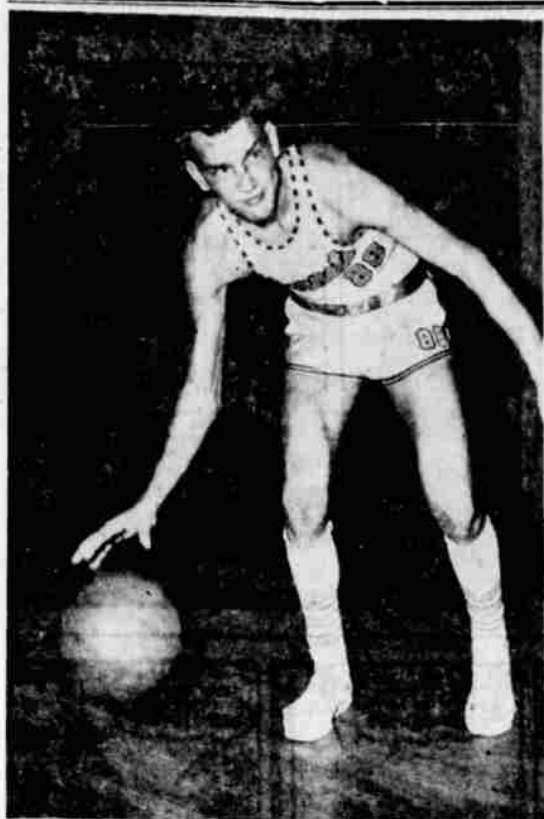

Henley Topples IV In Sub-District Go

Henley clinched the final District 6 A-2 Tournament berth Friday night at Pelican Court as they fought off a scrappy Illinois Valley quintet, 56-48. The Hornets now look to the district tourney which will be held in the Southern Oregon College gym on March 6 and 7.

A pair of 6-3 post men, Leroy Larson and Burrell Guber, spearheaded the Henley attack as they dumped in 22 and 14 counters respectively while sweeping the boards clean, both offensively and defensively. Cougar forward Doug Lewis paced the losers with 12 points.

The Cougars threw a scare into the Hornets in the final minute as Mike Hanby and Dan Slanaker canned successive jump shots to give IV a quick 40 lead, however, Larson and Floyd Kendall tied the count with field goals. Guber gave Henley their first lead seconds later with a free throw but Lewis came right back with a fielder for IV. Larson pushed Henley back into the lead with a jumper from the baseline but Dale Ollis gave the Cougars a slim 10-9 first period lead with a pair of free tosses.

Larson slammed in three straight jumpers from the side and Ray Jackson sank a deuce of free throws to lead the Hornets as they began to pull away in the second quarter. Slanaker countered with two long set shots but Phil Swisher and Larson canned long jumpers to give the Hornets a 26-20 halftime bulge.

Guber tossed in 11 tallies in the third canto to pace coach Ted Am-

merman's crew to a 47-35 lead despite a tight, full-court press employed by the Cougars. Henley outscored IV in the third stanza, 21-15.

Illinois Valley continuing their tight press, tossed in 10 counters in the final period to Henley's nine as the Cougars hit all but two from the foul line, the result of seven personal fouls being called against the home team.

The bespectacled Guber, with 11, Swisher with nine and Larson with seven, paced the Hornets as they outscored the visitors, 37-26. Henley was red-hot from the foul line, notching a near-perfect 12 of 14. Guber garnered most of his point total on rebound shots or from underneath while Larson, who scored 14 in the first half, picked up most of his on driving layups.

The tall Henley eighth grade squad dumped the Chiloquin eighth graders, 42-30, in the preliminary game.

Cavemen Lead All The Way

KU Pels Top Grants Pass In Another Squeaker

GRANTS PASS—Klamath Union High coach Dean White's "ulcer-builders" did it again, the hard way, when they squeaked past the Grants Pass Cavemen 55-54, here Friday night. The Pelicans clinched themselves a berth in the coming Oregon State A-1 basketball tournament in March by virtue of their narrow victory.

The first Pelican lead of the night came with only three minutes left in the game when a long jumper by guard Dean Dunson set them in front, 48-47. Even this didn't last, as Caveman reserve Dave Mannan hooked the count 48-all with a gift toss. A layup by

Bob Petersen and five free throws gave the Pels enough of an edge to withstand a mighty effort by Cavemen stars Rex Benner and Dick Hayes to end the nerve-racking hassle.

Facing a basket that seemed to have an eternal lid on it and a Grants Pass defense that threatened serious trouble, the Pelicans kept themselves in the ball game with 10 free throws in the first quarter of play. The only field goal in the first 12 minutes of the game was a rebound two-pointer by Bob Petersen.

The Pels were down 15-12 at the quarter mark, then sagged to a 13 point deficit 25-12 in the second frame and finally came to life to

bring the count to 29-23 at the intermission.

In the third stanza the Pels indicated they were ready to move as they crept within one point, 40-39 at the three-quarter post.

However, an agonizing three minutes, for KU fans, passed in the fourth canto before the Pels could find the range once more and in the meantime the Cavemen had moved out front seven points 46-39. At this point Whitebirds realized that this was it and poured on the coal. The determined Cavemen suffered a rash of foul calls in trying to stifle the Klamath threat and two of their number were benched with five fouls, John

Olson and Rick Sabin. Although weakened by the loss, the Grants Passers wouldn't quit; with five seconds left Benner stole the ball and dropped it through to bring the count to the final mark, and even as the gun sounded he was doing his best to repeat the performance.

Petersen was the big gun of the test, nailing 23 points, 11 of which came at the foul line, as the Cavemen were highly successful in keeping him contained beneath the bucket.

Caveman Benner, who pushed Petersen with 21 points, had one of his finest nights. Seemingly impossible tries were successful despite all the Pels could do and he

counted 18 points on field goals and 3-3 at the foul line.

Caveman John Olson and Pelican Dean Dunson shared the number three scoring position with 14 points each.

The Pels' cold streak in the first half brought their game scoring percentage down to a .283 mark and the Cavemen's suffering in the third quarter dropped them to a .333 from the overall distance.

"Grants Pass really wanted to win that one, and they darn near did," exclaimed breathless Dean White. "We were 'up' all right, so far. We've played better ball than that, but Grants Pass did a great job. We won."

Quint Hits 139 Points Yet Loses

BOSTON (AP)—Boston 173, Minneapolis 139 and records galore.

In the most prolific scoring exhibition in the 13-year history of the NBA, Boston's Eastern division champions rewrote the record book Friday at Boston Garden. Even the losers got their share of marks.

Boston bettered the record for most points in a game, in one half (90) and in one quarter (32) without the services of its great center, Bill Russell.

St. Louis, holder of the previous single game point mark of 146, whipped Syracuse in the only other league test, 128-113, as Bob Pettit hit for 39 points at home.

The Celtics' Bob Cousy had a record 28 assists. Richie Guerin of New York had set the old standard of 21 earlier this season. Cousy also collected 31 points to follow Tommy Heinsohn's 43. Bill Sharman showed 29 points for 29 minutes.

Lost in the maze of records were 14 points and 11 rebounds by baseball spring training fugitive Gene Conley who swished hook shots with both hands. K. C. Jones' six field goals for six tries and Jim Loscutt's first half defensive job on Lakers' rookie Elgin Baylor (two field goals).

The teams together averaged 64 points a minute. Their combined 312 points bettered the previous high of 282 by St. Louis and Syracuse. They also combined for most points in a half (163) and in one quarter (36).

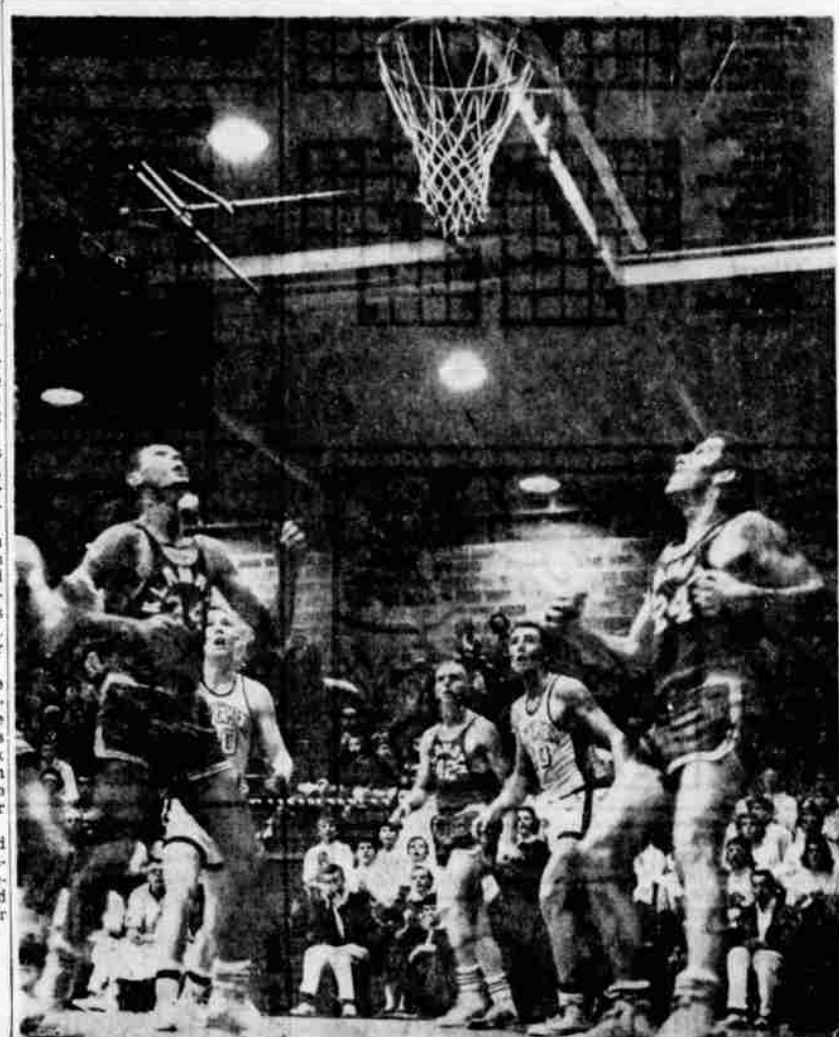
Jerry West Moving Up

West Virginia's Jerry West tallied 38 points Friday night and moved up a notch in the individual scoring standings of the major college basketball players.

West's performance as the Mountaineers edged William & Mary and qualified for the finals of the Southern Conference tournament, boosted his average to 25.6 points a game and seventh place, according to figures of the NCAA Service Bureau.

Bob Boozer of Kansas State was above his average in scoring 28 points against Kansas but dropped to eighth with a 25.3 average. They were the only members of the top 10 in action.

Tulelake's B team grabbed the opening contest of a best of three game playoff for the Northern California B championship by dumping Weed, 60-51 Friday night as coach LaVerne Allen's squad caught fire in the final period to pull away to clinch the victory.

In the only other Nor-Cal action, Tulelake's A squad made an unsuccessful trip to Bieber where they were trounced by Big Valley High School, 51-37.

The second contest of the playoff between Tulelake and Weed was scheduled for Saturday night on Tulelake's court while the location of the final tilt, if needed, has not yet been decided.

The Tulelake B victory was paced by Ron Long who racked up 28 points to lead his squad while Jim Lemos sparked the futile Weed attack with 23 counters. Honker Joe Rodgers followed Long's effort with 15 tallies while Lester Harris and Dennis Sharbaro trailed Lemos with 11 and 10 respectively for Weed.

UCLA Bruins Stop Oregon State 71-59

CORVALLIS (AP)—The visiting UCLA Bruins matched buckets with the Oregon State Beavers for a few minutes and then pulled away to win a Pacific Coast conference test, 71-59, here Friday night.

The Staters looked good in the opening minutes of Friday night's game here as the score was tied four times. But UCLA forged ahead and led 38-19 at the intermission.

Backboard play accounted for most of the margin in the first half. UCLA had 29 rebounds and Oregon State only 19.

The Californians were ahead 54-23 with 10 minutes zone in the second half. Then Oregon State rallied and scored nine straight points. But the UCLA margin was too great.

After UCLA had piled up its big lead, the Californians' bench was cleared. But the starters went back in the final minutes when Oregon State appeared to be threatening.

Portland State's Jim Anderson and Lee Harman fouled out of the game in the second half. Harman was replaced with eight minutes remaining — by Ron Critchfield. In those final eight minutes, Critchfield scored 16

points—high for his team. UCLA's Walt Torrence was high for the game with 19.

UCLA sank 33 of 71 shots from the field for an average of .325. Oregon sank 25 of 79 for .292.

California defeated Southern California Friday night in Berkeley, 70-64. It was the 12th win against two losses for coach Pete Newell's club. Cal had a comfortable lead most of the way but the Trojans fought back into contention with four minutes left. Darrell Imhoff, Cal's giant center, snapped out of a scoring slump and ringed 18 points, high for the game.

Washington beat Idaho at Seattle, 74-51 as Earl Irvine took scoring honors with 20 points for the Huskies. Washington held a 34-27 lead at the half.

Stanford shaded Washington State after the final gun sounded, 59-38. Dick Haga was fouled in the final second and walked to the free throw line and dropped in the winning point. Duane Ranniger, who fouled Haga, was the star of the Washington State attack. His clutch shooting in the second half kept the Cougars in the ball game. Stanford now is 8-6 on the season, Washington State 3-12. It was Stanford's 13th straight victory at home.
