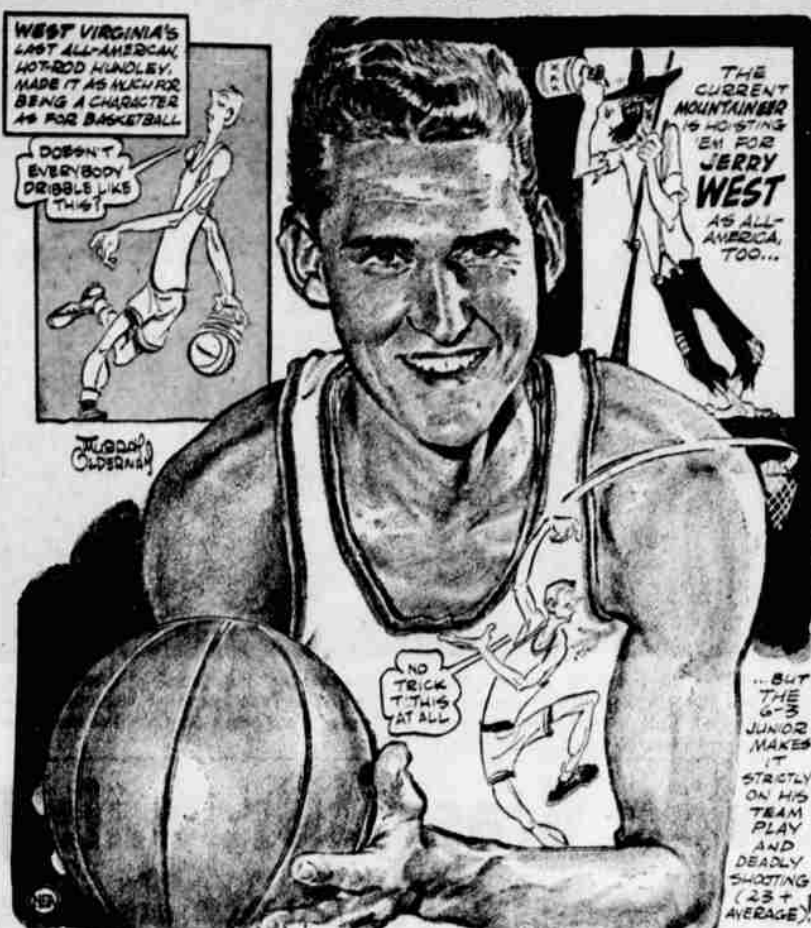

NEW YORK (UPI)—Fearless Fraley's facts and figures: It has become evident today what a trend has been started by "Sports Shirt Bill" Veeck and "Tieless Ted" Williams.

The National Association of Shirt, Pajama and Sportswear Manufacturers reports that production of dress and business shirts skidded to 5,987,000 dozens compared with the high of 12,500,000 dozens in 1947. But sports shirt output last year totaled 14,099,000 dozens—70 per cent of all shirt output compared with 27 per cent in 1947. No announcement on pajamas vs. nothing.

Cal Bears Beat Cincinnati; West Leads WV To Finals

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—California and its rock-ribbed defense went against West Virginia and Jerry West, the most prolific scorer in tournament history, for the NCAA basketball title at Freedom Hall Saturday night.

The two conference titans, California of the Pacific Coast and West Virginia of the Southern, met in the blue chips game Saturday night, following a consolation match for third place between Cincinnati and Louisville.

Neither California nor West Virginia has won an NCAA title. The big question was whether California's opportunistic can contain the magnificent All-American from West Virginia the way they handled Cincinnati's Oscar Robertson in Friday night's semifinals.

They held Robertson, national scoring champion the last two years, to 19 points and even nullified his play-making in the second half while rallying for a 64-58 victory.

West, a handsome 6-3 junior from little Cabin Creek, W. Va., a great player all season—has reached his peak in the tournament. Friday night he earned a standing ovation from the partisan crowd of 18,619 after a brilliant 38-point show in a romping 94-79 victory over Louisville.

In four tournament games, West has fired in 132 points—a 33 point pace. He needed 29 Saturday night to smash the five-game NCAA record.

Ron Delany Takes 33rd Indoor Win

CLEVELAND (AP)—Ron Delany won his 33rd straight indoor mile race, but had a close call Friday night when Hungary's Istvan Rozsavolgyi pounded up to the finish line only a step or so behind.

The time of 4:06.6 disappointed the 9,330 fans at the Knights of Columbus track meet who had turned out in hopes of seeing Delany's world record time of 4:01.4 lowered.

But when the early pace was too slow, neither Roz nor the Irishman from Villanova wanted to perk it up. Roz led by a yard with two laps to go. They were abreast starting the gun lap. Then Delany opened up and grabbed a 10-yard lead.

But Roz wasn't quitting and came back at Ron with a desperate burst of speed that just missed. Delany ran the last quarter in 59.4 seconds.

The big thrills were provided by another Hungarian, Lázló Tabori, and a local boy, Dave Mills, now a Purdue freshman.

Tabori ran the third fastest indoor two-mile (8:47.8), cracked Greg Rice's 16-year-old meet record by more than three seconds and soundly whipped Al Lawrence. The latter is an Australian from the University of Houston who two weeks ago set the world record (8:46.8).

Mills, who wasn't considered in the same class with the other runners in the 600-yard run, sped by three swift runners—Pitt's Mel Barnwell, Nick Ellis of Morgan State and Josh Curbath, the national indoor champion.

The castoffs— Hoyt Wilhelm and Ernie Johnson—have indicated by their clever hurling that at age 36 and 35, respectively, they still can be effective.

Wilhelm and Johnson both have been vital cogs for pennant-winning clubs in the past. Hoyt with the then New York Giants and Johnson with Milwaukee's Braves. Knuckleballer Wilhelm and speed-balling Johnson, who laid their claim to fame as relief specialists, combined to shut out St. Louis 3-0 Friday for the Orioles' fourth consecutive victory.

Tourist In Tie For Lead

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—Much to everyone's surprise, including his own, a young driving range operator from Danvers, Mass., who is vacationing here, was in a three-way tie for the lead as the second round of the \$15,000 St. Petersburg Open Golf Tournament started Saturday.

The best competitive round ever played, Tom Mahan Jr. lurched as he turned in a sparkling six-under-par 66 in the first round to tie big George Bayer of Glen Eagles, Ill., and Tony Lema of San Leandro, Calif., both seasoned tournament pros.

That Bayer should be right up there was not surprising. The Lakewood course was mushy from the heavy rain which forced postponement from Thursday. It put a premium on carry, and Bayer is the most prodigious hitter among the operating pros.

Lema could be up there, as he has shown himself capable of fine rounds. But young Mahan's presence at the top was astonishing. His father also played, carding a 74.

Despite the sudden terrain, scores were remarkably low. Forty-one pros broke par, and 60 were par or better.

Behind the three co-leaders at 67 was Mike Dietz of Paradise, Fla., and five players were tied at 68, and six at 69.

NEW YORK (AP)—Tony Anthony's fans have become a fidgety band of nail-biters. Even in the victory, the New York light heavyweight challenger makes nervous wrecks of his rosters.

Such was the case again Friday night when tall Tony outpointed ever-pressing Sonny Ray of Chicago in a television ten-rounder at Madison Square Garden. It was the 24-year-old Anthony's second straight decision over the 23-year-old, fifth ranking contender.

But Tony's followers had another case of jitters when their idol almost blew a big lead and seemed headed for a knockout defeat in the last round. Tony heard two bells at the end of the frantic round which gives you an idea of how rough things had become for him.

Only a knockout could have given Ray, a 13-5 underdog, the win at that final stage. Sonny almost made it. Midway in the round, the 5-11 Chicagoan staggered his 6-1 opponent with a left and right to the jaw. Tony was dazed but he managed to hang on. Seconds later he was firing back.

Then Ray again nailed Tony with a left and right to the jaw. Anthony dropped his hands and stood there back at Ray. Sonny ment and then perked for a moment. But the final bell sounded before he could punch.

"I thought the bell had sounded when I turned away from him," said Anthony. "Lucky for me the bell did sound right quick."

The three officials had Anthony the winner by the following scores: Referee Ruby Goldstein, 8-2; Judge Frank Forbes, 6-3-1; and Judge Tony Castellano, 6-4. The AP card had Anthony ahead, 8-2.
