

Farm Talkers Put Emphasis On H-Power

The rising value of farmlands and the vital importance of experiments in the field of hydrogen power were emphasized topics by speakers at the annual session of the Klamath-Lake National Farm Loan Association held at the Willard Hotel on Saturday, February 28.

C. D. Putz, regional manager of the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, pointed out that the value of farmlands has risen about six per cent in the past year. He compared value of investing \$10,000 in bonds or in farmland, and scored his point that farmlands during the past year would have been a better investment.

Harlan Bosworth Jr., vice president of the California Oregon Power Company, spoke on the importance of atoms for peace and war. He was introduced by Frank Jenkins, publisher of the Herald and News.

Bosworth stated that continued experiments in the atomic field were vital for future welfare and development.

In the power field, Bosworth noted that the Pacific Northwest has nine million kilowatts of power either developed or under construction. Total potential, he said, is 36 million kilowatts. "This will take care of the Pacific Northwest for the next 10 years only," he stated.

In discussing the long range need in the field of power, Bosworth turned to the use of hydrogen power. He tabbed this as the answer to future power needs.

"One cubic mile of sea water," he said, "could provide enough hydrogen power to supply the entire world's needs for the next 300 years."

Klamath and Lake counties registered 120 members of the association for the one-day session.

Lawrence Horton, Klamath Falls, was re-elected president. Vanciel Withers, Lakeview, was selected again for vice president, and Bryant Williams, Klamath Falls, re-elected to the post of secretary-treasurer.

The newly created position places Yaden in charge of the facilities which have developed the Nautilus submarine and are working on the prototype for a large naval surface ship.

Yaden has been associated with the site since 1950, except for a two-year period, 1953-55, when he was resident engineer at Groton, Connecticut, during construction and testing of the Nautilus. On returning to Arco in 1955 he was named assistant to the manager, and in 1956, manager of the S1W site activities, or the original atomic submarine project.

A native of Klamath Falls and a graduate of Klamath Union High School, Yaden was graduated from Oregon State College with the degree of bachelor of science in electrical engineering. He joined the Westinghouse Student Program at East Pittsburgh in June, 1940, and has been with Westinghouse since then with the exception of a few years during World War II. He and his wife, Jean, have two children, Douglas and David.

Tax Return Aid Offered

Assistance in preparing Oregon state tax income tax returns will be given by State Tax Commission personnel at the commission's branch office, Room 211, First National Bank Building in Klamath Falls between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. each Monday, which began March 2, throughout March.

The commission also announced that assistance will be available at the Gilchrist Timber Company office in Gilchrist between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. on Thursday and Friday, March 5 and 6.

Taxpayers wishing help in filing their returns are asked to bring earnings slips and other information needed to determine the correct tax, including, if possible, copies of their federal returns for 1957 and 1958.

The tax commission points out that in order to be eligible for a refund a taxpayer must file a return. Refunds are issued on a "first come, first served" basis. It is also emphasized that if a joint return is filed, both spouses must sign it.

Deadline for filing is April 15.

LEADERS ASSOCIATION

LAKEVIEW—Several important matters are coming up for consideration at the annual meeting of the Lake County 4-H Leaders Association, according to Al Haslebach, county club agent. The meeting is scheduled for Thursday, March 5, at 8 p.m. in the Youth Center. Hostess will be Mrs. Margaret Kaley.

Election of officers and some changes in the bylaws will be up for decision.

A replacement of the present point system for the selection of students for 4-H summer school has been recommended by the State 4-H office and the Leaders Association executive committee. The change would use the 4-H permanent record as a basis for selection. This would place more importance on these records and give the youngsters an added incentive for keeping them complete and current. The applicants would submit the permanent records and the last two years' story sheets to a committee of three which would grade it one, two or three.

The three's, or those definitely not ready for summer school, would be discarded. Selections

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would then be made first from the top records and then on down according to the quota. Consideration would be given to both 4-H and outside accomplishments and would also consider the view of the state office that a 4-H'er gets most out of summer school when he goes first at age 12 or 13 and then again at 14 or 15, and the third time at 16 or 17. Also they feel that preference should be given to those who have not previously attended.

A change in leaders' Association meetings has also been suggested. This would call for about six county-wide meetings per year.

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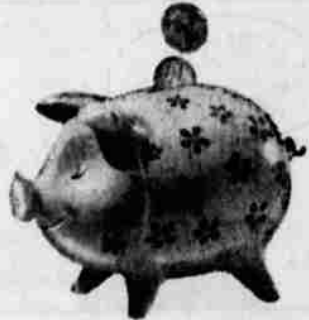
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
