Driver Bill Wins Approval

SALEM (AP)—The House Financial Affairs Committee gave unanimous approval Tuesday to Gov. Mark Hatfield's uninsured motorist bill.

The bill would compel automobile insurance companies to insure their customers against personal injury caused by uninsured motorists or hit and run drivers.

The committee is controlled by Democrats 5-4, but it approved the Republican governor's proposal over the recommendation by Democratic ex-Gov. Robert D. Holmes that every motorist be required to have liability insurance.

The committee received testimony that the uninsured motorist clause now is being added to about half the policies in force in Oregon.

The insurance companies opposed the bill. They do not want to be compelled to add the clause and would rather insert it on a voluntary basis.

The companies testified that the extra protection would cost the insured driver only \$1 or \$2 more a year.

Ed Groups Slate Joint Hearing

SALEM (AP)—The Senate and House Education committees will hold a joint hearing March 23 at 8 p.m. on bills to increase state aid to local school districts.
One bill increases the basic school support from \$106 to \$120 for each census child.
The second bill provides \$20 in addition to basic school support. This money would come from a special account.

CORRUPTION CRACKDOWN

Nikita Hasn't Lost Sight Of His Original Purpose

WASHINGTON (AP) — Every few days now Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev comes up with a new proposal for dealing with the Berlin crisis.
His record is impressive for imagination in fast diplomatic footwork. Sometimes he even seems to contradict himself.

But in the midst of the confusion, which he made deliberately weak in order to obscure the real issues, one fact stands out clearly: He is still pursuing his original purpose, announced just four months ago, to try to force the Western powers to give up their position in West Berlin.

This showcase of Western Democracy and prosperity in the heart of Communist East Germany is an irritant. He may be willing to risk war to remove it.

In the ultimate showdown, most Western officials are convinced Khrushchev will pull back before plunging the world into war. But they also think he will go very close to the brink if he has to in order to test Western determination to hold fast in Berlin.

Khrushchev's latest maneuver came in a speech at Berlin Monday. He said that the Western powers might keep small garrisons of their forces in West Berlin if they agreed to make that city a "free city" and if a Soviet garrison was also stationed there.

This suggestion seemed to reverse the line he had taken in a note to the United States, Britain, France and West Germany on Nov. 27, when he first made his "free city" proposition and talked about demilitarizing West Berlin.

That was the second move in a series which began Nov. 10, when Khrushchev announced that the Western powers must get out of the German city and said that the Soviet Union intended to turn over its occupation functions in East Berlin to the East German Communist regime. The announcement immediately raised the specter of a new Berlin blockade.

As a result of diplomatic exchanges since that time, there is now conditional agreement on an early foreign ministers conference to deal with German problems.

There also is the prospect of a summit meeting later in the year.

bringing together Khrushchev and President Eisenhower along with British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and French President Charles de Gaulle.
Khrushchev's real purposes in all these maneuvers are a subject of continuing debate among Western leaders.

Many American and other Western officials say that Khrushchev seems to be aiming not only at destroying Western protection for Berlin but also at bringing it eventually under red rule.

But some experts here and in Western Europe are intrigued by other possibilities. They say that Khrushchev may have alternative goals of winning Western recognition of the East German regime, forcing a summit conference, trying to compel the West to endorse Communist regimes throughout Eastern Europe or—an outside possibility—finding some way to negotiate German reunification on terms acceptable to the Soviet Union.

His newest proposal that Soviet troops might join small units of armed forces of the other powers in West Berlin has been viewed as little more than sugar coating on a bitter pill. With the West insisting it would not pull its troops out, officials argue, Khrushchev in effect has simply offered to let some of them stay there—if they stayed on his terms.

His reference to troops, however, has been subjected to two other less talked about interpretations. One is that in seeming to meet a Western objection to his plan he was simply trying to create confusion.

The other interpretation is that Khrushchev wanted to provide himself with an escape hatch. Officials who suggested this possibility said that if the crisis gets too hot and he wants to find a way out some months from now he may use his troop proposal in some modified form as a basis for saying that he was prepared all along to agree to Western forces remaining in Berlin. From this starting point he might then come up with a formula for Berlin's future.

NM Gal Solon Browbeats Men

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — Rep. Helen Wells of Torrance County rose in the New Mexico House to speak for a bill that all community property should go to a surviving widow in case of a man dying without leaving a will.
She said: "This is a good bill. I don't feel like arguing about it. So if you gentlemen will just agree with me, there will be no argument."
There was no argument. The bill passed unanimously.

Tax Group Okays Bill

SALEM (AP)—The Senate Taxation committee approved 4-2 Tuesday a bill which would establish a higher assessed valuation ratio on utilities for property tax purposes.
Spokesmen for the utilities called the bill unfair and regressive.
But Senate President Walter Pearson (D-Portland) told the Senate Taxation Committee the measure would stall the shift of property taxes from utilities to residences.
The bill would establish an assessed value 30 per cent higher on utilities than on business property, and 10 per cent less on homes than on business.
Pearson said the share of the total property tax in this state paid by home owners has been increasing in recent years while the share paid by utilities has been decreasing. He said they should be stabilized.

Mishap Averted By Jet Bombers

MOUNTAIN HOME, Idaho (AP) — Two B47 jet bombers missed collision by inches Tuesday. As they banked steeply at 30,000-foot altitude to avoid each other, the wing of one clipped a radio antenna from the tail fin of the other.
Both planes remained aloft and later landed safely at southwest Idaho's Mountain Home Air Force Base—after circling for hours to exhaust their fuel. Each six-jet craft carried four crewmen, and none was injured. All were stationed at Mountain Home.
