

May (Pronounced 'My') Follows In Dietrich's Trail

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The girl most likely to follow the trail blazed by Marlene Dietrich is a sexy Swede named May Britt.

May (pronounced my) has the legs for it. She also has a provocative face half-hiding under a

crop of hair that looks like a haystack (she calls it a spaghetti cut). Here is more of a smoldering kind of beauty, unlike the coolness of her famed countrywomen, Garbo and Bergman.

All this qualifies May for the role in "The Blue Angel" which sent Dietrich on to stardom before May was born. The 1930 movie is being remade by 20th Century-Fox with Curt Jurgens playing the part created by the late Emil Jannings. May has just been officially announced to play opposite him.

When I saw her, she was between wardrobe fittings and a song recording. The latter worried her.

"In school, I always got a one-hour rest while the other children were studying music," she explained. "I wasn't allowed to join them because I always sang off-key."

This, of course, eminently qualifies her to do the Dietrich part. It looks as if May is finally getting some action on her acting career. In two years at the studio, she has made only two pictures. Her comments on them are very of "The Hunters," she said, "I thought the aerial scenes were good." About "The Young Lions": "It was a nice little part—two scenes, really."

She demonstrated her independence by turning down another part, the lead in "Fraulein." She drew a suspension for it, but she doesn't think any hard feelings remain.

She can afford to be independent. Her husband is Edward James Greson, heir to a Los Angeles real estate fortune.

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP)—An aide of Billy Graham warned Australians today against phony canvassers who have been

"At no time has the crusade canvassed for funds, nor has it any intention of doing so," declared John Robinson, secretary of the crusade.

Navy All-Weather Helicopter Makes Public Debut Today

STRATFORD, Conn. (AP)—The Navy's first all-weather helicopter, the turbine-powered Sikorsky HO4S, makes its public debut today.

Styled with a boat-type hull that enables it to land on and take off from water in emergencies, the big craft has twin gas turbine engines for greater load lifting capability, faster cruising speed and longer combat range.

Navy officials, military observers and newsmen were invited to the Sikorsky plant for the first public flight demonstration, which included landings on the nearby Housatonic River.

The Navy has awarded Sikorsky Aircraft Division of United Aircraft Corp. a 32-million-dollar contract to develop and build the HO4S, and initial production is under way. The number to be produced is secret, as are data on size and performance.

The Navy describes the machine, sometimes known as a turbocopter, as "the latest antishubmarine weapons system, the first helicopter that can both search out and destroy enemy submarines."

Other helicopters now serving the fleet can perform only one of the two major functions on a single mission and still achieve maximum designed range, the Navy said.

Request Given Dead 'Chutist'

CHICAGO (AP)—A young paratrooper, killed in a jump in Japan last week, is to get the request he made when he returned from combat in Korea. He will be buried in Arlington National Cemetery.

Edward J. Marrion enlisted in the Army when he was 17 and upon discharge had written Washington making the request, his mother, Margaret R. Marrion, said Monday.

She said her son told her: "Whether I'm 25 or 45, I want to be buried in Arlington." Asked why, he replied: "Because my buddies are there, Mom."

Marrion was a civilian when he was killed in a jump in Japan last week. He was re-enlisted in the Air Force to serve with a Pathfinder parachute unit. He became a master jumper with more than 80 on his record.

Mrs. Marrion and her husband, Robert A., were notified last Thursday that their son, now 24, had been killed in a jump at Fukuoka, Japan. The Air Force, in a letter, explained he had made a jump from a helicopter. The chute split when he was about 300 feet from the ground and he fell the rest of the way.

Sugar Fires Under Probe

HAVANA (AP)—Authorities are investigating mysterious fires that have destroyed more than 375,000 tons of sugar cane ready for harvest in Oriente and Las Villas provinces.

Reports said 325,000 tons of cane were burned on seven plantations in Oriente and 56,000 tons were destroyed on three plantations in Las Villas. Razing sugar crops was one of the harassing tactics used by Fidel Castro's rebel force in the civil war against former President Fulgencio Batista.

The total of executions by Castro's firing squads rose meanwhile to 432. Two former soldiers in Baracoa, Oriente province, were executed after being convicted of murders and torture.

Diggers Uncover Marine Reptile

ASTI, Italy (AP)—Ditch diggers near here unearthed a 30-foot skeleton which experts believe may be one of the biggest specimens of ichthyosaurus ever found.

The ichthyosaurus was a marine reptile of the dinosaur age. It had a fish-like body, a snout like a porpoise and paddle feet.

The workmen struck what appeared to be the backbone of the reptile. They uncovered 30 feet of that and a skeleton head 6 feet long.

They married last July 3 and separated Oct. 9. She received \$25,000 cash in an agreement announced Monday.

Police Recover Actress' Jewels

LONDON (AP)—Police have recovered the \$14,000 worth of jewelry stolen from actress Lauren Bacall last week.

Scotland Yard officers said they found the jewelry in a London building. They are still hunting the thief.

Miss Bacall, widow of Humphrey Bogart, is making a movie in London.

Raft Voyagers Nearing Goal

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)—Four Brazilian fishermen on a 3,000-mile voyage aboard a log raft have arrived in the south Brazil port of Rio Grande, about 500 miles from their goal.

The four left Fortaleza, northeast Brazil, last November to call on Argentine President Arturo Frondizi in Buenos Aires. They put in at Rio Grande Saturday out of food and water and with one of the party sick.
