Associate Heads Named For 1960 U-F Campaign

Thayne Cole and James Monteith of Klamath Falls Tuesday were appointed associate chairmen of the 1960 Klamath County United Fund-Red Cross drive.

The announcement was made at a luncheon meeting in the Pelican Hotel by Paul Cruikshank, named March 9, 1960 chairman of UF. He and associates, UF President Richard Gallagher, Admittance, Budget and Quota Committee, Chairman Frank Ganong, and

Executive Secretary Rex M. Dye mapped preliminary campaign strategy at the meeting.

Cole will be in charge of public relations. He is Klamath Falls and Bly manager of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company. Cole was an associate chairman during last year's campaign.

Monteith will spearhead a drive to obtain donations from firms hiring 100 employees or more. His job, under Cruikshank's plan, will start in May.

Oscars Given By British

LONDON (UPI) — Britain's film industry passed out its own academy awards Wednesday night but most of them to British films and movie personalities.

"Room At The Top," which was shown for only three days during 1958, collected awards for the best film of the year, the best British film, and the best foreign actress in the person of Simone Signoret of France.

"Orders To Kill," a British thriller, also collected three awards: Irene Worth as the best British actress, Paul Dehn as the best British screen writer, and Paul Massie as the most promising newcomer.

Trevor Howard was named the best British actor for his role in "The Key."

Other awards included: Sidney Poitier, best foreign actor, in "The Defiant Ones." "The Defiant Ones" as the film best illustrating one or more principles of the U. S. character.

"Glass," a Dutch film, best documentary.

"The Little Island," English, best animated film.

EPIDEMIC

MEXICO CITY (AP) — More than 5,000 of the Mexican capital's 25,000 schoolteachers are stricken with respiratory ailments in an epidemic blamed on dust storms.

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Prolific Easter Bunny To Work At Moore Park

A mighty prolific Easter bunny is going to go to work at Moore Park Easter Sunday.

He is going to plant about 6,000 eggs for Klamath Basin youngsters from 1 to 15 years old to find.

About 90 of the eggs are going to be lucky as well as tasty. They will contain numbers good for prizes donated by local drugstore and variety stores.

The fabled rabbit's visit will be sponsored by the Klamath Falls 20-30 Club and by grocers who are going to donate the goodies.

The eggs will be gathered Monday by 20-30 members. They'll be

boiled in a vat at Klamath Falls Creamery, then taken to the country fairgrounds for prettying-up by club members and their wives.

Then the bunny will go to work. He'll fling the eggs around the park lawns near the alfalfa flats for children 1 to 3 years old, and he will scatter them around the flat for children 3 to 7.

Older youngsters will have to work a little harder. For the 7 to 11 group, eggs will be hidden behind the bear cages in the park, and they will really be hard to find for 11 to 15 year-olds whose hunting grounds will be on a nearby hillside.

Members of the club will have a loudspeaker on hand to direct the children, while members of the Klamath Falls police force will herd cars.

All hunts start at noon. They will culminate in about 15 minutes what took the club a week and a half to prepare, one member lamented.

But the animal hunt is proving so attractive to youngsters that it's worth it. Last year's hunt, the eighth in as many years, drew 1,500 children — even in blustery weather.

Cooperative's Growth Told

LAPINE — The growth of Midstate Electric Cooperative was reported here Monday by president Bill Taylor of Chemult and manager George M. Larimer at the 11th annual meeting.

Operations for 1958 showed a revenue increase of 9.5 per cent with expenses increasing only 1.7 per cent according to Taylor. REAs are \$20,000 in advance. In 1958, \$30,000 was paid on the \$2,468,000 loan.

Larimer reported a membership of 958, with 1.6 consumers per mile. The national per mile average is 2.7.

With 39 irrigation pumps in the Fort Rock Valley in 1957, the number increased to 51 in 1958 and there should be 82 in operation this season, according to the manager.

Significant is the fact that the same personnel have served the cooperative in both the office and maintenance departments for three years. Gwen Parker was added to the office staff in 1958.

A crew of five maintains 574 miles of line. After the recent one day of lost time the 100,000 hour record was set. It takes such a small crew three years to earn a 50,000 hour award.

Speakers at the session included Lee Wooden of Vernonia, president of the Oregon Rural Electric Cooperative Association, reporting on current national and state legislation affecting cooperatives.

Judge D. L. Penhollow, George Baker and Fred Shepherd, comprising the Deschutes County Court, attended and spoke briefly. Bob Cole of Burns and John Norlin, Redmond, brought greetings from their cooperatives.

Entertainment was provided by Mel Gustafson of Eugene. Gwen Parker and Marian "Sonny" Morehouse played accordion selections. Richard Jessup, Chemult; G. W. Osborn and E. B. Stumbaugh of Crescent were elected to three year terms.

The 1958 officers will continue to serve. They are Bill Taylor, president; Merrill (Bud) Parks, Fort Rock, vice president, and G. W. Osborn, secretary.

The noon luncheon was served by ladies of the La Pine Home Extension Unit.

Carpenters Told To Accept Offer

There was no immediate comment from Portland union leaders on whether they would follow suit.

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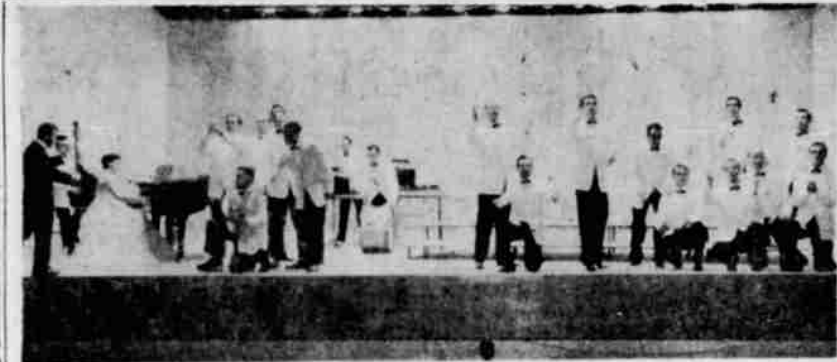
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Tulelake Pupils Win Prizes
