Bob Bonney, Klamath Falls recreation director, March 10 rapped those who label all teen-agers as juvenile delinquents at a meeting of Riverside Parent Teachers Association held in Riverside School cafeteria.

He says statistics prove only three to five per cent of the world's juvenile population are deviants.

"The others, from 13 to 20 years of age are fine, upstanding citizens," he said.

"We, as parents, need to create a sense and an atmosphere of pride, dignity, respect and responsibility to our children, then encourage and enforce it," he added.

Bonney outlined plans for next summer's recreation program. Plans for a day camp to be established at Moore Park are pending arrangement of transportation.

He said archery classes, softball and baseball for boys aged 7 to 16, several teen dances, swimming and water safety classes for teachers and lifeguards (now in progress at Klamath Union High School), and four supervised playgrounds are scheduled.

In addition there will be skin-diving and scuba-diving classes at the municipal swimming pool, tennis on a fixed schedule, track and field events, touch football games, junior and senior basketball games at Pelican Court, hikes twice weekly and six swimming instructions.

The business meeting was conducted by Mrs. Irvin Whitt, president. On the agenda was a letter from the Oregon Legislature informing of a new bill pending to place jurisdiction of juvenile offenders under circuit court, rather than local courts.

MONTAGUE—Since California's Arbor Day is observed on March 7 in commemoration of Luther Burbank, it was an appropriate theme for the meeting of the Shasta Valley Garden Club held Friday afternoon, March 6, at the home of Mrs. Haldie Ralston in Graceland, who was assisted with hostess duties by her daughter, Mrs. Betty Cook, and Mrs. Mary Lemos, both of Montague.

Following the general order of business conducted by the club president, Mrs. Henrietta Terwilliger, Mrs. Rae Sylvia, who had been named to present the program for the afternoon, related the story of Arbor Day. She told how the day was originated in 1872 in Nebraska, by Julius Sterling Morton, secretary of Agriculture under President Cleveland. Morton deplored the fact that his state was treeless, and that in other parts of the country, destruction of timber areas had been widespread.

Mrs. Agnes Swigart, a member of the garden club, disclosed that her mother-in-law, the late Mrs. Roy Swigart was a friend of Morton and his family, and she displayed several old photographs of him and his family.

In participating in a conservation program, Shasta Valley Garden Club members donate pennies toward the fund "Pennies For Pines," the contributions being mailed to the Garden Club state president, Della Harris, who in turn sends it to the U.S. Forest Service fund for the planting of new pines.

Mrs. Haldie Ralston, who had been named to be in charge of the "Now Is The Time" portion of the program, told members that "Now is the time to transplant shrubs, plant hardy annuals, burn trash and spray plants, trees and shrubs."

During the business session, Mrs. Mary Lilly, chairman of garden therapy, reported that flowers had been sent to Mrs. Nora Gregory, who has been ill, and a patient in the Siskiyou County General Hospital for several weeks; that sympathy cards had been mailed to Mrs. Glenn Perry and Mrs. Bert Smith; and a flower was presented to Mrs. William S. Miss Renay was indicted on five counts of perjury Thursday in connection with her testimony before a federal grand jury investigating the source of Cohen's income.



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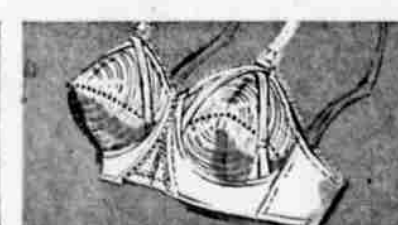
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4-H NEWS

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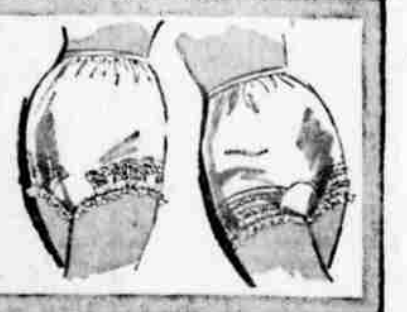
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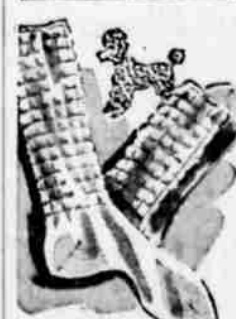
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
