### Home Firm Lauds Agent

High praise has been given to John H. Houston, Klamath Falls representative for The Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, by Harold P. Drake, C.L.U., Equitable agency manager at Portland.

Drake announces that Houston finished the year 1958 among the top 30 Equitable agents in the nation and was the first member in Oregon to qualify fully for Equitable's Million Dollar Club, the tenth time he has achieved that record. He was the first in Oregon to qualify for the Equitable Centennial celebration to be held in New York City on July 16 of this year and had "made his points" by May of last year, according to Drake.

### Official Gives Tax Reminder

There is more to life than just paying state and federal income taxes.

County Assessor Hap Caldwell issued a reminder today that county personal property taxes are due immediately. The deadline is March 3, tomorrow.

Caldwell said statements were mailed in January, and the deadline then is the deadline now—Tuesday, March 3.

At the other end of the main hall in the courthouse, the office of County Clerk Charley Delap will be open tonight to sell dog licenses.

The deadline for those was March 1, but because March 1 was a Sunday, the office will sell licenses today. Delap held the office open for the benefit of many dog owners who have not yet bought licenses.

After the deadlines, penalties must be imposed both for delinquent personal property taxes and delinquent dog licenses.

### Naturalist Takes Office

Bruce Black is the new park naturalist at Crater Lake National Park, according to announcement from Tom Williams, park superintendent.

Black fills the vacancy created by the resignation last September of Warren Fairbanks, who left the park service to take a position as instructor at Millican College in Tennessee.

The new staff member joined the National Park Service in 1948. He served as a park ranger at Sequoia and King's Canyon National Park, a district park ranger at Sitka and Glacier Bay National Monument and then as park naturalist at the Joshua Tree National Monument at Twenty-Nine Palms, California. He was transferred from the latter post to Crater Lake.

Mr. and Mrs. Black have four children, thus increasing the school enrollment at the park and making a welcome addition to Slim Mabery's ski classes.

## Annual Ball Set Saturday

**TULELAKE**—The annual Firemen's Ball, to benefit the Tulelake Volunteer Fire Department, will be held at the Tulelake-Butte Valley Fairgrounds on Saturday evening, March 7, according to "Doc" Charles W. Doshier, fire chief.

Music will be furnished for the third successive year by Hank Johnson's Rhythmnaires of Cedarville.

Dancing will be from 10 p.m. to 2 a.m. Admission is \$1 for each person.

The Tulelake Volunteer Fire Department was established in 1937. It has 30 members in Tulelake and five at the substation at Newell. Veteran member of the department is Lyle Sherer, who has served the department practically ever since its establishment.

The original fire truck, a 500-gallon pumper, which has the first fire equipment purchased by the city of Tulelake, is still in use. A 1937 Chevrolet, it still has the original tires on it and the speedometer registered approximately 3,000 miles. The first district extends 29 miles north and south and 10 miles east and west.

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## Mother In Public Appeal For Return Of Infant Son

**ONTARIO, Calif. (UPI)**—Take good care of my baby. Watch his cold, and please, please bring him back to me.

A 35-year-old widowed mother of six children thus publicly appealed today to a volunteer baby sitter who kidnaped 9-week-old Eric Flores last Friday night.

Mrs. Ruth Flores, widowed last June when her husband was killed in a welding explosion, sat at her home tearfully cradling in her arm the twin brother of Eric.

"I just want her to bring back my baby or take him to a doctor," the slight, blonde woman said.

"He has such a cold," Mrs. Flores said Eric had been fragile since birth and besides needing medical attention also requires a special formula.

FBI agents and police working together in the case—the second kidnaping in southern California over the weekend—said the kidnaper apparently was a woman known only as "Ann Williams" who befriended Mrs. Flores in order to carry off a child.

"Isn't it too bad a single woman who wants a baby and can support one can't adopt one?" Mrs. Flores recalled the woman having remarked to her before the kidnaping.

The distraught mother who has gone sleepless since discovering Eric missing from the crib he shared with his brother, Aaron, late Friday, said Miss Williams told her she was active in church work and wanted to help her out.

Mrs. Flores said many persons had volunteered to help her since the death of her husband, Joseph.
