

World Chieftains Urged To Counter Red Proposal

WASHINGTON (AP) — Free world leaders were urged by Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.) today to counter the latest Soviet proposal with an offer for a four-power guarantee of freedom for all of Berlin.

Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev limited his suggestion Monday to West Berlin. He said "a minimum number of troops" drawn either from the four major powers or from neutral nations, might be stationed there.

Mansfield, the assistant Democratic leader, said in an interview he shares the skepticism of other U.S. leaders concerning the various Khrushchev proposals. But he said the West could take advantage of Khrushchev's suggestion for a guarantee of West Berlin's independence with neutral or Big Four troops.

"That wouldn't be enough," Mansfield said. "But if Khrushchev wants to cover all of Berlin under United Nations guarantees on access and control of East and West Berlin, then I think that would be worthy of consideration."

Khrushchev's proposal, which met a cautious reception from State Department officials, was described by Chairman J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee as only a variation of an old story.

"It sounds like some of the things that Mikoyan was saying when he was here," Fulbright said. He alluded to conversations committee members had with Anastas I. Mikoyan, deputy Soviet premier, on his visit to this country.

Sen. Everett Dirksen of Illinois, the Senate Republican leader, is reported to have said Khrushchev's statement was an indication that the Soviet leader may be seeking to maneuver his way out of his Nov. 27 ultimatum for the withdrawal of Allied troops from West Berlin by May 27.

"But it is difficult to judge what Khrushchev is up to," Dirksen said. "That was his Monday statement. What he will say today or tomorrow we don't know. He changes position as fast as the slots in a revolving door."

The Senate heard Monday a fresh Democratic barrage of criticism for the administration's plan to cut back the Army and Marine Corps. The Armed Services Committee urged the administration to withdraw orders to cut the Army back from 900,000 men to 870,000 and the Marine Corps from 200,000 to 175,000 "to dispel any lingering thoughts of a would be aggressor" that the nation is whittling down its defenses.

Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.) also commented critically that "despite world conditions and our defense intentions not to give an inch in Berlin, we plan to continue with the reduction of our conventional forces."

Sens. Paul H. Douglas (D-Ill.) and Allen J. Ellender (D-La.) joined in contending the forces should be kept at the higher levels for which Congress provided money last year.

"But Sen. John Sherman Cooper (R-Ky.) said that after promises of unity and cooperation on the part of Democrats in the Berlin situation he thought some of them "go over the political line" in speeches.

He said there is too much talk about the inadequacy of U.S. defenses.

She emphasized that good roses come from good bushes, and that it never pays to buy anything but the best quality. The spraying program must be regular and thorough, and should begin as soon after the first of March as can be managed.

Lime-sulphur should be applied

liberally to both the plant and to the surrounding ground after the plant has been pruned. There are many of the newer roses that do very well here, providing they have some winter protection. Hilling the earth up around the plant, and covering it with a mulch will provide all the protection that is necessary. Mrs. Linville sees no reason why the Klamath Basin can not have beautiful roses if a reasonable amount of care is given.

"Every time we bring out a new coin there are a lot of rumors and we get a big batch of mail and phone calls," Howard said.

"People pay more attention to a new coin and see things they never noticed before," he said.

Take the latest rumor—that the coin is lopsided and must be scrapped because it won't stack properly.

Howard fished a new penny from his pocket and inspected the rim. Pointing, he said: "Here the rim is thinner than at any other point. You can see it with the naked eye."

Storm Swirls At Walden

CONCORD, Mass. (AP) — A storm of considerable violence swirled around Walden Pond today, the usually placid little pool made world famous by philosopher Henry David Thoreau.

Thoreau wrote most of his last writing prose in a little dwelling on its bank, charmed by the sylvan beauty. One volume, he called, simply, "Walden."

When he went to Boston, some 20 miles away, he walked, so he could observe the ants, the birds and beasts and growing things.

Now there are proponents of bathing beaches, folk who would enlist bulldozers to bash down trees and embankments.

But they have opposition from folk who don't want the maples cut down and have taken the fight to County Court.

Monday Judge Robert Sullivan upheld a decision dismissing a petition by 10 taxpayers to halt further tree-felling and digging.

They protested such development violated terms under which the property was deeded to the state—to preserve it as a place of natural beauty.

A "Save Walden Committee" claims it has new legal moves in the making.
