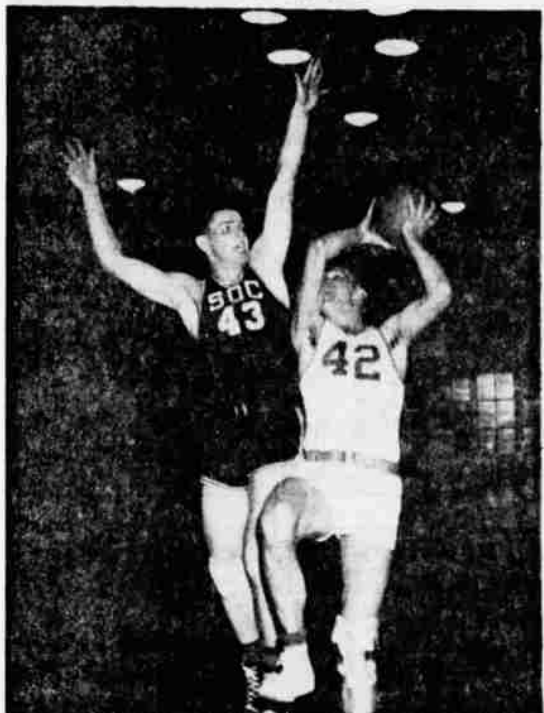

"This one was worth 10 wins," bellowed coach Wally Palmberg amid the tumult in the Owl dressing room following the Oregon Tech 81-71 overtime victory over the powerful Southern Oregon Red Raiders on the OTI court Wednesday night. "Weren't these kids great?"

Overcoming a halftime 32-23 deficit, the OTI cagers, the team that wanted "to win this one worse than anything else," staged an awe-inspiring uphill battle to tie the score twice in the last minute of regular play and knot the count 63-61 finally, to send the contest into overtime.

Saved from defeat by a timely set shot from the corner by reserve Del Francis in the closing seconds of regular play the Owls were sparked by a 10-point overtime performance by freshman Dennis McKee to knock the Southern Oregon five off their perch atop the Oregon Collegiate Conference ladder.

For the Raiders the conference season closed on a dismal note, the OTI game being the last on their schedule.

The Owls leave for Monmouth early Friday morning for a double-header with the Oregon College Wolves to ring down the curtain on their own league schedule.

Gaining new life from Francis' effort, the Techmen roared into their only lead since early in the game in the overtime, paced by ex-North Salem prep all-star McKee, the high scorer of the night with 24 points, despite the fact that he had scored only three points in the first half of the ball game, and

out-busted and outscored the SOC quintet 18-8.

The Owls had entered the contest the decided underdog off three previous losses this season to the Raiders, plus the fact that they worked minus the services of a pair of regulars dismissed from the squad for disciplinary reasons.

The No. 2 scorer for the night was the Raider's Gordie Carrigan who counted 21 points primarily off sweet two-handed set shots from way out. Carrigan was the only Paul Layher and Raider Dave D'Olive, the ex-KU great, who notched 20 each.

Norm Oliva, the ex-SOC star, and Jack Horton, both Owls, were the only players to be benched with five personal fouls. Oliva left with eight points with four minutes remaining in regular play and Horton checked out with 11 in the last 35 seconds.

The Owls used a slow deliberate attack to move out front 6-2 in the first couple of minutes but the

Raiders caught up shortly and from here on during the first half the squads swapped buckets until Carrigan started to tell from the outside. The frame ended 32-23 for the Raiders.

In the second half the Techmen started to work in earnest and brought the count to 39-35 after eight minutes of play as McKee, Layher and Horton got moving.

From here until the final fatal minute of play in regular time, the Owls stayed on the short end from one to seven points before a full court press and ball stealing tactics finally paid off.

In the overtime McKee went wild, counting a jumper from the key and a beautiful driving layup to boost the Owls in front 67-63 within the first minute. At this point things became a little confused as the timekeeper missed a one-one situation that was earned by Francis—noting his error, however, he called Francis back to the charity line for a second success and the score read 71-63 for the Owls, D'Olive having counted a jumper in the interim.

From here on, Francis, who had replaced Oliva, and Jim Ramseyer who had replaced Horton, collaborated with McKee and Layher to count the important final 11 points. Additional buckets by Jim McAbee, Carrigan and Biddington failed to bring the Raiders back to within shouting distance of the super-charged Owls as time ran out.

Outshot .538 to .433 from the field the Techmen made up the difference from the foul line hitting 21 of 25 tries.

Baylor Collects 55 Points

A 55-point scoring binge has punctuated once and for all Elgin Baylor's answer to those who thought he might be just a flash-in-the-pan in the National Basketball Assn.

The Minneapolis Lakers' rookie scored the third highest point total in NBA history Wednesday night as the Lakers defeated Cincinnati 115-96. Ironically, the victory also helped the Detroit Pistons clinch a playoff berth in the Western division, though the Pistons dropped a 104-100 decision to division champion St. Louis.

Philadelphia knocked over the New York Knicks, 134-123 in the other NBA action.

Baylor, formerly of Seattle University scored 22 field goals and 11 fouls to rank behind Joe Fulks and George Mikan as the NBA's greatest single game scorers.

Fulks set the mark of 63 while playing with the Philadelphia Warriors in 1949. Mikan, a former Laker, scored 61 in 1952.

The Lakers will play the Pistons in a best of three game series, the winner meeting St. Louis for the division title and a spot in the championship final against the Eastern titlist.

Bob Pettit's 24 points sparked the Hawks. Phil Jordan's 20 points led the Pistons.

Paul Arizin scored 21 points in their desperate attempt to gain an Eastern playoff berth. Willie Naulls led New York with 26 points and Arizin finished with 32.

Wildcats, Fresh Dump Bulldogs

The Klamath Union sophomore Wildcats got even for an earlier defeat at the hands of the Butte Valley Bulldogs, dropping them 52-23 on Pelican Court Wednesday night. In the preliminary game the KU fresh turned back the Bulldog JV 51-23.

Wally Palmberg's 14 KU points was high for the night while Ray Goldfarb led the Bulldog scorers with eight.

Virginia Tumbles Tarheels

Next week's Atlantic Coast Conference basketball tournament, tabbed a shoo-in for Frank McGuire's North Carolina Tar Heels a week ago—looks now as if it'll be a rain-rattled dourbrook.

A reassessment is in order for the scrambling that picks the ACC's representative to the NCAA Tournament after Virginia's startling 69-68 victory over North Carolina Wednesday night — the Tar Heels' second blunder in a row.

Before they dropped a 69-51 shocker to Maryland last Saturday, North Carolina was No. 1 in the nation, unbeaten—and apparently unchallengeable—in the ACC, North Carolina State, the only other club near Carolina's heels, had lost twice to the Tar Heels, and was no NCAA threat because of probation.
