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Congressman Boosts 3-Bs In Capital Music Squabble

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Certain cool cats and moldy figs among the members of Congress, along with a bunch of congressional wives who also dig jazz either progressive or old fashioned, felt the need recently to raise ten grand or so for sweet charity.

So they organized a big cultural event, to be rendered at the Sheraton Park Hotel here the night of March 16 at 10 a head. Many of the big names in jazz, of assorted schools, were signed as performers, and until the other day everything was swinging along great.

Then Rep. Torbert MacDonald (D-Mass.), himself a cultivated type but unfortunately not associated with this particular educational and eleemosynary group, sounded a loud sour note.

MacDonald put out a statement plugging Bach, Brahms, and Beethoven as proper musical fare, and speaking most unkindly of "rock and roll, hillbilly, bebop, boogie woogie, and jazz."

MacDonald intimated that some of the performers and devotees of these various arts were musical "illiterates." The pain suffered at this by some of his readers was eased only slightly by their joy in the fact that he misspelled "illiterates."

MacDonald's outburst, which was duly printed in the Congressional Record, was inspired by a recent post office order under which recordings now are mailed at a low rate previously set up for books. He complained that the effect is to subsidize the dissemination of such educational efforts as "Jailhouse Rock," "Pickin' On the Wrong Chicken," "Bony Moronie," and "Dinner With Dracula."

Jazz buffs like Reps. Frank Thompson Jr. (D-N.J.), Henry Reuss (D-Wis.), and Donald J. Irwin (D-Conn.), who are helping set up the jazz show, naturally were not pleased with MacDonald. However, they professed for him more of sadness than anger.

"Torby just doesn't know," one of his friends commented. "I bet he thinks Brahms is a bull." Despite MacDonald's blast, tickets for next Monday's jazz jubilee are moving fast. Actually, if nobody goes but the listed patrons the affair will be quite a ball. They include Speaker Sam Rayburn, Mamie Eisenhower, Pat

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Clare Lorraine Manville, 63, of married sister of Tommy Manville and heir to a 10-million-dollar asbestos fortune, was found dead Sunday night in a Las Vegas resort hotel.

The coroner's office said death was apparently from natural causes. An autopsy has been scheduled.
