

Tennessee Stater Heads UPI Team

NEW YORK (UPI)—Dick Barnett of Tennessee State's NAIA basketball champions today headed the United Press International small college All-America team for the second straight year.

Barnett, a senior who will be drafted this month by one of the National Basketball Association's professional clubs, was the only repeater from last year's team. Always good and superb under pressure, Barnett led Coach John McLendon's Tigers to an unprecedented third straight NAIA title last Saturday night.

Ed Smallwood of Evansville (Ind.) College's newly-crowned NCAA small college champions; Paul Wilcox, small college scoring champion from Davis, and Elkins (W.Va.); Jackie Moreland of Louisiana Tech and Chuck Curtis of Pacific Lutheran (Wash.) rounded out the first team.

Mel Peterson of Wheaton (Ill.), Hugh Ahlring of Evansville, Jack Israel of Southwest (Mo.) State, Kelly Coleman of Kentucky Wesleyan and Tony Nicodemus of St. Michael's (Vt.) won second team berths.

The third team was composed of Joe Cotton of North Carolina A&T, Dennis Boone of Regis (Colo.), Leo Hill of Los Angeles State, Paul Nenes of Hope (Mich.) (La.).

The teams were selected with the help of the nationwide Board of Coaches which rated the small college teams for UPI during the '58-'59 season.

COOS BAY (AP)—Newport and Milton-Freewater will meet tonight on the Marshfield High School court for the Oregon A-2 prep basketball championship.

The two teams advanced with Tuesday night victories—Newport 55-43 over Philomath and Milton-Freewater 66-51 over Coquille.

The title game will be at 8:45 p.m. Philomath and Coquille meet at 7:30 p.m. for third place.

Junction City and Stayton will play in the afternoon for consolation honors. Junction City upset Myrtle Creek 61-43 and Stayton beat Seaside 56-44 in Tuesday's action in the losers' bracket.

The lead changed hands frequently as Coquille and Milton-Freewater fought it out for the berth in the final period.

Then Milton Freewater scored 11 points and held Coquille to 15. Coquille then turned the tables and scored 15 while Milton-Freewater got 11. Coquille led 46-41 at the end of the third quarter, but caved in the final period.

Gary Bogle of Milton-Freewater was high for the game with 25 points. Don Purvis led the losers with 16.

Philomath was ahead 13-8 at the end of the first quarter in the opening night game. Philomath would have had an even larger margin, but missed 10 straight free throws.

Newport took over in the second quarter and was never headed.

Newport sank 17 free throws to 7 for Philomath. But the winners sank only one more field goal.

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Portland Trades For Greengrass

PORTLAND (AP)—The Portland Beavers Tuesday night swapped a pitcher for a veteran outfielder, the Oregonian said today.

In a dispatch from Portland's training camp at Brawley, Calif., sports editor L. H. Gregory said he learned that the Beavers sent pitcher Bob Garber to Sacramento in return for outfielder Jim Greengrass.

"None of the Beaver officials," said Gregory, "would comment on the deal, but it was learned that it is in the bag and the involved players will switch sides at once."

"According to our information, it was an even-up trade, with no cash involved," he added.

Garber last season had a 3-10 record and appeared in 45 games. Greengrass, who spent five years in the major leagues, hit .250 last season with Sacramento.

Schoendienst Loss Causes Woe

BRADENTON, Fla. (UPI)—The Milwaukee Braves didn't win a pennant until they came up with a top-drawer second baseman and it is entirely possible they won't win this year unless they can obtain another one.

In short, the Braves' chances of winning their third straight National League title depend largely on finding a first-class second baseman to fill the shoes of Red Schoendienst, who may be out the whole season recuperating from a siege of tuberculosis.

Until the Braves acquired Schoendienst from the Giants during the 1957 season, they could only make a pass at the pennant but never quite win it. With him in the lineup, however, they won the past two years and even beat the Yankees in the 1957 World Series.

Manager Fred Haney and all the other Braves officials profess not to be worried about the second base problem, where Mel Roach is the leading candidate to take over for Schoendienst. Felix Mantilla and Casey Wise are the reserves. The only hitch is that Roach still limps slightly from a torn ligament he suffered last season and there is a question whether he can open the season at second base.

"Sure we have some ifs," Haney admitted. "Like Wes Covington's knee, Bill Bruton's knee and Roach. I'm not worried, though, about any of those ifs."

The seven he ticked off are Warren Spahn, recognized as one of the best left-handers of modern baseball; Lew Burdette; Carlton Willey; Bob Rush; Juan Pizarro; Joey Jay and Bob Buhl. That leaves him for relief Don McMahon. Bob Trowbridge, Humberto Robinson and possibly Gene Conley when he gets through playing basketball for the Boston Celtics.

"After all, we have more pitching depth than any club in the league and I think we have the strongest bench, too. Bruton showed in the World Series that he can do the job for us and all the reports I get on Covington are good."

Haney said he has seven pitchers "who may not be the top ones in the league but who would be starters on any other club in the league."

Except for second base, Haney has no particular worry in the infield. He has Eddie Mathews at third base, Johnny Logan at shortstop and Joe Adcock and Frank Torre at first. Both Mathews and Logan had had years last season but Haney says he's not worried about their ability to come back.

Milwaukee's catching is set with Del Crandall, the No. 1 man, and Del Rice, a polished receiver, behind him. Rookie Bob Taylor, the \$102,000 bonus boy, can make the club if Haney decides to go with three catchers.

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
