

Stock Market Reports New Peak Industrial Average

NEW YORK (UPI) — Stocks registered their fourth week of gain in the past week with the industrial average reaching a 157-day high—a record top—of 613.77 on Wednesday.

Industrials topped 605 on Monday, 610 on Tuesday and were near 612 at the close on Wednesday and Thursday. Then the Federal Reserve boosted the discount rate from 2 1/2 to 3 per cent in some centers. That brought a mild reaction Friday but left the market up on the week.

The market had been losing steam and many took the discount rate boost as an excuse to realize some profits. But the selling failed to dislodge any large holdings and it quickly subsided with prices rallying from their lows. The market had been expecting this rise for a long time to bring the discount rate into line with other rates.

Bank Robber Hunt Centers On Old Auto

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio (UPI) — Authorities today checked out another clue, an abandoned automobile, in the hunt for elusive Frank Spreng, 29, at large since the \$25,955 robbery of a Hamilton, Ohio, bank Monday.

An FBI spokesman said the recovery here Friday night of the car, a 1951, two-toned Nash Rambler believed purchased by the fugitive in Canton Tuesday, was "the first solid" clue as to his whereabouts.

The chase for Spreng led to Pennsylvania, where money wrappers from the Hamilton bank were found and New York since he made his lightning getaway across Ohio by airplane and car after the robbery of the First National Bank branch.

The FBI also said it was checking out a report that Spreng was seen Friday in Willowby, a Cleveland suburb.

An agent said that a man answering Spreng's general physical description had spent three hours at a Willowby motel and then headed east on U.S. Route 20 in a 1958 Ford.

The Rambler, bearing the same serial number as the one which Spreng bought Tuesday, was reported Friday night parked near the home of a local resident, Mrs. Enid Parker, since Tuesday night.

The swarthy fugitive, suspected of two plane thefts since his Hollywood style break out of an Akron jail about 10 months ago, had been traced to Altoona, Pa., then to New York, until the search once more returned to his home state.

Spreng, a fast-talking braggart who likes to wear Ivy-League clothes, was placed on the FBI's "most wanted" list after his jailbreak with four other Summit County jail prisoners. He is the only one still at large.

Although authorities say the fast moving bandit could be "anywhere in the country the way he gets around," lawmen in this area have been alert for his appearance since his escape.

His wife, Alberta, 25, and two children, who live in Akron, not far from where he was last imprisoned, are under a 24-hour FBI guard.

FAIR BUDGET
