

# Water Resources Board Postpones Dam Action

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Water Resources Board decided Friday to take no formal action at this time on a proposal for barring additional dams in the Snake River.

The Oregonzaak Walton League—a sportsman and conservation organization—earlier also changed its position on the embargo. The league said a ban on dam construction in the Snake would delay the High Mountain Sheep project. This would play into the hands of backers of a high Nez Perce dam, the league said. The Mountain Sheep dam would block the Imnaha River—which has few fish. The Nez Perce would block the Salmon River, which produces a large quantity of fish.
