blast this week and one of the major expectations is that it marks the start of a season in which young Rocky Colavito will make himself felt as one of the game's top power hitters.

The 25-year-old Cleveland outfielder was right up there last season. He batted only .303 but finished one blast behind Mickey Vernon in home runs and second to Jackie Jensen in runs batted in.

Which isn't bad for a lad who, they say could be the fastest pitcher in baseball.

Rocky has a phenomenal arm, one with which he fires the ball prodigious distances and, in baseball parlance, capable of flinging the ball through a wooden plank.

FANS FIVE
J. W. Porter, the former Cleveland catcher who during the off-

season was traded to Washington, swears that the powerful Colavito throws harder than either Herb Score or Ryne Duren. Those two, incidentally, are regarded as the fastest pitchers in baseball.

Joe Gordon, the Indian manager, last season pitched Colavito in an exhibition game against Cincinnati. Before the game started, Gordon offered to wager that Rocky would fan four batters in a two-inning stretch. He did better than that. He struck out five of the six hitters—no one caring or daring to take a fustling against him.

ARM BECOMES LEGEND
Down through the years of the minor league wanderings, including such way stations as Dayton, Cedar Rapids, Spartanburg, Reading, Indianapolis and San Diego, Colavito's arm became a legend. Every place he went, one of the first things demanded was that he throw a ball over the centerfield fence. The distances this 190-pounder heaved the ball when he wound up his 6 foot, 3 inch frame were amazing.

Yet, while he is regarded as a young man who could be 20-game winner—and whose pancake flat feet make him less than a Jesse Owens in the outfield—Rocky wants no part of pitching.

"I," he says flatly, "want to play every day. If you pitch, you don't. So it's the outfield for me."

Rangers End Loss Streak

The New York Rangers have strengthened their hold on fourth place in the National Hockey League after ending their seven-game winless streak and a curious third period jinx.

Treating a crowd of 13,925 in Madison Square Garden to a fine performance Sunday night, the Ranger tripped league-leading Montreal, 3-1. In other games, Boston beat Detroit 4-1 and Chicago defeated Toronto 5-1.

The results left New York with a five point bulge over Detroit in the competition for the final Stanley Cup playoff position.

Andy Hebenton's third period goal was the Rangers' first third-period marker in nine games. The Ranger victory snapped a six-game Canadian win streak.

The Black Hawks scored four times in the final period to trounce the Leafs. Ted Lindsay turned in the three-goal hat trick. The Bruins' victory left them three points behind second place Chicago.

In Saturday's games, Montreal blanked Boston 6-0, Toronto beat the Rangers 1-1 and Detroit beat Chicago 5-2.

Portland Beavers Hire Bill Sayles

PORTLAND (AP)—The new assistant general manager of the Pacific Coast League Portland Beavers is Bill Sayles, a former University of Oregon and Portland prep player.

Sayles was named top aide to General Manager Tommy Heath Saturday. He replaces Bill Brenner, who resigned to become general manager for the Sacramento Solons.

Sayles played for Washington High School in Portland and three seasons at the University of Oregon. During his professional baseball career he played for Little Rock, Louisville, the New York Giants and Brooklyn. After an Army tour during World War II, Sayles spent two years as a minor league manager.

Whitey Ford, Thomas Sign 59 Contracts

Ed (Whitey) Ford, who must follow a strict diet, and Frank Thomas, who hopes to give added weight to Cincinnati's batting attack, have signed their 1939 contracts.

Ford, the New York Yankee ace left-hander, came to terms for an estimated \$35,000 Sunday. This was about \$3,000 more than he received last season when he won 14 games and lost seven.

New York General Manager George Weiss issued a statement disclaiming that any "good conduct" clauses were forced on the star pitcher. Ford reportedly had balked at club attempts to make the raise dependent upon his off-field habits.

Ford missed half a dozen starts last year due to pain in his left shoulder. He also was out for half of the 1937 campaign, appearing in only 129 innings. After the 1937 World Series, doctors said that his shoulder ache was due to "high uric acid."

A high purine diet was prescribed and he was told to stay on it. It demands that Ford refrain from eating protein meat or drinking alcoholic beverages, as both produce uric acid.

Thomas, who moved to the Reds from Pittsburgh in a six-player transaction last month, signed for about \$25,000 — an increase of \$7,000. The slugger hit 35 homers and drove in 109 runs last season.

Another first stringer to come to terms was catcher Sammy White of the Boston Red Sox. White, who hit .259 in 1938, joined the Sox at their new training base in Scottsdale, Ariz.

Bob Boyd, Webb Set For TV Go

NEW YORK (UPI)—Two middleweight fights in the United States and a heavyweight bout at London stand out on this week's boxing schedule.

Middleweight contenders Spider Webb and Bobby Boyd, both of Chicago, meet in a return 10-rounder Wednesday night at the Chicago Stadium. Their bout will be televised nationally by ABC.

On Friday night, middleweight contender Gene Armstrong engages veteran Italo Scorticini of Italy in a 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden. It will be televised and broadcast nationally by NBC.

Meanwhile, on Tuesday, at the Wembley Indoor Arena in London Willie Pastrano of Miami Beach—fifth ranked heavyweight contender—will tackle Joe Erskine of Wales, former British Empire champion. Erskine is trying to climb back into the top-10 rankings.

WEBB FAVORED
For Wednesday's fight at Chicago, Webb is favored at 12-5 to beat Boyd, whom he knocked out in the sixth round of their previous bout, March 17, 1934—when both were comparative novices. Webb is ranked third among contenders; Boyd, sixth.

Webb is favored because of his combined boxer-puncher ability. The Spider lost only four of his 35 bouts, 13 of which were won by knockouts. Boyd lost 10 of his 35 starts and had three draws. He scored 22 kayoes.

For Friday's Garden fight, Armstrong of Elizabeth, N.J., ranked ninth among middleweight contenders—is favored at 3-1 over Scorticini, who is returning to action in the United States after two years in Europe. Unrated Scorticini has a 41-22-7 record that includes 15 kayoes. Armstrong, a light hitter but smart boxer, registered but one knockout while winning all 16 of his starts.
