Schools Hold Preliminaries

PORT ROCK—Preliminary contests were held in Port Rock and Silver Lake Elementary Schools recently in preparation for inter-school competition March 3 at the sixth annual meeting of the Port Rock-Silver Lake Soil Conservation District.

The meeting will open at 10 a.m. at the Port Rock Grange Hall. Six upper grade pupils will participate in the morning contest. Lawrence Iverson of Silver Lake, chairman of the district, will preside at the session.

Afternoon speakers scheduled include Kessler Cannon of Bend, program manager for radio station KBNB.

I. D. Nicholas of Portland, state soil conservationist, will speak on "Creative Imagination in Conservation." He has served in many western states and Hawaii with the Soil Conservation Service.

Since 1954 Nicholas has been responsible for farm and ranch planning and all technical phases of the SCS program of assistance to soil conservation districts in Oregon.

"Nick" graduated from Oklahoma Agricultural College with highest honors in the school of agriculture. After working for eight years in a bachelor apartment in college he developed a hobby of cooking specialized dishes. Other interests include growing flowers, working with people and he is known as a good story teller.

A panel discussion on feeding at the local level will be moderated by Oris Radd, Lake County extension agent.

There will be a potluck dinner at noon in the grange hall. The public is cordially invited to attend the day's activities.

Voters Slate Annex Ballot

YREKA—The annexation of two proposed additions to Yreka will be determined by Yreka voters on May 5, in compliance with a resolution passed by the Yreka City Council at a recent meeting.

The two annexations will include the portion known as the southern southwestern addition, and the other is designated as the western and northwestern addition.

The land involved in the southwestern addition is bounded by a line which extends south from the Yreka Western Railroad depot to just beyond the county fairgrounds, near the present state forestry buildings on the old highway; back along the freeway to Port Jones road; into the Port Jones road to the Pine Mountain Lumber Company; then north along the line of the city owned property up to the new reservoir site on Greenhorn; back east to the Greenhorn road to the Lema property; then across to the LaRue Payne barn; then north back to the old city limits.

The western and northwestern addition will embrace the properties which begin at Lane and Fairchild streets intersection; runs west to Lane to just beyond Lane Way; then northwest to Humboldt road; jogging back east to the old city limits.

Petitions had been circulated in each of the areas to call for the election, and with enough signatures to warrant said election, the councilmen passed the resolution. The council set the date of March 19 to hear objections to the proposed annexations.

Voting on the annexations will be on each one. If the voting is favorable, the annexations could be completed by June, 1959.

MARRIAGE BAN REMOVED

BOISE, Idaho (AP)—Idaho removed its ban on interracial marriages Monday.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie signed a bill passed by both houses of the Legislature which repeals the so-called "antimiscegenation" law. The law, on the Idaho books for decades, prohibited marriages between whites and Negroes, Orientals, and other persons of color.

Group Tours New School

McCLOUD—The Siskiyou County Board of Education met at Etna recently on invitation from the Etna Joint Union High School board. After having dinner with the board members and administrators, the group toured the new high school building.

In a business session the county board approved the action of the previous board, favoring the McCLOUD River development by California Oregon Power Company over the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, and accepted the Hockwald Chemical Company bid on janitorial supplies for county schools.

They approved a \$50,000 loan to Tulake Joint Union High School District and agreed to distribute, by formula from forest reserve funds comparable to last year's allocation to each elementary school, except to those not reporting last year's capital outlay expenditures which will receive a token \$100, \$4,000 to each high school district.

They also instructed the county superintendent of schools to inform legislators and education committee members of the board's support for AB948 and AB1006, and granted a special appropriation from forest reserve funds of \$20,000 to the Siskiyou County Junior College board.

The board approved a \$700 capital outlay grant to Tulake Elementary School and granted a request for \$450 for a floor scrubber for Gazelle Elementary School. They withheld action on other requests from the school.

They made personal donations of \$16 to support the Siskiyou County Science Fair. The board agreed to include item for traveling science teacher participation at each of the 10 high schools in Siskiyou County for next year's budget.

They recommended the addition to the county office staff of a machine bookkeeper position.

The next county board meeting will be in Yreka on March 26.

Tremor Rocks SF Bay Area

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A powerful but comparatively harmless earthquake shook up Northern California Monday.

It rattled dishes and windows from Sebastopol, 50 miles to the north, to Hollister, 100 miles to the south.

South of San Francisco, a hillside slid and blocked part of an interstate highway east of Watsonville. Two refrigeration pipes broke in Hollister and plaster fell from the ceilings of older buildings in Gilroy and Santa Cruz.

The University of California seismograph at Berkeley recorded for 12 minutes. Seismologist Don Tocher said the quake centered 60 miles to the south in the coast range south of Mt. Hilton.
