Groundbreaking ceremonies are slated for 8 a.m. tomorrow for the 93-unit Rickfalls Apartments to be built near Washburn Way between Shasta Way and Pershing Way in suburban Klamath Falls, according to the architects, Morrison & Howard, Williams Bldg. Co., V.K. Construction Co., Eugene, was awarded the contract for construction on its low bid. A detailed cost breakdown, with updated lumber prices, was made by Bob Starbuck at Morrison & Howard the week before the bid opening. He wrote down the figure he came up with, sealed it in an envelope, and the estimate was opened after the bids were enumerated. Starbuck had estimated the cost of the job at \$198,000. Trivette Vlk submitted a bid of \$47,918.

 LAKEVIEW—Vandalism caused considerable damage to Lakeview's community swimming pool, according to report of city police.
