Coaches, Players Censored

GREENSBORO, N.C. (UPI) — All Wake Forest and North Carolina basketball players were on strict probation today while both schools and their athletes, coaches and students were on notice to halt the "deteriorating" relationship between the institutions.

Commissioner Jim Weaver of the Atlantic Coast Conference announced the action following his investigation of the "near-riot" Feb. 12 when the schools clashed in a basketball game at Winston-Salem. North Carolina won the game, 75-66.

Weaver released his report and ruling Tuesday night after more than 10 days of talking to players on both teams, game officials and school authorities and watching several different movies of the game, which he did not witness as a spectator.

The commissioner singled out a number of players for special censure and criticized Coaches Frank McGuire of North Carolina and Horace McKinney of Wake Forest.

"One is compelled to conclude that lack of discipline on both benches has been the major factor in the deteriorating relationships between the teams under consideration," Weaver said referring to other incidents.

"Each coach has in the past been guilty of acts which could incite the players and spectators or intimidate officials," he added. "If coaches cannot practice self-control, they cannot expect to have disciplined players and, of necessity, discipline must be imposed from some other source."

The commissioner said he came to the conclusion as the result of his probe that the fight was started by Le Shaffer of Carolina and Charlie Forte of Wake Forest. However, he noted extenuating circumstances.

A-1 Preps Earn Tournery Spots

Two more berths in the state A-1 high school basketball tournament at Eugene next month were filled by Tuesday night games.

North Salem, No. 2 in the Associated Press poll, downed Corvallis 36-27 and won the District 8 championship and a position in the state playoffs. Corvallis was ranked 10th in the AP poll.

Jefferson of Portland, No. 3 in the poll, rolled over Wilson 59-40 and won a District 1 tournament berth and at least a tie for the Portland League championship.

McMinnville clinched at least a tie for the second Tualatin-Yamhill Valley League (District 3) berth by beating Dallas 69-68. St. Helens already has qualified for the district's No. 1 berth.

St. M Nabs Tournery Position

St. Mary's (Calif.) and Louisville are packaged for delivery and Miami of Ohio is about to tie the knot today as the field fills for the NCAA basketball championships.

St. Mary's — the West Coast's successor to once — mighty San Francisco — nailed an NCAA berth Tuesday night by clinching the West Coast A.C. title with a 58-57 overtime victory over runner-up College of the Pacific. Louisville, the last improving Southern independent, was selected as an at-large entry.

Unless a playoff is required, Miami of Ohio is set as the representative of the Mid-American Conference after rolling its record to 9-1 in league play with an 84-71 whipping of Ohio U.

Bowling Green, the only team with a chance to tie the Miami for the Mid-American title, lost its two regular season games to the Redskins. In any event, Miami can remove even this doubt by winning one of its two remaining conference tests — the next against Kent State on Saturday.

Marquette, an earlier at-large choice by the NCAA, boosted its record to 19-3 with a 95-76 victory over Notre Dame; Navy improved its selection chances in a 70-58 triumph over Delaware; and Rice and Texas A&M won Southwest Conference tests in other Tuesday features.

Louisville's selection, despite a 12-10 record, was based on a late season spurge that has produced five victories in the last six games and triumphs over the likes of Bradley, Marquette, and Dayton, the latter twice.

Marquette, which will join Louisville in Mid-East regional preliminaries at Lexington, Ky. March 9 or 10, got 39 points from 6-8 Mike Moran in its rout of Notre Dame.

Dartmouth, the Ivy League leader, stepped out of the circuit and had an easy time with Holy Cross as 8-7 Rudy LaRusso scored 29 points and grabbed 22 rebounds. St. Joseph's, which will clinch the Middle-Atlantic conference berth in the NCAA with its next triumph, tied a school record for successive victories with nine in the romp over Drexel Tech.

Nine free throws by Dickie Odum in the closing minutes enabled Wake Forest to turn back South Carolina 60-53 in an Atlantic Coast Conference game. Roger Pettis' two free throws in the final minute enabled Oklahoma to pull into a tie for second in the Big Eight with a 54-52 squeaker over Oklahoma State.

Moore, Warren Credit To Club

EUGENE (AP) — Oregon's Frosh are unbeaten so far this basketball season, thanks in large measure to Charlie Warren and Glenn Moore.

Warren, a standout from South Eugene High, has scored 177 points this season. The rangy Moore, from Klamath Falls, is the team's second leading scorer with 162 points.

The Frosh now have a 12-0 record and have two games slated here this week: Friday against Porter Truckers and Saturday with Multnomah Athletic Club.

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KU Pelicans May Clinch Conference Championship In Weekend Action

Although three games remain to be played on the Klamath Union Southern Oregon Conference schedule, the second one, the match with the Medford Black Tornado on Pelican Court Saturday night shapes up as the time for the Pelicans to clinch another District 6 A-1 championship and the attending right to call themselves the No. 1 school from the district when they enter the State A-1 tournament at Eugene in March.

The Pelicans, 11-2 in league play, travel to Grants Pass on Friday for their last bout with the Cavemen, 8-5, then return home for their last pairing with the Medfordites Saturday.

The balance of the league schedule, at the close of play Saturday night, finds the top teams all tangling with either Crater or Ashland in the windups. This situation, barring some of the biggest upsets in the history of the conference, should have no bearing on the standings of the top three.

Coach Dean White and his KU quintet wrapped up the week's preparations this afternoon with a short hard drill then settled down for a day of rest prior to leaving home early Friday for the trek to Grants Pass.

During the week coach White has made sure that postponed trips to the dentist, etc., on the parts of his squad have been taken care of in a determined effort to avoid any last minute emergencies that might arise to spoil the team's efficiency.

"Pre-tournament preparation — I guess you might call it — just in case we get to go," grinned the modest Pel mentor. "This is our big chance, this weekend could tell the tale."

"Are we up for it?" Well — physically we are in pretty good shape and I think the boys can kind of taste that tournament. Tell you more after the game Saturday night," added White.

"I don't know if it will make any difference or not, but Medford has a night off Friday — and of course that means that coach Roelandt will have a front row seat at the Grants Pass game. We get two toughies in a row. Neither Grants Pass nor Medford are quite convinced that we can beat them. We'll have to prove it," he went on.

The Pelicans dropped their opening league game 62-51 to coach Gordon Prehm's Cavemen squad then bounced back to hand the Grants Pass quint a pair of whippings, 62-41 and 60-30.

Medford tumbled the first time 70-61 to the Whitebirds on the Tornado court then promptly evened the count by smothering the Pelicans 44-48 at KU. The third time around, again on the Medford court, the Pelicans gained their only lead of the night when 24 seconds remained in an overtime period and stayed in front to win 49-47, in one of the most exciting games ever witnessed in the years-long rivalry between the two schools.

Reserved seat tickets to the fourth and final Pelican-Tornado clash are on sale now at the chamber of commerce. The game is the last of the season to be played on Pelican Court.

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NY Opens Missing Mantle

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Mickey Mantle misses the opening of spring training for the first time today as he sweats out a contract dispute with the world's champion New York Yankees.

The power man of the Yankees, who wants more money — reportedly he is seeking \$75,000 a season — will sign countless autographs for the kids who flock to his new bowling alley. But he isn't about to put his signature on a Yankee contract until he gets \$3,000 more than New York reportedly is offering him.

Or is he?

Mantle didn't say he would retreat from his stand but he did say "I've got to play baseball." He added that "I don't know if I'll be playing for the Yankees or not. They could trade me."

But it sounded a little hollow for Mantle, who has played with the mighty Yankees for eight years, to talk about being traded.

The Yankees start training in St. Petersburg, Fla., today but Mickey said he planned no calls to officials of the club and would "just sit and wait and see what happens." He admitted he had talked with them several days ago.

At St. Petersburg, George Weiss, general manager of the Yankees, said he had called Mantle last Thursday. "We understand each other and there is no point in continually going over the same ground," Weiss added.

He indicated there would be no difficulty in getting into shape if he does miss spring training. "I weighed 195 pounds at the end of last season and I weigh 195 now," he said.

Mantle has been playing golf while not presiding over his swank bowling alley where the kids come by the hundreds to get his autograph.

There are two reasons why he must play baseball, Mickey observed. One, of course, is the money involved. "The other is because baseball is part of my life."

Coach Wally Palmberg and his Oregon Tech Owls head for their most sought after prize, a victory over the Southern Oregon Red Raiders tonight on the Mile High Court, sans the services of two of their usual starting five, Jess McCutcheon and Troy Koontz, both 6-4, were dropped from the squad in a disciplinary action by coach Palmberg.

The Owl starting five for the clash with the Raiders, the last of the four annual pairings with Ted Schopf's squad will be chosen from among Jim Ramseyer, Jack Horton, Norm Oliva, Dennis McKee, Paul Layher, Charlie Wilson and Del Francis.

Owl plans over the last two weeks have centered on playing the "spoiler" role in knocking the Raiders out of their championship position. Special offensive and defensive maneuvers had been designed by Palmberg with this thought in mind, but he plainly admits that with the loss of Koontz and young McCutcheon a great amount of the punch is gone.

Said Palmberg, "Don't sell us short yet, though — the rest of the boys are all fired up and ready to go. We may just surprise SOC yet."

In earlier season clashes with the Southern Oregon quint, the Techmen have been dealt the short end of the count three times running. In two instances the Owls stayed well within reach, but seemed to come apart in the late stages.

For the Red Raiders, 12-3, for conference action, a half game ahead of Portland State, the meeting with the Owls brings down the curtain on their regular season. A loss to the OTI five could be disastrous to their hope of winning the league crown.

Probable starters include Little-All-America prospect, Dave O'Dell, Gordie Carrigan, Jim McAbee, Punk Biddington and Don Vannice, with Phil Sward, Glen Peterson and Dick Smith backing them up.

A preliminary game pitting the OTI faculty with the OTI Diesel Class will get under way at 6:30. The feature game starts at 8 o'clock.

Webb, Boyd Meet Tonight

CHICAGO (AP) — After five years, Spider Webb and his Chicago rival, Bobby Boyd, will get together in the same ring tonight.

Both are ranking middleweight contenders, Webb holding the No. 3 spot and Boyd No. 7.

The 10-rounder in Chicago Stadium will be televised-ABC, 10 p.m. EST — and scored under the five point must system.

The bout will be the first promotion of National Boxing Enterprises, Inc., formerly the Chicago branch of the court-dissolved International Boxing Club.

Webb, 27, is a 9-7 favorite. In 1954, he knocked out Boyd in the sixth round of a preliminary bout.

Boyd, 27, once was the No. 1 contender with an eight-bout winning streak against some of the best middleweights in the business. But then he was taken apart by Joey Giardello, who broke Boyd's jaw while pummeling him in a fifth round knockout in 1956.

In a comeback six months later, Boyd won six in a row before Rory Calhoun chilled him in two rounds in November 1957. Boyd has won his last three starts. His record is 52 victories, 23 by knockouts, in 65 bouts.
