

California Slips By WVU, 71-70, To Win NCAA Title

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—California won its first National Collegiate basketball championship Saturday night, beating West Virginia 71-70 as Darral Imhoff reeled from goat to hero in the last 30 seconds of a frenzied showdown.

It was the first title for a Pacific Coast Conference champion since Stanford won in 1942.

Imhoff, a 6-10 towhead, seemed to have committed the honor of boners when with 50 seconds left and Cal leading 69-66, he was called for goal-tending on a lay-in shot by West Virginia's great Jerry West.

The officials allowed the field goal and, only one point behind, West Virginia promptly tied up Imhoff and had a big chance to gain possession of the ball on the jump.

That's when Imhoff started making up for his two lapses. He got the tip and, with 17 seconds to play, his tip-in basket clinched the victory for the Golden Bears of Pete Newell.

The fielder made it 71-68 in Cal's favor and Willie Akers' lay-in for West Virginia five seconds before the buzzer was wasted.

West Virginia's consolation was a 28-point performance by West, enabling him to tie the five-game tournament record of 160 points set in 1956 by Hal Lear of Temple. Cincinnati nailed third place, whipping Louisville 98-85 in the consolation opener as All-America

Oscar Robertson scored 39 points for an all-time major college two-season record of 1,962.

Winding up his second varsity year with the Bearcats, Oscar's two-year total smashed the mark

New Car Exchange Success

SEBRING, Fla. (AP)—Phil Hill and Oliver Gendebien drove one Ferrari until it broke down, then switched to another of the fiery red Italian cars and roared on to victory in the 12-hour Florida International 12-hour sports car endurance race Saturday night.

Gendebien, the Belgian ace, was at the wheel when the car flashed across the finish line at 10 p.m. after a brutal speed battle made more dangerous by a two-hour rain that laid a sheet of water over the concrete course.

Another Ferrari, piloted by French driving champ Jean Behra, was the second.

Ferrari and the rugged little Porsche of Germany swept the board after the threat of the English Lister-Jaguars and Aston-Martins faded early in the race.

The 5.2-mile Sebring course with its many sharp corners took a heavy toll of brakes and gears.

Sixty-five cars started but when the grueling test ended, a score of them were broken down in their pits.

One of the British Lister-Jaguars, driven by the British champion, Stirling Moss, broke down after taking the lead five hours after the race started.

Moss was shifted to another Lister Jag but the car was far behind.

Aston-Martin's lone entry from the British factory went out with mechanical troubles in the fourth hour.

Dozens of spins were reported on the rain-slickened track but there were no serious accidents.

Moss' car broke down only a few minutes after he whipped into first place.

Tiberetta, who finished second a year ago, came in fourth. All the others either fell or pulled up in the spectacular but dangerous scramble over the 30 fences on the famous 4-mile, 854-yard course.

"He doesn't like other horses," explained Mike Scudamore, top Irish jockey who rode Oxo.

Girl Court Squad's Origination Related
The All-American Red Heads, world's champion professional girls basketball team was originated and organized in 1936 by "Ole" Olson, coach-owner and feature star of the world famous "Ole's Terrible Swedes." "Ole" Olson, originator and the greatest exponent of backhand passing the game of basketball has ever known, was thrilling audiences all over America with his antics, fabulous backhand passing, behind back shooting, and basketball wizardry long before the new fabulous Harlem Globe Trotters were ever heard of. Twenty-two years as a coach-player, hooking agent, publicity man with the Swedes made "Ole" a legend in the history of early exhibition basketball.

The Swedes were taken off the road in 1935, and in their place came a team that was destined to be recognized all over the basketball world, year in, year out, as the greatest girls' team in the annals of girls' basketball. This team, was to become known as the All-American Red Heads.

Mrs. Doyle Olson, wife of the legendary "Ole" Olson, had a chain of beauty salons operated in the Ozark area of and near Cassville, Missouri. Girls basketball being a very popular sport, the girls who worked for Mrs. Olson formed a basketball team. Two members were red heads, the other members were not, so in order to have a more striking appearance the girls as a prank, with the aid of henna, all became red heads. From their first appearance the "Cassville Red Heads" was an attraction with box office appeal.

Requests for games poured in. Before the 1935 season was over the "Cassville Red Heads" became known as the "Missouri Red Heads." The "Missouri Red Heads" was an amateur team. C. M. "Ole" Olson, attraction wise as he was, immediately knew he had a hit attraction and the following year a team was put on the road as the "Red Heads." All players were red headed. Then came the change to All-American Red Heads as many, many national AAU stars of all-American status were added to the Red Heads roster. Hence the "All-American Red Heads."

In 1950 C. M. "Ole" Olson obtained a copyright in sports and no athletic amusement, entertainment, may use the term red heads without the consent of the management of the All-American Red Heads, and today the All-American Red Heads is the only copyrighted team in the history of girls basketball. In fact only two teams in basketball have copyrights, these two are the Harlem Globe Trotters and the All-American Red Heads.

In 1948, C. M. Olson hired a high school coach and his wife to manage and play with his western unit of the famous red heads. These two people were Orwell and Lorene Moore of Caraway, Arkansas. In 1949 Orwell and Lorene Moore were to move up to the main club; 1950, the All-American Red Heads were to set an all time record. The Red Heads won 129 games out of 169 played.

In 1953 the Red Heads were to surpass this with 134 wins, all against men—which stands as an all time high. Last year the All-American Red Heads won 127 games. Since 1935 the All-American Red Heads have not failed to win at least 100 games or more each season.

In 1955 Coach Orwell Moore bought the All-American Red Heads from Olson, who at the present time is retired and residing at his beautiful "Rancho La Fonda" on Grand Lake in Oklahoma. The All-American Red Heads were moved to Caraway, Arkansas in the spring of 1955. And at present the adopted home of "All-American Red Heads" is Caraway, Arkansas.

MAUCH GETS AWARD
DENVER, Colo. (P)—Gene Mauch of the Minneapolis Millers has been named the American Assn.'s baseball manager of 1958. Mauch received the honor in the voting by sports writers in the Class AAA league. Mauch, 35, guided the Millers to the Junior World Series championship. The 1958 campaign was his first as manager of a Triple A club. The Millers had one of the lightest-hitting teams, batting last in the American Assn. with a .248 average.

NEW YORK (AP)—St. John's won an unprecedented third National Invitational Basketball Tournament Saturday with a dramatic 76-71 uphill overtime victory over Bradley.

The Redmen from New York put on a great second-half rally after falling behind by seven points to pull to a 63-63 deadlock at the end of the regulation time.

A crowd of 14,376 in Madison Square Garden yelled itself hoarse when St. John's snapped a 65-65 deadlock in the overtime on two free throws by Gus Alferi.

But in the final analysis it was sophomore Tony Jackson who was the big man for Coach Joe Lapchick's men. He hit for 21 points and snatched 27 rebounds.

Jackson added two more free throws after Alferi and the Redmen were four points in front of the top-seeded Braves.

Bobby Joe Mason cut the deficit to two points with just 1:26 of the overtime left. Half a minute later, Jackson grabbed a rebound for the Redmen and the clock showed exactly 30 seconds to go.
