

10 Arraigned Before Judge After Jury Indictments

Ten persons were arraigned before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg Friday shortly after their indictment by the county grand jury.

The arraignment of two other persons was delayed temporarily. The total of 12 represented the nine open indictments returned by the grand jury. Two other indictments were secret.

Attorneys were appointed for four defendants, and dates for entry of pleas were set for the arraigned.

Sandra Phelps of Klamath Falls, Oregon's candidate in the 1959 Junior Miss America contest, left Sunday for Mobile, Alabama, where the finals are being held from March 4 to March 7.

The state contests and the national event are all Junior Chamber of Commerce sponsored.

There will be approximately 40 candidates from all parts of the nation competing for the coveted title of America's Junior Miss. The four-day competition held at Fort Whiting Auditorium in Mobile offers \$10,000 in scholarships, as well as the distinction for the winner of being the person who, in the opinion of the judges, best exemplified the nation's high school senior girl.

Judges include Lee Ann Mariweather, former Miss America of New York City; Peggy Ann Ellis, a singer of New York City and California; Dr. B. Joseph Martin, president of Wesleyan College, Macon, Georgia; Russell Patterson, a New York artist; Addison E. Alber, vice president of the U.S. Jaycees of Tempe, Arizona.

This will be the second year the America's Junior Miss Pageant has been staged. Last year's winner was Phyllis Ann Whitenack of Bluefield, West Virginia, who is now attending Kings' College in Charlotte, North Carolina on the scholarship she won.
