The Bly Women's Club was organized 26 years ago for the purpose of becoming better acquainted with the women in the community and to assist in community projects. The original name was "Chatter and Stitch," which was changed to the present name a few years ago.

The community activities consisted of the March of Dimes fund raising, sponsoring Girl Scouts in Bly, overseeing the bloodmobile, food sales for Red Cross relief, sending a needy child to Girl Scout camp and during the war years, the members participated in various activities, such as sewing for refugees and sponsoring benefits to raise money to buy bonds.

The club meets twice a month, the first and second Wednesdays, in members' homes, and during the summer months for picnics in the park. There were eight members at the first meeting. Membership is now limited to 24, due to the accommodations of the homes. The teachers of Bly are honorary members.

The big event of the year is the annual Thanksgiving dinner. Jean Cline and her mother, Veda Dixon, are charter members of the club. Mrs. Campbell presented Mrs. Dixon and Mrs. Cline with a bouquet. Elizabeth Campbell, a member of 24 years and Leta Tikkanen with 22 years of membership, were acknowledged by everyone.

The past decade has seen them established as one of the outstanding—if not the outstanding—two piano team of today.

Arthur Gold, the elder by one year, was born in Toronto, Canada, of Russian parents. At 3 years of age he was already accompanying his sister, a gifted soprano, playing completely by ear. When he was 6, he started intensive piano study and later worked under Josef and Rosina Lhevinne.

Robert Fisdale was born in Chicago, also of Russian descent, and comes of a musical family which once boasted a flutist in the Czar's private orchestra. A child prodigy he started his piano studies at the age of 6. Among his famous teachers was Ernest Hutcheson.

The two met at the Juilliard Music School in New York and soon decided to give up their respective solo careers and to dedicate themselves to duo-pianism. Since their Town Hall debut in New York they have appeared in recital and as soloists with orchestras across the American continent. They have been popular on the European musical scene since their debut there with the Orchestra Nationale in Paris in 1949.
