

Logging 'Revolution' Still In Progress

The lumber industry in Oregon is undergoing a revolution.

That is the conclusion of the Oregon Committee of American Forest Products Industries.

It's a move toward forest management and mechanical harvesting of a natural resource only lately regarded as a crop—just like wheat, potatoes and alfalfa.

That's in sharp contrast to the old days when "slash and burn" was the timber baron's philosophy and when "Swedish steam," or muscle power, felled and moved big timber.

Modern logging began in the late 1800s when big steam "donkey"

engines replaced ox teams and companies punched railroads into the timber country.

The men who run the lumber industry say today's diesel tractors, log trucks and chain saws are by no means the revolution's end product.

Some innovations the industry expects to develop are helicopter logging methods and "super trees," genetically developed.

Most important at present is the tree farm concept that in some measure will keep forests producing indefinitely.

Recognizing timber as a high-yield crop, tree farmers are taking advantage of volumes of forest research sponsored in recent years

by forest protective agencies such as state and federal forest services and organized lumber companies.

They assault forest fire like a hay farmer goes after grasshoppers. They try to keep damaging insects out of the woods, and they keep a weather eye peeled for timber diseases.

Selective cutting increases the board-foot-per-acre rate of growth. Trimming excess branches gives more clear lumber when a tree is harvested.

The tree farm program, sponsored east of the Cascades by the Western Pine Association and west of the mountains by the Industrial Forestry Association, has spread over four million Oregon acres.

Officials of the two organizations say timber growth is on the upswing just about everywhere in the state. They say they expect to see 50,000 additional jobs and an annual payroll in excess of a billion dollars generated by the industry in Oregon and Washington.

Sixty-three per cent of Oregon's industrial workers are affiliated with the lumber industry at present. The industry employs 87,000 workers, and thousands of others are employed by related industries, according to reports.

Oregon claims about one fifth of the nation's sawtimber supply and for the past 20 years has led all other states in timber production.

Scalping Dates To 1492, 'Old Timer' Tells Historians

YREKA—"The white man has a century and a half of scalp hunting before he ever reached the western frontier—and it is alleged that James Kirker, an Irishman, took more scalps than any white man known, and he did it for money."

So said W. H. "Old Hutch" Hutchinson of Chico when he appeared as guest speaker before approximately 100 members and guests of the Siskiyou County Historical Society recently.

Following the formal opening of the meeting in the county museum in Yreka, the president, J. M. "Jude" White, introduced the program chairman for the afternoon, Fred Meamber Jr.

Meamber made a few brief introductory remarks relative to "Old Hutch," outlining his career as a writer and lecturer on western Americana, before introducing the speaker to the audience.

Hutch proceeded to entertain his audience with innumerable tales, interspersed with hilarious anecdotes, on scalp hunting as it was practiced from the days of when "the first Pilgrim skinned his knees scrambling over the Plymouth Rock," that it actually dated back to 1492, which in those days with the prevalence of scalp hunting by "our Indians," was almost mystically religious, and it was later dominated by the white man's magic—money! According to Hutch scalp bounties brought in as much as \$136 for the scalp of a male, while \$50 was the top offer for those of women and children.

James Kirker, said Hutch, during the early days in Santa Fe,

collected scalps for the Mexican government, and he is credited with having taken 487 scalps, when the Mexican government decided "it would be cheaper to put him on the payroll than pay him by piece work."

Old Hutch spiced his statistical remarks with many clever innuendoes, edged in when expected, and once when speaking of a noted author, he referred to him as an "authentic liar," explaining that an "authentic liar" is one who knows what he is lying about," which brought an appreciable roar of laughter from his listeners.

Old Hutch also spoke briefly on Stephen Meek, who in 1840 was blazing the trail of Santa Fe, and said Old Hutch, "Meek was blazing the real Santa Fe Trail, which

originally ran from Chihuahua City to Santa Fe, the one that runs from Santa Fe to Missouri is just a junction line."

During the business session, conducted by the president, various reports of committees were made, which included a report from Frank Herzog, current curator, who told of several additional items recently presented or loaned to the society and museum and were now on display. He also announced that Miss Emma Luttrell had contributed a copy of her book, "Our Gentle West," to the museum library.

Helen Foulke, pioneer biographer chairman, announced that she had received several additional biographies from new members in the Grenada area, and she also announced that the California His-

torical Society was to hold a conference in Stockton on April 10, 11 and 12, which event would feature a ride down the San Joaquin River.

Bernice Meamber, publications chairman and editor for the next publication of the society, announced that material was being placed in the hands of the printer next week and would be distributed to paid up members of the society as soon as printing was completed.

Mrs. Meamber also mentioned that the temporary appointment of Harold Tuttle, as secretary treasurer would end as of April 1. She stated that the board has been seeking the services of a man to take over the position, which requires a man with knowledge of bookkeeping and typing.

Joe Wales, chairman of the museum board of governors, was called upon to report on activities of the board. Mrs. Brenda Gamble, secretary to the board, read the minutes of the previous meeting as a report.

It was recommended that instead of the society producing two publications a year, the Yearbook and The Siskiyou Pioneer, the two should be compiled into one book a year. After some discussion, members voted in favor of consolidating the two books into one larger and better book a year.

Floyd Merrill, vice president of the society, presented new amendments to the society's constitution, which he had drawn up, pertaining to the consolidation of the society's board of directors and the museum board of governors into one body, with the members voting in favor of the amendments.

The meeting was closed with a social period, during which time Junior hostesses, Donna Meamber and Beverly Sutherland, served cookies and coffee.

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, TO CONSTRUCT AND LAY A TRUNK SANITARY SEWER LINE ALONG SHASTA WAY FROM SOUTH SIXTH STREET TO WASHINGTON WAY AND A SUB SEWER LINE ALONG WASHINGTON WAY FROM SHASTA WAY TO PERSHING WAY AND ALONG PERSHING WAY FROM WASHINGTON WAY TO A POINT APPROXIMATELY 563 FEET SOUTHEASTERLY ALONG PERSHING WAY FROM THE EASTERLY LINE OF WASHINGTON WAY, APPROVING PLANS SPECIFICALLY AND ESTIMATES THEREOF, FILED BY THE CITY ENGINEER, DESCRIBING THE BOUNDARIES OF THE PROPERTY BENEFITED, AND DIRECTING CERTAIN STEPS TO BE TAKEN, SAID PROJECT TO BE KNOWN AS SEWER UNIT NO. 26.

The City Engineer of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, pursuant to a resolution of the Common Council, heretofore adopted, having filed plans, specifications and estimates for the cost of constructing and laying what is known as the 26th sewer unit of the City of Klamath Falls, extending along Shasta Way from South Sixth Street to Washington Way and along Pershing Way from Washington Way to a point approximately 563 feet southeasterly along Pershing Way from the easterly line of Washington Way, embracing in said unit all of the territory heretofore bounded and described, and the Common Council having taken said plans, specifications and estimates under consideration and having determined the boundaries of the assessment district, now finds all thereof satisfactory.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, DULY ASSEMBLED IN REGULAR SESSION AS FOLLOWS:

Section I.
That the plans, specifications and estimates for the construction and installation of what is known as the 26th sewer unit of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, filed with the City Engineer, and the same are hereby approved and adopted.

Section II.
That the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, hereby declares its intention to construct and install the 26th sewer unit of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, in accordance with the said plans, specifications, and estimates; that this project consist of constructing and laying a trunk sanitary sewer line along Shasta Way from South Sixth Street to Washington Way and a sub sewer line along Pershing Way from Washington Way to a point approximately 563 feet southeasterly along Pershing Way from the easterly line of Washington Way. The sewer lines will be constructed of either concrete pipe, vitrified clay pipe, or asbestos pipe, together with all manholes and other necessary appurtenances, all as more fully shown by the plans and specifications.

Section III.
That the boundaries hereinafter described, shall be and is hereby declared to be the boundaries of the assessment district for the purpose of assessing and levying taxes for the expense of said sewer unit.

Section IV.
