Tulelake School Principal Reviews Building Program

TULELAKE—E. I. Coyner, principal of the Tulelake Joint Union High School, has released a review of the high school building program now completed, and an explanation of the methods of financing.

Acceptance of the new shop building and installation of bleachers marks the end of a three-year period of change and adjustment since the high school began operating as a single unit under one roof. During the construction period two plants were maintained, students being moved between the old and new buildings for various classes.

Coyner stated that prior to separation from the Siskiyou Joint Union High School District, the eight classroom unit was built at a cost of \$236,000. This unit was paid for with cash from money collected on the \$1.25 tax by Siskiyou Joint Union High School.

With the creation of the new Tulelake Joint High School District, the old levy of \$1.25 automatically reverted to the state maximum of 75 cents. It will remain at this level until changed by the voters.

One of the first moves of the new district was to start action to complete the building. Part of the

groundwork had been completed before withdrawal from the Siskiyou district.

Application, Coyner said, was not made for aid from the state building fund since allowable footage, to qualify under the state aid program, was far below the space necessary for the anticipated enrollment at Tulelake. Further, the delay in time and conformity to state building plans made state aid questionable for the district.

To carry through the building program, the board agreed to submit a bond election to the voters calling for \$480,000. This sum was the maximum that could be raised

under the five per cent of assessed valuation limitation.

Building plans in line with the stipulated amount were prepared by the architect, but it was later determined that available funds would be some \$50,000 short of covering the complete building program.

Temporary elimination of the shop unit from the plans permitting completion of the remaining units last year. Since the district

was bonded to capacity and since it was not eligible for state aid after completion of the original units, an attempt to finance a shop building met with repeated disappointments.

Plans were revised. The board finally decided to borrow from the Siskiyou County Service fund, an amount large enough to complete the entire building program.

Fifty thousand dollars was loaned to the district through the Siskiyou

County school superintendent's office, which must now be repaid from the district's operating budget. In effect, the first \$50,000 available to the district from the operating budget may be demanded on the loan.

The board of directors of the school district is presently faced with a reappraisal of finances to permit an uninterrupted, effective educational program to continue.
