Trials Set For Three

Three Merrill men arrested when police were attracted by their speeding car go on trial Friday on petty theft charges.

The defendants are Herman M. Beitz, 36; Sherman Larch, 44, and Milton K. Gwiner, 42.

They are accused of stealing quantities of copper, including 75 feet of heavy wire and an anchor rod, from the California Oregon Power Company.

At an appearance before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor Tuesday, each man pleaded not guilty and was returned to jail in lieu of \$500 to await Friday's trial without jury.

In addition, Beitz was fined \$7.50 or one-and-a-half days in jail for violation of basic rule, the trouble that attracted state police to his car on the Merrill Highway Friday night.

Hearings Slated By Grand Jury

The Klamath County Grand Jury was expected to hear five or six criminal cases today, bringing the number presented to it to approximately 15.

The district attorney's office began presentments with seven cases Wednesday.

Cases before the jury, some secret, are headed by the second-degree murder charge against Warren Huff, 30, of Chilcoquin, accused in the rifle slaying of his wife Agatha, 30, early on February 7.

Members of the grand jury, held over from their October session, are Nora Cashman of Merrill, foreman; Edward Downing and James Humphrey of Merrill, and Alie Abbott, Stuart Balsiger, Nell W. Kinney and Swan Nelson, all of Klamath Falls.
