## Major Timber Companies To Share Reforestation

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP)—All major timber companies in British Columbia this spring will share in a large reforestation program to replenish the province's exploited forests. A 600-man team will hand-plant some 8,500,000 seedlings on more than 10,000 acres of logged-off or burned-over forest land on the coast and in the interior. Most matured timber stands have been felled, many by "cut-and-run" operators who didn't leave behind so much as a single seed tree for regeneration. There are vast reserves of lower quality forests left, but they are located mostly in inaccessible regions, far from population and production centers, making exploitation operations uneconomical. B. C. is a high cost producer, facing tough competition from countries closer to markets and which have already embarked on forest cultivation programs. In order to stay in competition, B. C. must put back in production the cut-over forest lands which founded the vital forest industry, and resurrect the once-productive, accessible areas on Vancouver Island and the lower mainland which are close to conversion plants and markets. While irresponsible operators have annihilated some stands and non-productive alder and willow have invaded others, mother nature hasn't provided a decent Douglas fir cone crop on the coast since 1945. With an average rotation period of 90 years on the coast, the lack of a good cone crop means a great loss in the volume of timber which will be available for felling in future, unless reforestation programs are promoted. One-foot high, two-year-old seedlings are planted carefully on land that has been slash-burned to reduce fire hazard and to prepare the site for planting. The two biggest hazards seedlings face are drought and deer.

## Suit Cites KF Medics

Two Klamath Falls doctors have been accused in a damage suit of leaving a sponge inside a patient after a hernia operation. The suit against Dr. Raymond Tice and Dr. William Holford Jr. maintains they left a sponge in the abdomen of Harold F. Mininger during an operation January 31, 1958. Dr. Tice performed the operation with the assistance of Dr. Holford, the suit claims. Mininger maintained that an abscess in his abdomen burst in July of that year, requiring a further operation. He seeks \$506 expenses for the second operation plus \$60,000 general damages. Other suits on file: H. and Louise H. Myers have filed a stockholders' suit against Koreanian Importing Company. They maintain that John Koreanian, the company president, "has used money and properties of the corporation for his own benefit" and that "the corporation's assets are being misapplied and wasted." The Myers, who own 100 of 1225 authorized shares, ask that the corporation be placed in receivership and its assets liquidated. Wesley and Carol Franklin seek from Edward and Helen Cornwall payments of \$773 and \$119 said due from a \$4,800 sale of two lots in the Hot Springs Addition of Klamath Falls, or foreclosure on the property. Jean P. Pense seeks \$5,000 damages from Freeman and Zona Jean Kelley, operators of Toppers Tavern on Weyerhaeuser Road, alleging that Zona Jean hit her on the head with a beer bottle in the tavern January 18. Electrical Products Corporation of Oregon seeks \$33 rental plus \$1,325 balance due for a neon sign installed at Lee's Drive In by Gilmore Sign Service, for which Electrical Products said Lee's has made no payment since September 1958.

## Order Halts Picketing

SEATTLE (AP)—A restraining order issued late Thursday halted picketing of the Smyth Van and Storage Co. and the Martin Van Lines, Inc., here by three members of the Hawaiian Teamsters and Allied Workers' Union local 996. The pickets, complete with signs and grass skirts, arrived in Seattle in a move to extend a Honolulu dispute with the Smyth Hawaiian Van Lines and Martin Overseas Van Lines. Two pickets marched before two Smyth locations here. Another picketed a Martin place of business. The picketing stopped all deliveries by members of Seattle Teamsters Local 174. Carl A. Jonson, attorney for Smyth Van and Storage, obtained a restraining order from Superior Court Judge Story Birdseye. A hearing was ordered before Superior Court Judge Hugh C. Todd next Tuesday. Officials of the two Seattle firms said their operations are under the same ownership as their counterparts in Hawaii but are two different operations. ## Truck Merger Plans Told

POCATELLO, Idaho (AP)—Plans for a merger of two trucking firms that could make the surviving Garrett Freight Lines, Inc., one of the West's largest trucking firms were announced Thursday. The merger involves Northwest Freight Lines, Inc., of Billings, Mont. C. A. Garrett, president and general manager of the Pocatello firm, said the move is subject to approval by the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Montana Board of Railroad Commissioners. He said his firm has already begun moves to acquire Island Motor Freight Co. of Spokane and its Seattle subsidiary, Pacific Highway Transport. This action also must be approved by the ICC and state regulatory bodies. The combined asset of Garrett, the company president said, will be more than 16 million dollars after the four-way merger and its annual revenue will be about 28 million dollars. More than 2,000 vehicles are operated by the four firms, employing about 2,500 persons. Northwest operates between Spokane, Wash., and Minneapolis-St. Paul, Minn. Routes connect at Butte and Helena, Mont. All of the company's present personnel will be retained, Garrett said.

## Palm Sunday Rites Listed

Palm Sunday in Peace Memorial Church will include several services including infant baptism at both the 9:30 a.m. and 11 a.m. worship services. The Rev. F. L. Raney will speak on "The Closing of a Triumphant Life." The three youth choirs will bring the musical interlude with the junior choir wearing new choir robes for the first time. Between the two worship services in the morning there will be a Church School Fair in Westminster Hall. At 7:30 p.m. the senior Westminster Fellowship will again be in charge of the Service of Tenebrae, the ancient liturgical service of shadows in which candles symbolizing the Light of the World will be extinguished one by one, until only one light, the Light of God's Love is left burning. This candle symbolizing the three days in the tomb is removed but returns, heralding the Resurrection morning. Members and friends of the church are invited to attend the Maundy Thursday service at 7:45 p.m. Thursday, March 26. New members will be publicly received at this time. The adult choir will sing selections from "Olive to Calvary." The Sacrament of Holy Communion will follow.

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
