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Jobless Laws Facing Revise, Chief Says

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower and a group of governors met today to explore ways to improve the federal-state jobless aid program.

The White House conference got under way at midmorning. Advance indications were that Eisenhower would tell the governors that unless state unemployment compensation laws are broadened, Congress may move in and enact compulsory federal standards.

The President's meeting was with the executive committee of the Governors' Conference.

Also sitting in at the session were Secretary of the Treasury Robert B. Anderson, Secretary of Commerce Lewis L. Strauss, and Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell.

Others present included Dr. Raymond Saulnier, chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisors, Wilton B. Parsons, Eisenhower's chief aide, and Robert Merriam, another presidential assistant.

The arrangement was for the governors to confer with Eisenhower for about an hour, then continue the discussion with the other administration officials.

The state chief executives planned lunch at the White House with those officials. Indications were the conference would end in midafternoon.

While the White House meeting was under way, the Senate Finance Committee approved a three-month extension of the temporary federal jobless pay program.

The committee voted 12-4 to reject a proposal of Sen. Pat McNamara (D-Mich.) and 17 other Democratic senators for an extension to July 1, 1960, under liberalized standards.

Then it voted 15-0 to send to the floor, with a minor amendment, a House-passed bill providing for the three-month extension but not allowing any new claims after the present April 1 expiration date.

Chairman Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.) said the bill will come up on the floor Wednesday.

Rest By Graham Does Him Well

BROADBEACH, Australia (AP)—Billy Graham's rest at this Gold Coast resort has already done him so much good that he will not require a medical examination, a member of his staff said today.

Dr. William Erdman of the University of Pennsylvania, a personal friend of the evangelist, has arrived from the United States to visit Graham. But a member of Graham's staff said the examination by Erdman—originally planned—is no longer necessary.

FIRE SEASON

By proclamation of the governor of the state of Oregon, the period April 1 to December 31, is designated the closed season for fire.

After April 1, anyone wishing to burn debris within the boundaries of the Klamath Indian Reservation must secure a burning permit from the fire dispatcher at Klamath Agency. Campfire permits during the dry season will also be required of Klamath Indians.

Violation of this section of the laws of the state of Oregon is considered a misdemeanor and may be punished by fine or imprisonment.

Both Leaders Reported Satisfied With Outcome Of Camp David Talks

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan have proposed that the Western Allies adopt a three-point approach to a summit conference with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev this summer.

It was learned today that this was the compromise formula agreed on in talks between the two Western leaders at Camp David, Md., Saturday.

Now under discussion by West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and French President Charles de Gaulle, it represents a compromise between Macmillan's urgent desire to meet with Khrushchev unconditionally and Eisenhower's reluctance to meet without promise of achievement.

The three points:

1. The Big Four powers—the United States, Britain, France and the Soviet Union—should open a foreign ministers meeting at Geneva May 11. Khrushchev has already unconditionally agreed to this.

The foreign ministers should reach agreements on the widest possible range of German and related problems, try to narrow Soviet-West differences and prepare proposals for a later summit conference.

Rival Lambasted By Nasser For Refusing To Aid Egypt

CAIRO (AP)—President Gamal Abdel Nasser has accused his rival, Iraqi Premier Abdel Karim Kassam, of committing the Arab sin of refusing to aid in "a fight to the finish" against Israel.

In another fighting speech broadcast from Damascus, the president of the United Arab Republic castigated Kassam and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev, whom he called Kassam's backer.

For the first time Nasser asserted the Soviets' ultimatum had nothing to do with halting the British-French-Israeli attack on Egypt in 1956.

Police Force Vows To Find Killer Of Girl

SPOKANE (AP)—An aroused police force vowed today to find the killer of Candy Rogers, a 9-year-old Camp Fire girl whose ravished body was found in a clump of woods after a 16-day search.

"We'll put every available man on the case and keep them there until the thing is solved," said Police Chief Clifford Payne, father of a daughter, aged 9.

"We know what we're looking for now. We're looking for a maniac."

He said it appeared the child had been picked up on a street corner, raped, strangled with a piece of her own slip, then buried under a pile of brush miles from town—all within a few hours 17 days ago.

Never before has Spokane or its 230,000 police force been so stirred by a case. The pretty 9-year-old girl vanished March 6 while selling Camp Fire mints door to door near her home.

Police found six boxes of mints scattered near a bridge in the 12 hours that followed the disappearance, then ran into a blank wall despite 750 tips from substantial citizens, skid road bums and tea leaf readers. Three searchers in an Air Force helicopter were killed in a crash.

Thousands of volunteers combed the canyon below Candy's home, scoured along the banks of the canyon's Spokane River, checked garages, old cars and—with apologies beforehand—homes of reputable residents.

They found nothing. Television appeals by Catholic and Episcopal bishops produced not a trace. Then came an unexpected break.

Two enlisted men from Fairchild Air Force Base, Howard S. Lawrence, 19, and Richard Bergan, 21, found a small pair of blue suede shoes Saturday while hunting woodchucks in remote woods 12 miles from town, northwest of where the search had been concentrated.

They told police, who checked the shoes with Candy's grandfather, S. E. Newton, a fuel dealer. He had seen them before.

At dawn Sunday, a half dozen officers gathered at the scene of the airman's discovery. A patrolman spotted a knee sticking out from under a pile of faded pine needles. He brushed them away carefully.

"No use going any further—here she is," said Inspector Robert Piper, who personally had run down scores of fruitless leads since the search began.

An autopsy showed little Candy had been raped. Her legs had been tied by a piece of her petticoat. Another piece was strung around her neck. There was blood on her face and neck.

justified by the work of the foreign ministers.

3. The foreign ministers therefore would have the responsibility of determining the time, place, and subject matter of the summit conference.

The proposal covering these points was drafted by Macmillan and Eisenhower for inclusion in Western notes now expected to go to Moscow later this week. Khrushchev has been pressing for a summit conference for many months.

Some officials say the forging of a summit meeting was one of the Soviet leaders' objectives in stirring up the Berlin crisis beginning last November.

Macmillan feels the Western heads of government must negotiate with Khrushchev even if the foreign ministers conference is a failure. Eisenhower feels every effort must be made to get basic progress toward a solution of the Berlin crisis and some start on other German problems at the foreign ministers meeting.

Eisenhower was reported to consider as "fine" the results of discussions he began with Macmillan here Friday. A British spokesman described the prime minister as "happy and satisfied."

Macmillan arranged a morning meeting at the British Embassy

He said fighting had stopped before the Soviet ultimatum arrived Nov. 6, 1956. He also said the Soviets gave Egypt no aid during the Suez fighting, and that they had not supported last July's Iraqi revolution against the former pro-Western regime.

The Soviet Union threatened Britain and France with its atomic power on Nov. 5. Britain and France ordered a cease-fire in the Suez war Nov. 7. In the West, American opposition to the war and not the Soviet threat was generally believed responsible for the decision to end hostilities. But the Arab world, led by Nasser, gave most or all of the credit to the Soviets.

Nasser said the Israelis launched a series of attacks on the Syrian frontier late last year and that he anticipated an all-out attack.

To meet such an attack, he continued, he planned a fight to the finish and asked Kassam to send troops to help, but Kassam refused, Nasser asserted.

"With the deterioration in U.A.R.-Iraqi relations, we knew we would be alone if we entered a conflict with Israel," he added.

The Israeli-Arab incidents along the Syrian border last fall coincided with a virulent Cairo propaganda campaign against King Hussein of Jordan. The Jordanians charged that Nasser was plotting to overthrow Hussein, and reliable reports circulated that the Israelis in that event would occupy the former Palestine territory west of the River Jordan. The tension subsequently subsided.

The word war between Nasser and Iraq's Kassam erupted when the Iraqi president accused the U.A.R. president of backing a recent abortive revolt in northern Iraq. Nasser in reply accused Kassam of lining up with Communist agents trying to undermine Arab unity.

The Baghdad government announced that a "people's court" on Tuesday will begin trying persons accused of participating in the revolt.

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WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States has accused the Soviet fishing trawler Novorossiysk of responsibility for breaking five transatlantic cables off Newfoundland last month and has demanded that the Soviet government take steps to prevent such damage in the future.

Bodies Found In Wreckage

THE DALLAS (AP)—A wrecked automobile and the bodies of two men were found Sunday at the bottom of a bank along Highway 30 near here.

The victims were Perry Perkins, 62, of Hillsboro and Charles F. Pickard, 46, of Beaverton.

The car apparently was traveling east at a high rate of speed. There was 200 feet of skidmarks on the road and 130 feet of fence ripped out along the highway. The car went over a high bank above the Union Pacific right of way.

The wreck was first sighted by Union Pacific train crew Sunday. The coroner's office said the accident apparently occurred Saturday night.

These two deaths raised Oregon's traffic toll for the year to 87 in the Associated Press tabulation. Twenty-two have perished this month.

They had spent most of their waking hours there since mid-Friday discussing measures to deal with the Soviet threat to West Berlin and related issues, including a broad range of German and European security problems.

They attended church in the morning at Thurmont, Md., then lunched and received reports from their foreign ministers on conditions in the Middle East and on economic aspects of the cold war.

Before separating after their drive back to Washington, they went to the home of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and talked with Dulles for 45 minutes.

FBI Announces The Arrest Of Eleven Puzzle Swindlers

WASHINGTON (AP)—The FBI today announced the arrests of 11 persons in what it described as a nationwide swindle involving newspaper puzzle contests.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said the swindle operations crossed the U.S.-Canadian border. FBI agents today picked up four persons in Oregon, three in Michigan, two in Pennsylvania, and one each in Indiana and Wisconsin.

They were charged with conspiracy to violate the federal mail fraud and fraud by wire statutes.

Love Rumors Follow Soraya

ROME (UPI)—Former Queen Soraya of Iran arrives here today with her mother, and Rome society waited breathlessly to see if they would call on Italian Raimondo Orsini and his mother.

Rumors of a romance blossomed when Soraya, 27, and Orsini, 27, held hands on the ski slopes of Switzerland. Northern Italian newspapers said flatly they would be married. Rome newspapers merely hinted at it.

The rumors received a boost when Orsini visited Germany where the former Persian queen lives in Frankfurt with her mother. They received another boost when it became known the ex-queen had taken rooms two blocks from the Orsini palace.

Orsini's mother, Princess Luisa Rignon-Orsini, could be expected to get together with Soraya at the family palace or at the secluded villa of friends outside Rome. The Princess Luisa could well be the key to any possible marriage.

Her son, Prince Raimondo Umberto Maria Orsini, is a member of one of Italy's noble families with a title that dates back to 431 A.D. The family has supplied the Roman Catholic Church with five popes, 21 saints and 40 cardinals.

His marriage to Maslem Soraya would entail Papal dispensation.

Also, Soraya was divorced by the Shah of Iran because she did not bear him a male heir, and the Italians are proud of their male offspring.

Court To Hear Unionist's Appeal

OLYMPIA (AP)—The State Supreme Court is scheduled to sit as a unit Wednesday to hear former Teamster Union President Dave Beck's appeal from a grand larceny conviction.

Beck was convicted Dec. 14, 1957 of embezzling \$1,900 from the sale of a union-owned Cadillac. He faces a maximum term of 15 years if the conviction is upheld.

Beck's attorney, Charles Burdell, is seeking reversal of the Superior Court conviction on grounds of alleged misconduct of the jury and prejudice on the part of the jury foreman.

The high court's decision will not be handed down until a later date.

KU Application For Aid Okayed

Application of the Klamath County School District for federal assistance under the provisions of Public Law 874 has been approved.

Announcement of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, through Congressman Second District Al Ullman, stated the school district will have a tentative entitlement of \$41,324.91 for the fiscal year 1959. Of this amount, \$26,344 has been certified for immediate payment.

Information on the decision was contained in a letter received today by the Herald and News from Ullman.

Jordan Monarch Due In Capital

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Jordan's youthful King Hussein arrives today for an informal visit during which he is likely to ask for additional U.S. aid to strengthen his reign.

Vice President Richard M. Nixon and Acting Secretary of State Christian A. Herter will welcome the 23-year old monarch when he flies in by military plane from San Francisco.

Prime Minister Of India Reports Revolt Against Reds Has Subsidied

TAIPEI (UPI)—The anti-Communist revolt in Tibet has spread to Communist China, a Nationalist Chinese cabinet member said today.

He urged the anti-Communist world to assist the revolution lest it become another Hungary.

The official was Li Yung-shin, chairman of the Nationalist government's Mongolian and Tibetan affairs commission. He told United Press International the uprising had spread across the border to the Chinese provinces of Sikang and Chinghai. Sikang also borders India.

Li made the statement shortly after Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru told Parliament in New Delhi today that street fighting had broken out in the Tibetan capital of Lhasa. Nehru expressed concern for the safety of the Dalai Lama whose whereabouts are now unknown.

Nehru also disclosed that the heaviest fighting broke out last Friday in the capital when rumors spread through Lhasa the Chinese Communists planned to kidnap the Dalai Lama, spiritual and temporal ruler of the mountain kingdom.

Revolts had been reported earlier in various parts of Tibet but fighting broke out in Lhasa for the first time. Unconfirmed reports reaching the Indian border said Communist planes had bombed Lhasa.

The Chinese official gave no sources for his report the revolt had spread across the border but the Nationalist government is known to have intelligence agents on the mainland who report to Taipei.

Li and other high-ranking Nationalist officials met in secrecy today to study possible steps the Nationalists might take to help the revolt. President Chiang Kai-shek has predicted the Peiping regime would collapse from internal revolt and officials have hinted they would send troops to the mainland when a revolt does break out.

The independent Taipei newspaper United Daily News predicted today the "regional fighting for freedom soon will lead to a nationwide uprising."

Li said the Chinese Communists were determined to stamp out the revolt and said "The free world has to give Tibet timely spiritual, material and technical help so it will not become another Hungary."

He said 2,900 refugees have arrived in India from Tibet since fighting broke out and they are stranded near the border with little food, money or shelter.

There were 22 bullets in the pants pocket but no gun was found in the vicinity. Eyeglasses and a cigarette lighter were the only personal effects found.

ST. CHARLES, Va. (AP)—A dynamite blast damaged a coal-loading building at a nonunion mine in Lee County early today. There were no injuries.

Ramsey Brock, one of two brothers operating the mine near the Kentucky border, said the blast appeared to have been set by someone familiar with the mine and "was very strategically placed."

The mine was reopened last Monday by Ramsey and Lee Brock of Harlan, Ky. The Brocks leased the facility from Halward Oil & Gas Co. of Knoxville, Tenn., which bought it a month ago from Blue Diamond Coal Co.

Blue Diamond had operated the mine for about 50 years, with a peak employment of 600 men. The mine was organized by the United Mine Workers Union before it closed a short time ago.

Porter Greer, deputy sheriff, said the blast occurred about 2 a.m.

The explosion set off numerous small fires in buildings and equipment.

The mine had employed about 17 nonunion workers. Brock said fuller operations were scheduled. He said it would take about five days to repair the blast damage.

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Nationalist Minister Says Revolt Hits Red Chinese

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Lama's Fate Uncertain, Says Leader

NEW DELHI (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru today said fighting apparently has subsided in the Tibetan capital and the Indian government has no intention of intervening in the revolt against Chinese Communist rule.

"Apparently the situation in Lhasa has somewhat quieted down," the Indian prime minister reported.

Nehru told Parliament he had no reliable information on the fate of the Dalai Lama, Tibet's 23-year-old spiritual and political leader. He said he could only hope he was safe.

The Hong Kong correspondent of the Times of India reported the young god-king was under house arrest in Lhasa, his capital. The report said Peiping had ordered the Chinese military governor of Tibet, Gen. Chang Ching Wu, to "persuade" the Dalai Lama—considered by Tibetans to be the reincarnation of Buddha—to come to the Red Chinese capital in order to withdraw his moral support from the rebels.

Nehru in his remarks to Parliament was in effect answering several Indian newspapers who had criticized his failure to intercede with Peiping on behalf of the Tibetans and the Dalai Lama.

India has long recognized Chinese sovereignty over Tibet, though until the Communists invaded the remote mountain plateau in 1950, the Dalai Lama and his church organization governed Tibet with only occasional interference from the central Chinese government.

Nehru told Parliament the situation in Tibet remains most delicate and "we are not doing anything to make the situation worse."

"We have no intention of interfering in the internal matters of China," he declared, pointing out that India has a treaty of friendly coexistence with Peiping.

The Hong Kong dispatch to the Times of India said Tibetans were "upset over India's inability to do anything on their behalf and regret New Delhi's 'inferiority complex' in relation to China—a complex that prevents India from saving or doing anything that might not be to Peiping's liking."

The British-owned Statesman said in a dispatch from Kalimpong that Tibetans in that border town had petitioned Nehru to intercede with Peiping to save the Dalai Lama and secure withdrawal of Chinese troops from Tibet.
