



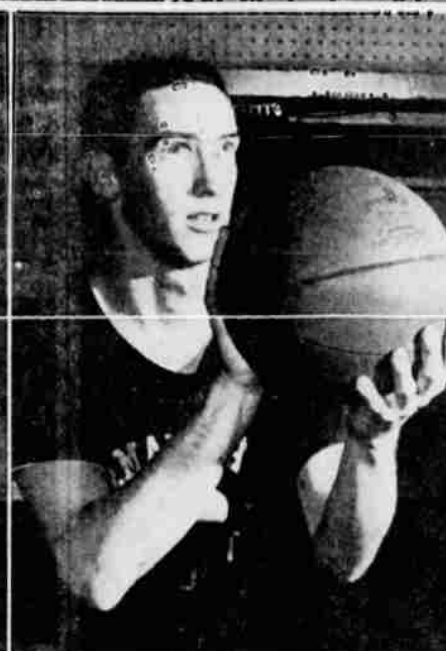

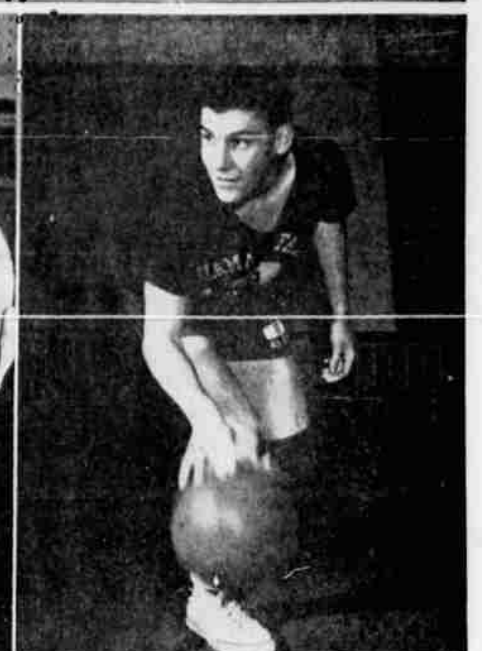

A-1 Prep Tournament Opener Pits KUHS Pelicans, Astoria Fishermen

Tonight's State A-1 Prep tournament opener finds the Astoria Fishermen marking their 34th tourney start over the years of the annual competition while the Klamath Union Pelicans are making entrance No. 19.

The game, figured by many to be one of the highlights of the entire tournament, starts at 7:30 p.m. and pits a pair of squads that have been among the top poll choices during the entire 1938-39 season.

The Pelicans, who won the coveted state title in 1938, entered the tournament riding in the No. 2 slot last year as compared to the No. 3 position this season.

The Fishermen won by a close margin over North Salem, the No. 2 team, and third-ranked Klamath Falls.

Jefferson of Portland, which plays unranked Sandy in the second night contest, held onto No. 4 spot. And Marshfield, which takes on unranked St. Helens to open the Wednesday program, is fifth, as it was last week.

Medford, which will play Beaverton Wednesday afternoon, advanced to No. 6, replacing the Pendleton Buckaroos, who slipped a notch to seventh place.

Pendleton meets Bend, which dropped from No. 8 to ninth, in the final game of the first round Wednesday night.

Franklin, which gained a tournament spot by defeating 1938 state runnerup Grant for its eighth straight victory, gained No. 8.
