



Bail Raising Attempt Fails

An attempt by Eldon Lyle Shafer to raise \$7,500 pending an appeal of his cattle rustling conviction failed in circuit court Thursday.

Shafer, 35-year-old Fort Klamath ranchhand, already has filed notice of appeal to the state supreme court of his conviction and seven-year penitentiary sentence.

Both men were convicted of stealing a black, white-faced cow belonging to Lorenz G. Vandenberg of Chiloquin last Spring and removing it to a ranch near Rainier. In both cases jury trials lasted a week and a half.

Attorney Robert G. Danielson and Deputy District Attorney O. W. Goakey questioned Shafer's potential bondsmen in the bail proceeding before Judge David R. Vandenberg Thursday.

After thorough questioning of three potential bondsmen, however, the court ruled that proffered bonds were insufficient to cover Shafer's bail, and the defendant was returned to the county jail.

While born in Puerto Rico of missionary parents, the speaker was educated in the East in this country. He pioneered a Spanish church in New Mexico in 1942 and left the following year for South America.

He has served in the capacity of vice superintendent of the Assemblies of God in El Salvador, has organized a national youth program in that area and for four years directed the Assembly of God Bible Institute there. He founded and directs the Gospel Radio network which now blankets all of Central America.

Appointment of B. K. Swartz Jr., new curator at the Klamath County Museum, as Klamath County Centennial chairman is announced today by Jim Boyle, member of the governor's Centennial advisory committee for Klamath and Lake counties.

Swartz indicated he will be naming subcommittees very shortly. Mike Haggerty, assistant coordinator with the Centennial Commission at Portland has been in Portland to offer any assistance from his office.

"Klamath Falls has a natural feature here," he said. "The museum has nearly all of the first pest office established in Klamath County and the curator says he can assemble the remainder. We'll plan to use it for a stop for the Pony Express."

Haggerty telephoned to Baker to learn the status of plans for the Pony Express and was told that letters will soon go to the Klamath Sheriff's posse and the local riding club explaining their parts in the program. Routes are being set now, he learned. Both local riding groups have contributed to the project.

A fine arts project is also underway here in view of the fine observance of National Art Week last year and growing interest in art in this area.
