Educators Slate Meeting

A trio of educators will represent Klamath County at the 36th annual state convention of the Oregon Education Association in Portland, March 19 through 21. They are Louis Carrigan, Garol Wheatstone and Gordon Kensler. The conference is expected to draw about 6,500 delegates. This year's theme, "Proud Past, Unlimited Future" will observe 100 years of educational progress in the state.

Dr. John K. Norton, a faculty member of Columbia University Teachers College, will deliver the kickoff address the morning of March 19.

Other speakers will be Dr. Gerald Wendt of New York, a scientist and educator who will deliver a speech called "The Foreseeable World of Tomorrow." Dr. Paul Wright, pastor of Portland's First Presbyterian Church, and Cecil W. Posey, executive secretary of the Oregon Education Association.

Highlight of the session will be a centennial banquet the evening of March 19 and the presentation of the OEA's Education Citizen of the Year award.

Two Brothers Held To Jury For Assault

Two brothers from the Macdoel area were bound over to the Klamath County Grand Jury today on assault and battery charges following a lengthy preliminary hearing in district court today.

The defendants were Marvin Delmar Criss, 39, and Arnold Criss, 36. They were accused of beating William Stepp, 4212 Homedale Road, in a bar of a local hotel last January 24.

The charge against them is assault and battery, not with a dangerous weapon, but with intent to do bodily harm.

Harry was done, Stepp said before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor. He said he had gone to the Ponderosa Room for dinner, met the Criss brothers at the bar, and after a few friendly words was turned on and struck.

The brothers chased him against a wall, beat him for about a minute and in the process knocked a tooth to the dance floor. Stepp said he went into the restroom and there the attack was renewed until four bystanders forced the brothers to leave.

The cause of the original dispute between the Criss brothers and Stepp never was made clear, but apparently had to do with prize money from a donkey race in a rodeo last summer. Stepp said he

was president of the rodeo association, a civic function. Judge Van Vactor ruled that sufficient evidence was presented to warrant holding the brothers to the grand jury. The defendants were released on \$2,000 bond previously posted.

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Liner Chief Loses Post

NEW YORK (UPI) — The captain of the liner Constitution was beached today on charges by the Coast Guard that he was negligent by going too fast in fog when his ship rammed the Norwegian freighter Jalanta.

Capt. James W. La Belle will be given a hearing on the charges March 25 to determine whether his shipmaster's license should be suspended or revoked.

The charges stemmed from a Coast Guard hearing into the collision. Capt. La Belle said at the hearing he was going 12 to 16 knots with visibility limited by fog when he struck the Jalanta shearing off 100 feet of the freighter's bow.

No one was hurt in the collision, which occurred outside New York Harbor.

American Export Lines said the 49-year-old skipper will remain ashore until the charges are disposed of. The Constitution sails Friday for the Mediterranean with Capt. Hugh L. Switzer on the bridge.

Tax Info Bill Passed By House

SALEM (AP) — The House passed and sent to the governor Wednesday a bill to let the Oregon State Tax Commission exchange confidential information on tax returns with the tax commissions of the states of Washington and Indiana.

The purpose of the bill is to aid the tax commissions of those states in stopping tax evasion. Oregon now has such arrangements with the Federal Bureau of Internal Revenue and 34 other states.

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
