Commentator To Address K & F Club

Gene Conklin, Midwest radio commentator and public relations consultant just recently returned from Russia and who has been a repeated visitor to Europe and Middle Eastern countries during the past few years, will be the guest speaker at the meeting of the Klamath Knife and Fork Club, Wednesday at 6:45 p.m. It was announced today by Ross Ragland, the club president.

The meeting will be held in the Willard Hotel. Conklin, who returned from an extended visit abroad only recently, talked off the cuff to dozens of utility groups and businessmen in Russia and in several European countries for Rotary International, and at the request of the Department of State.

He is a graduate of Knox College, Galesburg, Illinois and also attended Kansas State College, Manhattan. Now living in Hutchinson, Kansas, heart of the nation's wheat belt, his observations were made from the agricultural point of view rather than the political point of view.

E. A. Favell, who was one of Lakeview's most prominent and respected citizens and who contributed a lot to the development of the community, died in Phoenix, Arizona, Friday night, Mr. Favell was born June 27, 1889, in Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, where he received his public school education. He received a bachelor of arts degree in business administration and finance from the Wharton School of Commerce and Finance at the University of Pennsylvania.

Following his graduation, he joined the Hunter Land Company and in 1911 he was sent to Florida as manager of the operation to subdivide and sell 130 acres of land there during the midst of Florida's big land boom. He stayed there three years.

E. G. Favell moved to Lakeview in 1915 and he was married to Ruth Bernard there a year later. They have one son, Eugene H. Favell, who operates a clothing store in Klamath Falls. The younger Favell is married and has five children.

House Scuttles Measure On Appeals Board Revise

SALEM (AP) — Legislation to change the appeals board procedure for Oregon State Police went down to a 32-28 defeat today in the House.

The bill originally provided for placing state police under civil service and to require Senate confirmation of the state police superintendent's appointment, but the House State and Federal Affairs Committee had scuttled both of these provisions.

The House then scuttled what was left.

The bill, as it reached the House floor today, would have set up an appeals board consisting of the chairman of the Civil Service Commission, a state police officer of the same rank as the accused, and an officer superior in rank.

The state police superintendent would have appointed the two officer-members. The appeals board, which hears the officers' appeals from disciplinary actions, now consists of the superintendent or his deputy, and two officers of superior rank. The superintendent names the other two.

The bill also would have given the appeals board the right of private counsel. The 38 opposition votes were split among those who like the present system, who want civil service, or want a board entirely independent of the superintendent.

Rep. Norman O. Howard (D-Portland), author of the original bill, said he still believes in civil service, but that the amended bill is better than nothing. He quoted State Police Supt. H. G. Maison as saying that he's not in favor of it, but that he could live with it.

While Howard said the bill would improve state police morale, Rep. George Annala (D-Hood River) said it would break down morale. Annala said that because the state police is a military organization, there is no place for civil service in it.

The House Public Health and Welfare Committee gave unanimous approval to a bill to direct the state Board of Health to establish and enforce housing and sanitation standards in farm labor camps.

The committee eliminated the provision that the state Bureau of Labor and state Employment Service should help enforce the standards. So, in its present form, the bill would require the Board of Health by itself to do the job.

The bill is being opposed by some farmers who say it would be too expensive for them.

The Senate passed and sent to the House a bill to permit parents to commit children to Fairview Home for Mentally Retarded Persons. Now they can be committed only by court order.

Another bill which the Senate sent to the House would change the word "contributions" to "taxes" in the unemployment compensation law. It refers to the payroll tax paid by the employers.

The House State and Federal Affairs Committee announced it would hold a hearing March 16 on the bill to let the governor submit plans to reorganize the state government, subject to veto of his plan by the Legislature.

This is the bill that the committee tabled, but revived after Gov. Mark Hatfield protested.

Surviving him are the widow, Mary; a son Jerry, with the U.S. Navy; two sisters, Mrs. Merrill Burns, of San Diego and Dorothy Snyder of Los Angeles; two brothers, Paul of Venice, California and Oregon of Reno. He was a member of IWA Local 6-4. Burial services will be conducted at a Reno cemetery upon the arrival of his son Jerry, who is on duty at sea.

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Mrs. Martha O. DeLap, 98, Dies At Salem Home Of Son

Mrs. Martha Octavia DeLap, widow of the late C. R. DeLap of Klamath Falls, died March 6 at the home of a son, Perry O. DeLap, Salem, where she had made her home for some time.

Mrs. DeLap was born May 16, 1860 in Missouri and was 98 years, nine months and 20 days old at the time of her death.

She was a member of a pioneer Klamath County family which has been identified for many years in political circles. Her husband, Charles Ransom DeLap, served as Klamath County clerk for 20 years.

One son, Charles F. DeLap, now in office, has served in the same capacity for a number of years.

Mrs. DeLap and her husband were charter members of the First Baptist Church which will observe its 75th anniversary this year. She was the last living charter member. During her lifetime, she devoted her time to her family of nine children and to her church work, teaching Sunday school under difficulties and giving moral and financial support to the struggling young church.

She crossed the plains when one year old in a wagon train with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Farrar. The family lived for a time at Ashland, at Yreka and Grass Valley, California, before coming to this county and to Klamath Falls, in 1883.

She was married on June 23, 1884, to Charles R. DeLap and became the mother of seven sons and two daughters. Mr. DeLap died in 1945 and was buried in Portland. Funeral services will be held for Mrs. DeLap in that city at a date to be announced. Interment will be in the family plot. One son, Lloyd R. DeLap, died several years ago.

Survivors include six sons, T. H. Richmond, California; Charles F. DeLap, Klamath Falls; Chester L. Burbank, California; Perry O. DeLap, Klamath Falls; Virgil G. and Wilmoth of Portland; two daughters, Mrs. Octavia Patterson, Richmond, California, and Mrs. Ruth Turner, Hoonah, Alaska; two sisters, Mrs. Della Smith, Klamath Falls, and Mrs. Wilmoth Chute, San Diego, California; 21 grandchildren, 42 great-grandchildren and 11 great-great-grandchildren.

The family requests that those who care to may send contributions to the First Baptist Church DeLap Memorial Scholarship Fund to aid young people entering full-time Christian vocations, in furthering their education, a field to which both Mr. and Mrs. DeLap were devoted.

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
