

Oscar Scores 44 Points; Bearcats Clinch MV Tie

The Border Conference basketball race was all wrapped up in a triple tie today after upset losses by Texas Western and New Mexico State, while third ranked Cincinnati clinched at least a tie for the Missouri Valley Conference crown.

Oscar Robertson scored 44 points as Cincinnati belted North Texas State Monday night 95-84, and if the Bearcats can handle Bradley in their nationally televised game (NBC, 3 p.m. EST) Saturday they'll wrap up the title. Bradley kept pace by downing Houston 74-60.

West Texas State spoiled the night for New Mexico State, 83-75.

Orioles, Loes End Feuding

Temperamental Billy Loes and hooper Gene Conley today were running neck and neck for designation as major league baseball's No. 1 bad boy.

Loes, the only ballplayer ever to claim he lost a ground ball in the sun, ended another brief feud with the Baltimore management Monday and signed his contract.

The 29-year-old pitcher, long known for his eccentric actions, oftentimes has clashed with Oriole Manager Paul Richards since he was sold by Brooklyn in 1956.

Loes signed for an estimated \$20,000 taking a slight cut after a dismal 3-9 pitching performance last year. He reiterated a statement he has often made: "I'd like to be traded to another club."

Conley drew a blast from Milwaukee executive vice president Birdie Tebbets. He has been playing professional basketball with the Boston Celtics and refused to report for spring training. The Braves pitcher, who had a 0-9 mark last year, insists he will not report before the hoop season ends.

Said Tebbets: When we gave Conley permission to play basketball it was with the understanding that he would quit that sport by Feb. 15. Now he feels he owes an obligation to the Celtics. He must feel no obligations to us."

The Braves, however, did receive some good news when infielder Casey Wise and Del Rice signed, leaving only Conley, first baseman Joe Adcock and pitcher Don McMahon as holdouts.

The Washington Senators brought two holdouts into the fold, getting signed contracts from Jim Lemon, who hit 26 home runs last year, and Albie Pearson, an American League's rookie of the year.

Among the holdouts, Bob Cery, the Kansas City A's long-range batter, remained firm in his demands. Seeking a reported \$35,000, Cery said, "I'm standing pat." He and the club are still about \$5,000 apart.

An optimistic note was struck at the Pittsburgh camp where Dick Stuart predicted he would hit 30 homers if played regularly "and maybe we'll all be playing in the World Series."

But a nostalgic note broke the routine at the Los Angeles camp. Flanked by two attendants and confined to an electrically powered wheelchair he calls his "Cadillac," Roy Campanella, now a Dodger coach, rejoined his former teammates.

Connecticut can clinch the Yankee Conference crown by defeating Rhode Island Wednesday night.

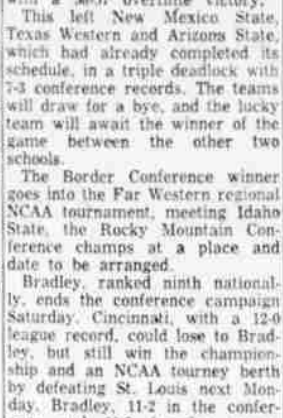

Sportswriters and broadcasters established the Fishermen as a journey favorite by again voting them into first place over North Salem.

Astoria polished off Hillsboro and David Douglas of Portland for its 18th and 19th victories of the season. It has lost only one. Behind North Salem, whose 20-2 record won it heavy support, came Klamath Falls, which clinched the Southern Oregon Conference championship with a victory over Medford.

Klamath Falls moved up a notch at the expense of Jefferson of Portland, Jefferson, although it reached the tournament, was upset by Franklin in its bid to clinch the Portland League title. Pendleton, which was idle last week, remained undisturbed No. 5 team, behind Jefferson.

Marshfield gained the Midwest League title and a tournament berth with two weekend victories, and advanced from eighth to No. 6.

EUGENE (AP)—The Idaho Vandals, often a more impressive team than their record indicates, returned home Tuesday after beating Oregon here 64-58 Monday night.

Idaho strengthened its hold on seventh place in the Pacific Coast Conference basketball standings, leaving the Ducks aware of the job ahead when they again meet the Vandals at Moscow Friday night.

Oregon must win that one and its final contest with Washington State at Pullman Saturday night to tie Idaho for seventh.

Whaylon Coleman, who tossed in 17 points, particularly impressed 2,466 fans. Oregon's smallest conference game crowd of the season.

He teamed with John Liveous, who scored 18, to keep the visitors ahead after the opening 10 minutes when the score was tied seven times.

Pettit Closes In On Record

NEW YORK (AP)—Bob Pettit of the St. Louis Hawks needs only a 13-point average in his six remaining games to establish a National Basketball Assn. scoring record.

The Bayou Bombardier, who was drafted by the Hawks after winning All-America honors at LSU, is within 78 points of George Yardley's standard of 2,001. Yardley, now playing for Syracuse, set the mark at Detroit last season.

Pettit has amassed 1,924 points, an average of 29.2 points a game. If he maintains that average, he will eclipse the record set by the great George Mikan, who in 1950-51 scored 28.4 a contest.

Trailing Pettit are Jack Twyman of Cincinnati and Paul Arizin of Philadelphia.

Twyman advanced to second place with 1,693 points and a 25.3 average. Arizin, whose 25.8 average is higher, trails in points with 1,675, but has two more games to play.

Kenny Sears leads in field goal accuracy with a 493 mark; Boston's Bill Sharman heads the free throw percentage leaders with .505; Bill Russell of the Celtics heads the rebounders with 22.9 a game and Boston's Bob Cousy heads the playmakers with 8.5 assists a game.

Klamath County's B basketball champions, the Merrill Huskies are preparing this week for a best of three game playoff with the St. Mary's Crusaders, the sub-district title holder from the Rogue Valley.

The playoff will be held at the Oregon Tech gymnasium, beginning this coming Thursday and running through Saturday, if the third and final contest is necessary. The powerful, well-balanced Husky squad swept through regular season play to cop the league crown, then emerged victorious in the county tournament held on the Mile High court last week to claim the county championship. Game time for the playoff match is 8 p.m.

The winner of the playoff battle will represent District 5 in the State B Tourney which will be held at Bend and will run from March 12 through March 14.

The Crusaders won their sub-district title last weekend by defeating Butte Falls and Talent in a four team tournament.

Merrill coach Al Keck has chosen four starters and will wait until just before game time to decide who his fifth starter will be. John Haskins, Bruce Brickner, Bud Maupin and Dennis Salvadori are slated for starting berths while Dean Haskins and Brian Fields are battling for the fifth position on the starting five.

In the county tourney, Brickner, the 6-5 sophomore, topped the Huskies' scoring efforts by tossing in 41 points, good enough for third place in the top tourney scorers while Maupin and Salvadori were ranked fourth and fifth, sinking 37 and 33 counters respectively. Maupin and Brickner placed third and fourth in the final league scoring race with averages of 14.5 and 14.3. Both Maupin and Brickner, along with John Haskins, were among the 10 members selected on the county all-star squad following the tourney. Haskins tops the team in rebounding, averaging 17 per game while Brickner trails with a 16.4 mark.

Eastment Pleading Innocent

NEW YORK (AP)—Manhattan College track coach George Eastment, a lawyer by trade, pleaded innocent today to a whole string of charges filed against him by Penn State's Chick Werner in the wake of the Jaspers' victory in the ICA indoor championships.

Manhattan won last Saturday's meet with 21 points to Penn State's 20 17-36. The key point came when Manhattan's Henry White was awarded third place in the 60-yard race high hurdles, following a protest by Eastment. Before the Manhattan protest, White had been placed fourth.

Werner charged that Eastment acted in bad taste in making the protest, that it was unethical for him to talk to the judge in question, and finally that he should have disqualified himself from the ICA Games Committee, which reviewed Werner's complaints.

"I see no reason why a coach shouldn't go on the floor," said Eastment in defending his position. "It's been done many times."

"All I did was ask chief Dan Ferris to review the slips of the judges who called the race."

"The judge in question (Dave Levy) told me that White finished ahead of Mike Herman of NYU, who had been awarded third. Once he told me that I knew the decision would have to be reversed because I knew the rules governing the action."

As for being on the Games Committee, Eastment said he took no part in the discussion, and that, furthermore, he was not the representative of the coaches as Werner thought. He was on the committee, he said, because he happened to be the coach of a team close to ICA headquarters and was readily available.

Werner didn't actually file a protest. He asked for a review by the Games Committee. It got him nowhere. The Games Committee decided the problem was out of its jurisdiction. A matter for the Executive Committee, it said.

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
