The winner of that game, North Salem, got one man on the first team. And he was the shortest of the all-stars—5-1 Bill Meurer.

The fifth place went to Bob Petersen, a 6-5 senior from Klamath Falls.

These seven players were chosen for the second team: Jerry Anderson of Medford, Dave Nelson of Pendleton, Bill Adams of St. Helens, Grant Harter of North Salem, Gordon Scott of Astoria, Dan Eckles of Pendleton and Bill Henselman of Sandy.

## 'Pennant Feeling' Dominates Pirates

FORT MYERS, Fla. (UPI) — The Pittsburgh Pirates have "that pennant feeling."

Last year, in his first full season as manager, Danny Murtaugh aimed for the first division and wound up second, eight games behind Milwaukee. That represented a jump of five notches in 1957—the ninth year in a row they had finished in the second division.

"We really started to jell last season," Murtaugh said. "Now we are aiming to jump just one more notch in the standings. My players are confident we can do it, and so am I. We all have that pennant feeling."

Murtaugh gambled and traded away his leading power hitter, Frank Thomas, to get what he felt the Pirates lacked in 1958—a left-handed starting pitcher and a left-handed hitting catcher. He obtained Harvey Haddix, who was 6-7 with Cincinnati last year, and Smokey Burgess, a .283 hitter with the Reds.

Also in the deal, the Pirates obtained Don Hoak to take over Thomas' third base chores.

### IMPROVE DEFENSE

"We know we lost power, but with Hoak at third we improved our defense and Haddix gives us the lefthanded pitching strength we lacked. And Burgess is not only valuable as a full time catcher, if need be, but also as a pinchhitter."

"Now we have to find a big bat to take over from Thomas. I'm looking for our first basemen to supply that."

The player he is looking at most is Dick Stuart, who can hit the ball a long way. He hit 16 homers in 67 games with the Pirates last season and drove in 48 runs. Only he strikes out a lot. The only question in Murtaugh's mind is whether Stuart will drive in more runs with his bat than he will let in with his fielding. He's no defensive genius.

Should Stuart fall short, Murtaugh has Ted Kluszewski, who this spring looks like the slugger he was with Cincinnati before he came up with a back ailment two years ago. Kluszewski is swinging freely for the first time since then and he thinks he can do the job.

With 1:37 left Paul Bishop hit a long jumper to make the score 47-45 but seconds later Pelican Dean Dunson fouled Horn, who hit from the charity line and Nelson counted one more of his jumpers and the Buckaroos were out in front 50-45 with only 1:06 left to play.

From here on, in their desperate attempt to regain the ball from the Buckaroos in their expected stall, the Pelicans committed a pair of necessary fouls that gave Eckles and Cook the opportunity to pick up two points. A cinch layup by Cook gave the Bucks their final 56 points.

Inside the last five seconds Bishop missed a pair of free tosses but Petersen sank a layup which brought his total to 16 points for the night and gave the Pelicans their last mark on the scoreboard.

Petersen was the number two scorer for the night as he hit six for eight from the field and four for five from the foul line. The Pelican star also pulled in 14 rebounds during the tough contest.

Chasing Petersen in the third spot was Buckaroo Cook who collected 15 points, followed by Eckles, the Pendleton captain, who notched 12.

Pel guard, senior Don DeLap who finished his last game under the red and white banner, was the number five scorer of the game with nine points.

The Buckaroos, playing one of their best ball games during the tourney, hit 22 of 63 tries from the field for a .349 mark and a fabulous 12 for 13 from the foul line.

The Pels made 20 of 52 shots from the floor for a .385, but fell way short at the foul line, hitting only seven of 14 attempts.

"Pendleton is an extremely well-coached club. They had a lead at a crucial time and knew what to do with it. They came through with that extra something," observed Pel coach White.

He added, "It appears that last night's ball game took a lot out of both our kids and Marshfield's."

## Pettit, Baylor Head Pro Stars

NEW YORK (AP) — Record-breaking Bob Pettit of St. Louis, rookie Elgin Baylor of Minneapolis and Bob Cousy, Bill Sharman and Bill Russell of Boston comprise the National Basketball Assn. all-star team announced Saturday.

The team was selected by a vote of sportswriters and broadcasters in each of the eight league cities. Pettit, who set a season's record by scoring 2,105 points, was named on all but one ballot.

the grade in the majors. Back of them also is R. C. Stevens, the best fielder of the lot, but with a weaker bat.

### REST OF INFIELD SET

The rest of the infield is set with Bill Mazerowski at second, Dick Groat at short and Hoak at third. Mazerowski and Groat form one of the best second base combinations in the majors and most baseball men agree with Murtaugh when he says those key men can beat you more ways than any other shortstop-second base combination in the majors.

If the Pirates have one weakness, it is in infield reserves. The veteran Gene Baker, Dick Schofield, who was a disappointment with the Cardinals, and rookie Harry Bright, a .309 batter at Sacramento in 1958, are the only ones who can back up Mazerowski, Groat and Hoak. Baker was hurt most of last season and it's a question whether he could play every day if something happened to anyone of those three.

In the outfield it will be Bob Skinner in left, Bill Virdon in center, Roberto Clemente in right with Roman Majias back of them as the No. 1 utility gardener.

### HIGH ON ROOKIE

Murtaugh wouldn't trade them for any four outfielders that he's ever had in the league has. He's also high on rookie Joe Christopfer, who hit .327 at Salt Lake City last season.

Hank Foiles will be the No. 1 catcher, but Burgess will be back of the plate a lot. Bill Hall, who looked so good with the Pirates last year when they brought him up from Salt Lake, and Danny Kravitz are fighting for the third-straight catching berth.

Murtaugh figures on six starting pitchers, leading off with his ace, Bob Friend, a 22-game winner in 1958. Then come Vernon Law (14-12), Ron Kline (13-16), George Witt (9-2), Curt Raydon (8-4) and Haddix. The Pirates expect great things of Witt.

Rookie Bennie Daniels, who won 14 at Columbus in the International League last season, has a good chance of sticking.

Elroy Face, one of the best in the business, will be the relief specialist with southpaw Don Gross and the veteran Bob Porterfield also in the bullpen. Ron Blackburn and Bob Smith are other hurling possibilities.

## Lodge Grass, Montana, Wins All-Indian Tournament Crown

Lodge Grass, Montana, won the All-Indian Invitational Tournament for the second year in a row with a 71-63 win over the Phoenix Chiefs from Arizona on Pelican Court Saturday night.

Browning, Montana, grabbed third place honors by out-scoring Reno, Nevada, 94-86, although the Braves had to come from behind in the last five minutes to pull out the victory.

In the afternoon consolation games, Moberidge, South Dakota, defeated the San Francisco Warriors, 39-49, to cop fifth place in the tourney while Neah Bay downed the bosting Chiloquin Thunderbirds, 106-87 to win the fourth place trophy.

Prior to the afternoon session, Browning and Phoenix paired off to finish a contest which began Friday night and then was canceled with two and one-half minutes remaining when the Chiloquin gymnasium was engulfed in darkness due to a local power outage.

### Braves 94, Reno 86

Big 6-4 Murray Harwood broke the tourney record for individual scoring by tossing in 43 points to bring his three-game total to 127, snapping the old mark of 122 set by Bernie Salaway of Fort Washakie in 1957.

Harwood, an 18-year-old high school senior from Browning, Montana, counted 18 field goals and seven of eight from the foul line for his high-scoring total. The lanky youngster, who also rebounds with the best, sparked his team to a 45-32 halftime lead by hitting 26 points, garnering most of his buckets on long set or short jump shots.

With Browning scoring off the fast break in the second half, the lead broke in the score down until Earl Dunn gave the lead to Braves with five minutes remaining on three straight field goals. Harwood scored on two consecutive tips and teammate Sylvester Arrowtoop canned a pair of gift shots to push the Braves back into the lead, 83-82 with 2:49 remaining.

Arrowtoop scored again from under the basket and Saint Ron Glidden sank three quick field goals and a single free throw to wrap up the victory. All the while Reno was going scoreless.

Glidden followed Harwood's star performance with 22 tallies while Reno was paced by Dunn. Hunter and Wes Williams who collected 25, 24 and 21 counters respectively.

In the championship game, Phoenix and Lodge Grass played nip and tuck up until there were six minutes left in the ball game when Larry Pretty Weasel, Chuck Real Bird and Bob Little Light hit for consecutive field goals.

Phoenix tried to rally on fielders by Jack Medera and Mick Juan, however the Saints began working a stall for the remainder of the contest which paid off as they picked up points on cripples and free throws.

Saint Bob Bulltail scored first for both teams however the Chiefs soon had the lead as Juan began to score off the fast break. Bulltail, scoring 10 points in the opening period, gave the lead back to Lodge Grass as the quarter ended, 23-15.

The Saints continued to hold the lead at the half but Medrano, Eddie Lawrence, Juan and Charles Fixico led the Phoenix team back into the lead, 54-52 with one and one-half minutes remaining in the period. The stanza ended in favor of Phoenix, 56-55.
