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Shirtwaist, Patio Dress Endorsed By Texas Designers

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI)—Texas, never the type to do things small scale, have endorsed both the shirtwaist and the patio dress in a big way for summer.

It is a tossup which style leads in clothes which the Dallas manufacturers' fashion center previewed this week for visiting fashion reporters.

Shirtwaists, classics in feminine wardrobes, are thicker than oil derricks in this part of the country. They (dresses, not derricks) come in dozens of wash-wear fabrics, both of treated cotton and synthetics, in slim and full skirts, in daytime casuals and after-five clothes.

When manufacturers aren't showing the shirtwaist, they are bringing on the "patio," which is the 1959 version of a style Indians of the Southwest have had around for a long time—the squaw dress.

In most versions, the patio frock is for casual wear, with its full tiered skirt. Originally, as the squaw dress, its colors indicated the tribe to which the wearer belonged. Now the colors are whites and pastels.

Dallas manufacturers, whose wares go to some 25,000 stores across the nation and abroad, don't say what we females are to do, if we don't own a patio. Presumably, the style is just as fitting for penthouse or plain or

back-yard.

In this, the third largest dress manufacturing market in the nation (New York and California claim number one and two), the accent is on the cool look with ease of care for summer. The industry no longer says "a little ironing helps" when it talks about laundry. The phrase is "no iron." Fabrics in this category include denims, broadcloths, pinas, seersuckers (which one manufacturer said was the original "drip dry"), cotton homespun, and numerous blends of cotton with synthetics.

Some other highlights from the center showings:

Checks Popular

Checks abound, most of them in the pin-check size. So do polka dots, but on the conservative side when compared with some of the dollar-size dots New York designers showed for summer.

Embroidery—enough of it used for trim to wrap around the whole state boundary.

A preponderance of full skirts, some of them with as much as a four-yard sweep at the hemline. Puffed and lantern sleeves are back, although that general widening of the shoulders through sleeve bulkiness, which New York and Paris designers featured, is modified for this market.

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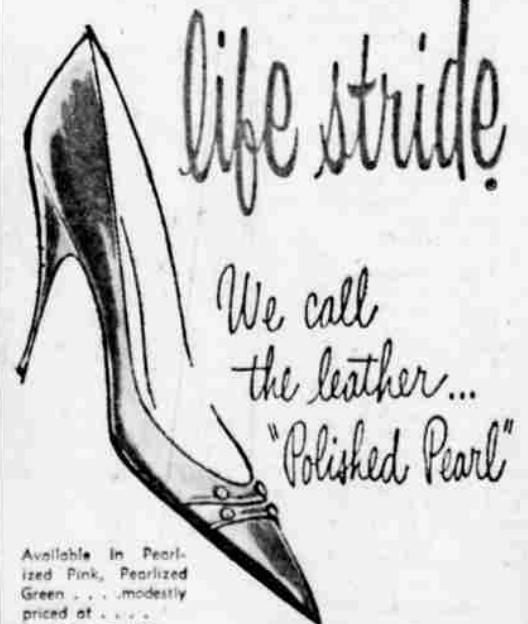
