Class Series Opens Here

A series of advanced training classes for Klamath Falls police officers has been started here. Police Chief **Charles Howard** said. **Keith L. Jones**, police consultant with the League of Oregon Cities, opened the series with a demonstration of arrest problems involving automobiles at a class session Thursday.

The schedule for classes, being held at the police rifle range and lounge here, includes:
 March 10 — Crime suppression techniques; instructor, **Lt. Edward J. Carney** of Portland Bureau of Police.
 March 12 — Crime scene evidence; instructor, Special Agent **Howard B. Patterson** of the FBI.
 March 17 — Police and fire operations with arson evidence; instructors, **Lt. Jack H. Bears**, Oregon State Police, and **Fire Chief E. L. Smith** of Eugene.
 March 19 — Accident investiga-

tion evidence; instructor, **Capt. Clyde C. Fichtner**, Medford Police Department.
 March 24 — Uniform crime reporting; instructor, **Lt. Louis Johnson**, Oregon State Police.
 Subjects for the classes held here Tuesday and Thursday were selected from a list submitted by various law enforcement agencies.

The school here, like other schools in the state, is sponsored by the Oregon Association of City Police Officers and the Oregon State Sheriffs Association in cooperation with the FBI, state police, League of Oregon Cities and the University of Oregon.

The classes are being attended by all city police here and by some members of the state police detachment. Fifteen such schools are being conducted over the state.
