# Australia May Be Place To Escape U.S. Controls

WASHINGTON (AP)—Is Australia the answer for American farmers who want to escape government crop controls?

Stanley Yankus, a Michigan farmer who talks of migrating Down Under for just that purpose, shows signs of wandering.

Rep. Wint Smith (R-Kan.) suggested Friday that if Yankus moves to Australia he would have to sell all the wheat he grows to the government under Australian farm laws.

Yankus, who operates a 100-acre farm at Dowagiac, Mich., told the subcommittee earlier that his thriving egg business has been ruined by what he termed harassment by "bureaucrats in the Department of Agriculture."

The 40-year-old farmer, father of three children, said he was fined \$4,562 from 1954 through 1958 for overplanting wheat allotments set by his county agricultural stabilization committee.

He said he has never accepted any price support payments and contended he shouldn't have to obey restrictions because he feeds all the grain he grows to his chickens.

# County Marks Observance Of National 4-H Club Week

About two and a quarter million boys and girls in rural, urban and suburban areas throughout the United States have joined in observing National 4-H Club Week, February 28 to March 7.

Klamath County's 700 4-H club members will take part in the week's activities, says Lillian Hoffman and Francis Skinner, county extension agents.

They will share with other 4-H-ers in recognizing "4-H alumni"—the 20 million men and women throughout the country who have participated in the 4-H program in the past 30 years since the movement started, and who are now benefiting from this training and experience.

Nationally, 4-H Club Week will be highlighted in Washington, D.C., when six members chosen as delegates will present the annual 4-H Club "Report to The Nation."

The six club members, while in the nation's capital, expect to review the report with President Eisenhower at the White House. They also plan to visit Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson.

Along with the present and former 4-H-ers, honors will go to the 382,000 volunteer leaders who guide 4-H work in local communities throughout the 49 states, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

Main purposes of 4-H Club Week this year are to provide an opportunity to acquaint more young people with opportunities through joining or forming 4-H clubs, to assist new members in starting projects in farming, home-making, community service, and other activities; to inform the public about 4-H aims and methods, and to pay tribute to outstanding "graduates" of the program.

Said the President: "The four-fold emphasis of this fine organization—Head, Heart, Health and Hands—reflects a broad effort toward general fitness and well-rounded development. I am sure that the training and experience which are received in 4-H activity help develop maturity of judgment, good citizenship, and those qualities of leadership that are needed and valued in every walk of life."

Said the governor: "The year 1958 was the best year in the history of more than 40 years of 4-H club work in Oregon, with more than 31,000 members enrolled. In view of the outstanding record made this year, in recognizing National 4-H Club Week, I have great hopes for our current Centennial year of 1959."

From 4-H clubs across the nation come the well-informed and prepared adults of tomorrow.
