## Timber Sale Set For April

**LAKEVIEW**—The first timber offered for sale from the Fremont National Forest this year is being advertised in the Quartz Mountain area. The offering consists of 175 M board feet of ponderosa pine timber and 70 M board feet of white fir, which will be sold at an oral auction in the local forest office April 13 at 2 p.m. The minimum prices are \$27.95 per M board feet for ponderosa pine, and \$6 per M board feet for white fir.

The primary purpose of this sale is to remove mistletoe-infested mature timber, according to Supervisor Clayton Weaver.

After the overstore of mature timber has been removed, the reproduction that is now growing on the area will be thinned to approximately 12 feet by 12 feet spacing. During this thinning process all of the trees that are presently infested with mistletoe will be removed and thus it is hoped to have the new crop of trees in a healthy condition.

This sale is in the East Klamath Working Circle of Lake County, and is not required to be milled in Lakeview.

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## Local Mission To Host Meet

The Klamath Gospel Mission, in service in Klamath Falls for only one year, will be host March 14 through March 15 for the Northwest Pacific District Conference of the International Union of Gospel Missions. ## SA To Host Public Meet

There will be a public meeting Friday, March 13, at 7:30 p.m. at the Salvation Army Hall where Lt. Col. Harold Littler will speak. A coffee hour will follow the meeting with Colonel and Mrs. Harold Littler.

Lt. Col. Littler comes to the United States with a colorful background of 38 years' Salvation Army service in China and Indonesia.

The colonel was commissioned from the Army's International Training College in London at age 23, and appointed to missionary work in China where he served continuously for 31 years.

There he met his wife, Nellie, who preceded him by three years with a pioneer group as field and regional officer, before the colonel was appointed to Peking for translation and editorial work. The colonel's last appointment in China was editor-in-chief.

At outbreak of the war in 1941, increasing restrictions upon the work of the Salvation Army in China finally resulted in the Littlers, with their two children, being interned in a Japanese concentration camp.

Early in 1947, they returned to North China to help in the rehabilitation of Salvation Army work. Advancing Communists, however, compelled their retreat from Peking. Then Shanghai came under Communist control and in 1951 restrictions and rigid control made the removal of foreign missionaries necessary, with the result that the work of the Salvation Army was turned over to Chinese officers.

In 1951, the colonel was appointed the second in command for all of Indonesia, which presented a door of opportunity among the 84 million people of many cultures, languages, customs, populating the 3,900 islands. His authority embraced 277 officers in 216 centers of operation, with more than 675 civilian employees.
