NEW YORK (NEA)—The handbag which you will carry this spring will have a ladylike look. It will be scaled down in size, will have an air of soft elegance. This does not mean that those wonderful big handbags for travel are out. But even though they have taken on a new appearance of slim flatness, they hold as much as they ever did.

Bulky and boxy shapes have gone, to be replaced by soft gathering, contoured corners and a generally flatter silhouette.

There's a brand-new emphasis on high fashion colors in a whole range of soft, silky leathers. Smooth finishes or silky suedes come in such bouncing colors as geranium pink, comet blue, salad green, bone and dozens of other dazzlers.

Trimming is less evident than in seasons past. And where it does appear, it serves a purpose. Thus, a gold watch and chain may slip into any outside pocket or a coin purse may appear on the outside of a bag. Otherwise, eye-catching treatments are achieved through draping, seaming or folding of the leather.

Handbag shapes for spring include the new oval shape for both daytime and evening; the wider oblong which is still sleek and flat; the tiny oblong for evening and the horizontal, streamlined bag with single or double overarm handles.

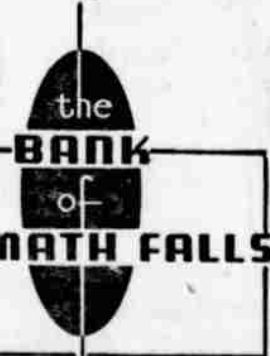


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
