

UO Ducks Toppled 81-75 By Idahoans

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—The University of Oregon lost 81-75 in overtime to Idaho Friday night in the next to the last game of the season.

The score was tied 70-70 at the end of regulation play Friday night. In the overtime period, Joe King sank a crucial basket and put Idaho ahead to stay.

Oregon trailed four points 36-32

as the second half opened. Then, paced by Denny Strickland, Bud Kuykendall and Dale Herron, the Ducks quickly moved to a 10 point lead.

Oregon sank 55 per cent of its field goal attempts in the second half and ended with 41 per cent for the night. Idaho sank only 39 per cent of its shots.

Jim Prestel of Idaho was high scorer for the game with 25 points. Strickland had 18, Kuykendall 16, Herron 15 and Butch Kimpton 8.

Cal Idle, Collects PCC Title

Coach Pete Newell's California Bears are the Pacific Coast Conference basketball champions.

They'll meet the University of Utah in the Far West NCAA regional playoff in San Francisco next Friday night.

California took the PCC title Friday night without playing a game. The Bears' brothers at Los Angeles, the UCLA Bruins, knocked off the University of Washington, 56-35. The defeat ended the last mathematical chance the Huskies had of gaining a tie with the Bears.

Washington looked like the winner in the first half and part of the second half. It had a 10-point

bulge on the Bruins until Rater Johnson, the Olympic decathlon champion, scored two quick baskets and ignited the UCLA attack.

The Bruins soon had tied it up and they went on to a five-point lead with one minute to go.

Two pass interceptions in the last minute gave Bruno Boin and Doug Smart shots at the basket and each connected. With five

seconds to go Washington had the ball again and was headed for the basket. With one second left the Huskies called time out and when play was resumed they had only one play — to fire a long, high

pass to the key, hoping Smart or Boin could tip the ball in. Johnson baited away the ball. Walt Torrence of UCLA, the PCC leading scorer, was high man for the game with 18 points.

Stanford disposed of Oregon State Friday night, 71-54, as Dick Haga closed his career with 25 points. The Indians finished the schedule with a 15-9 record.

Jim Prestel, who has been a defensive star all season for Idaho, went on the offense Friday night at Moscow as Idaho bested Oregon, 81-75. Prestel was high point man for the game with 25.

Waylon Coleman scored 20 more for the Vandals. Denny Strickland was high for Oregon with 18.

Willamette Beaten In LA

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Willamette University got trounced Friday night in the opening round of the NCAA's small college Pacific Coast playoffs.

The Salem, Ore., team—a member of the Northwest Conference—absorbed a 73-52 beating from Chapman College.

In the other game, Los Angeles State beat Fresno State 83-57.

Saturday's game matched Los Angeles and Chapman, the winner getting a berth in the NCAA small college national tournament at Evansville, Ind., next week.

In the Friday night game, Willamette got only one point in the first seven minutes, and fell behind 13-1. By halftime Willamette trailed 42-40.

Buz Willett topped Willamette with 11 points. Willamette had but a 246 field goal percentage, sinking 17 of 69 attempts.

Boozer Hits 32 In K-State Win

MANHATTAN, Kan. (AP)—The Kansas State Wildcats, paced by Bob Boozer's 32 points, crushed the Missouri Tigers 108-69 in a Big Eight basketball game Saturday that saw the nation's No. 2 team use its reserves freely.

It was the first time this year the Wildcats had scored more than 100 points.

Boozer, the Wildcats' All-American, got 21 of his points in the first half. He saw less action in the second half as Coach Tex Winter put in his reserves.

Delany Smashes Indoor Record

NEW YORK (AP)—Ron Delany smashed his own world indoor mile record Saturday night when he hit the tape in 4:01.4 in the Knights of Columbus Games, passing Istvan Rozsavolgyi in the last five yards.

Delany set the existing—but not yet officially accepted—world indoor mark of 4:02.5 two weeks ago.

Rozsavolgyi, the great Hungarian distance runner who finished about two yards behind Delany, himself shattered Ron's previous mark, being clocked in 4:01.8.

Another big assist must go to Peter Close, a St. John's (N.Y.) senior student, who set it all up by rushing to a 39.1 first quarter, a 1:30.5 half and a 3:01.8 three-quarter.

Indians Stomp OSC 71-54 Friday Night

STANFORD, Calif. (AP)—Oregon State lost to Stanford by a 71-54 score Friday night to meeting California in its final Pacific Coast Conference basketball game of the season.

The Staters moved into an early lead Friday night but soon fell behind.

The final score was announced at 70-54, but then the official scorer discovered that Stanford's John Arrillaga had sunk two free throws instead of one and the score was changed.

Oregon State's Jim Woodland—who scored 18 points for the night—helped keep his team within three points—38-35—at the half.

In the second half, the Staters led briefly 46-42 on the shooting of Lee Harman and Ted Miller. But then the Indians went ahead again to stay.

It was Stanford's final game of the season. The Indians won 10 and lost 6 conference games. Oregon State has won 7 and lost 8 so far.

Stanford Captain Dick Haga, playing his final collegiate game, led the contest's scoring with 25 points—his highest single game total.

Bradley Trounces Bearcats

PEORIA, Ill. (AP)—Bradley's Braves, doing their damage at the free throw line, Saturday spilled Cincinnati's third-ranked Bearcats 64-66 to keep a chance flickering for a Missouri Valley Conference basketball title tie.

Bradley, rated No. 9 in the nation, trailed at halftime 37-29. The Braves avenged a double overtime 35-34 upset at Cincinnati Jan. 5. They raised their MVC record to 12-2 and left Cincinnati at 12-1 with a league finale against St. Louis at home Monday night.

Cincinnati, whose All-America Oscar Robertson scored 24 points, gained their halftime lead although hampered by Bradley's surprise use of the zone defense.

The Braves played man-to-man defense in losing to the Bearcats earlier.

The Braves staged an early second-half sprint with 9 consecutive points and forged ahead 38-43 with less than 10 minutes left.

The game was televised nationally.

Both shot on a par from the field, 40 per cent, but the Bearcats had more baskets, 29 to 25.

The Braves' free throw damage really was done when there were 11 minutes to play and the one-and-one situation was invoked on Cincinnati's seventh foul.

Bradley now awaits the outcome of Monday night's Cincinnati-St. Louis game. If the Bearcats beat St. Louis for the MVC title, Cincinnati goes into the NCAA tournament automatically as the conference representative.

The National Invitation Tournament in New York would then take Bradley as the last entrant in the 12-team field.

Wright Leads Tourney Open

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—Mickey Wright of San Diego, Calif., carved a subpar 70 on the Hyde Park Municipal golf course Saturday and increased her lead in the Jacksonville Women's Open to two strokes.

The 24-year-old two-time winner of the \$6,000 tourney had shaken off all but about three challengers going into Sunday's final round with a score of 214.

Betsy Rawls, Spartanburg, S.C., stayed close on the heels of her close friend with a 71 for a three-round total of 216.

Marlene Hagge, Pittsburgh, Pa., matched par 72 for a total of 220. Louise Suggs of Sea Island, Ga., pulled into contention with a 70 for 221.

Siegrist Named As Beaver Coach

CORVALLIS (AP)—Ron Siegrist, co-captain and blocking back of Oregon State College's 1955 football team, Saturday was named assistant football coach at OSC.

Since his graduation, Siegrist has been head coach at Norte Del Rio High School in North Sacramento, Calif., where he has compiled a successful record.

Dave D'Olive Named OCC All-Star Choice

PORTLAND—Eastern Oregon's Larry Howard was the only unanimous choice for the 1959 all-conference basketball team chosen by coaches of the Oregon Collegiate Conference. He is one of two repeat choices from last year's team.

The other is Portland State's John Winters who was a first team selection in 1958 as a junior and a second team choice as a sophomore. The coaches named six players to the first team. Howard won all eight possible points in the voting and the other five tied with seven each.

Dave D'Olive of Southern Oregon and Tom Neel of Eastern Oregon advanced to the first unit on the 1959 balloting. Both were second team selections in 1958.

Two sophomores joined the select team this year. They are Gordie Carrigan of Southern Oregon and Bernie Jones of Portland State. Howard, Winters and D'Olive are seniors. Neel is a junior. Jim McAbee of Southern Oregon repeated as second team choice for the second straight year. He is joined by another senior, John Frederick of Portland State, sophomores Punk Biddington of Southern Oregon and Don Bridges of Portland State, and freshman Ken Johnson of Oregon College of Education.
