Cuddle Bill Turned Down

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — A bill permitting a crackdown on careless drivers was killed Monday after it was revealed it would affect young lovers who cuddle while driving.

The measure, by Assemblyman Nicholas Petris (D-Oakland), was sent for interim committee study by the Assembly Transportation Committee.

Al Veglia, spokesman for the Department of Motor Vehicles, said under present reckless driving law, a person could not be convicted unless it is shown he was driving with willful and wanton disregard of life and property.

He said the bill would broaden the present concept so police could crack down on careless drivers who shove, powder their noses, or eat lunch while driving, or drive with an arm around a girl.

"Are you serious that you want to pinch a boy who has his arm around his girl?" asked Assemblyman Joseph M. Kennick (D-Long Beach).

"I'm not an opponent of young love, but I don't think it's the best practice for young people to drive carelessly," Veglia replied.

Scrap Jails Two Women

One of two women arrested by state police for fighting in a parking lot very early Sunday morning appeared in district court Monday and requested a trial on a vagrancy charge.

The other didn't show up at all. Making an appearance was Loretta Mae Kuhn, 35, who requested a trial without jury on Thursday and was released on \$50 bail.

Failing to show was Arlene Elvira Daughters, 22, who forfeited \$50 bail. Both gave the same address, 5418 Avalon Street.

Officers said the two were seen fighting on a parking lot near the Spad Tavern, 2404 South Sixth Street, at the 2 a.m. closing time Sunday morning. When they saw police, the pair fled to the tavern, couldn't get in, and tried to get away in a car before being arrested.

The cause of the battle was unclear, but the two women said they were "wrestling."

Wanderlust Hits Lad, 14

Spring, which arrived in these parts early Saturday, apparently had a strong appeal for a 14-year-old lad who was spotted by state police on U.S. 97 north of Chemult Monday afternoon.

The boy told officers a remarkable yarn: He said his father had moved from Eugene to Los Angeles several weeks ago in search of "better work." The family discovered on leaving that the car was too small to accommodate him, so he was sent to relatives in Tacoma where the family was settled in Southern California.

After failing to hear from his folks, the boy said he started south on his own, and had ridden freights from Tacoma to Klamath County.

The business sounded a little too fantastic for juvenile officers, who teletyped Eugene for any information officers there might provide.

The information was the boy had run away from his home in Eugene, apparently yesterday morning. He had ridden a freight train all right, but only from Eugene.

Juvenile authorities said the parents were expected to get their son today.

SF Attorney Given Post

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Gov. Edmund G. Brown has named San Francisco attorney Matthew O. Toibner to the 1st District Court of Appeal.

The governor also announced Monday that he had selected Justice Abasalom Francis Bray as presiding justice of the appellate court's Division I.

Bray, who was elevated to the state Supreme Court by Brown last week.

In a press statement, Brown said both appointments will be sent to the Qualifications Commission as soon as Peters assumes his new post.

Bray, 70, has been on the appellate bench since February, 1947. He was a Contra Costa Superior Court judge from 1933 to 1947 and earlier he was city attorney of Martinez, Pinole and Concord. His home is in Martinez.

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Aqua Projects, Tax Hike Gets Going In California

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — The Brown administration flew dead center today toward its pledged goal of a big start on water project construction and new and higher taxes to balance the budget.

An Assembly subcommittee voted \$80,026,543, almost the entire Brown water budget, to complete utility relocations and buy rights of way for the Feather River Project.

The Assembly voted Monday to earmark the entire 170 million dollar state investment fund for water project construction.

Assemblyman Charles V. Porter (D-Compton) announced he would introduce today his constitutional amendment calling for a state guarantee on all its water contracts and earmarking a \$900,000 bond issue for the Feather River Project.

Porter's constitutional amendment does not yet have the backing of Gov. Edmund G. Brown, who has said he is studying it. But Brown has said a bond issue above the 500 million dollars he asked for apparently would be acceptable.

An Assembly ways and means subcommittee, formed to study a portion of the budget, Monday night accepted \$80,026,543 of the Brown water budget.

This included more than 45 million dollars to complete most of the purchase of rights of way for a three-pronged Feather River Project aqueduct system into Southern California.

The only item omitted was a state's share toward construction of Black Butte and New Hogan dams, federal flood control projects.

In other action, the Legislature: **Drunk driving:** The Senate passed to the Assembly two bills by Sen. Donald L. Grunsky (R-Watsonville) which would tighten up drunk driving laws. They provide for a mandatory 15-day jail sentence and a \$250 fine for a second conviction of felony drunk driving and permit a jail sentence of less than 30 days on a first drunk driving offense.

Taxes: The least controversial of Brown's tax bills made it through the Legislature. The Senate Revenue and Tax Committee approved and sent to the upper house floor a measure which would permit the state to collect taxes from insurance companies in June instead of November. That would make about 35 million dollars available this fiscal year for budget balancing purposes.

Narcotics: The Assembly Ways and Means Committee approved and sent to the lower house floor for passage a measure sponsored by Brown which would set up a \$125,000 narcotics control unit at Chico.

Solons Given Drunk Bills

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Two drunk driving bills were on their way to the Assembly today after receiving approval by the Senate.

The bills, by Sen. Donald Grunsky (R-Watsonville), tighten the law for drunk driving and felony drunk driving when injuries are involved.

One of Grunsky's bills calls for no mandatory sentence, giving judges the option of imposing a sentence less than the present 30-day minimum. The other measure provides a mandatory 15-day jail sentence plus a \$250 fine for a second felony drunk driving conviction.

The present law set a mandatory minimum 30-day jail sentence for regular drunk driving and a 60-day mandatory sentence for felony drunk driving. Grunsky said these sentences were considered too harsh by most judges with the result that jurists suspended the sentence and turned offenders loose with only a fine.

Besides Mrs. McNamara, Mrs. Wharton leaves two other daughters, Mrs. Annie Lango of Chico, and Mrs. Lola Hendricks of Modesto, and a son, Luther Wharton of Grenada.

Mrs. Cox is survived by the widow, Pauline Thompson Cox; his stepfather and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Tim Callahan, Grenada; a sister, Mrs. Patsy Callahan; and his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Frost, all of Montague.

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Grandmother Guides Many To Safety

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Mrs. Leola Kelly, 55, grandmother and former school teacher, guided scores of persons to safety today when fire raced through the upper floors of a downtown hotel.

Two persons were injured and 120 others, most in night clothes, fled the burning Columbia Hotel. The fire broke out in a fifth floor room of the six-story brick hotel. The occupant of the room, Carl Greb, 29, salesman, said he apparently fell asleep while moping in bed. He was burned on the hands and feet.

Greb and night clerk Don Farnham ran through corridors, banging on doors and shouting "Fire!" The flames swept into four other rooms on the fifth floor and several on the sixth where many of the hotel guests were blinded by the acrid smoke.

Mrs. Kelly, who formerly taught in Washington, D. C., had put cotton in her ears when she retired early in her room on the upper floor. But the crackle of the flames in the corridor awakened her.

As calmly as if she were leading a school fire drill, she herded other sixth-floor residents toward the main stairway. When the choking smoke blocked the exit she escorted others to fire escapes.

She made one last check through the sixth floor but became dazed in the smoke and had to be helped down a fire escape by firemen. She was not hurt.

Assistant Fire Chief Clarence Rosenstock estimated damage at \$15,000.

Quake Jolts SF Bay Area

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A light earthquake rattled windows and dishes in parts of the San Francisco Bay area Monday night but there were no reports of damage.

The tremor, first recorded at 6:21 p.m. p.s.t. (9:21 p.m. e.s.t.), was felt as far away as San Jose, 50 miles south of here. The San Jose sheriff's office said it had one call describing the quake as a "light rumble with a gentle rolling motion."

University of California seismologist Don Tocher said the quake registered 4.25 on the Richter scale and was centered 65 miles from Berkeley. He described the quake as "purely local" and not an aftershock of the strong quake that hit the bay area earlier this month.

Hearing Slated On Contributing

WEED — Tom F. Coble, 34, of Chemult will appear for preliminary hearing in the Weed Justice Court April 9 at 3 p.m. to answer charges of contributing to the delinquency of a minor involving a 14-year-old Klamath Falls girl.

Coble was arraigned in the Weed Justice Court before Judge Kenneth T. Stone Monday afternoon. He posted bail of \$2,500 in the afternoon. C. H. Humble, attorney from Klamath Falls, is at present representing Coble.

Coble is alleged to have brought the girl from Oregon and allowed her to drink beer.

Coble was first reported cited by the California Highway Patrol near Grange Lake Friday afternoon on a speeding charge. The girl was a passenger at the time. Later the girl was found at the Grenada cutoff, about 12 miles north of Weed, on Highway 97.

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Dunsmuir City Council Names Building Prober

DUNSMUIR — The appointment of Bill Hughes as general building inspector was approved by the Dunsmuir City Council last week as a measure toward expediting Dunsmuir's urban redevelopment program.

Mayor J. Morgan Jones pointed out that the city's Urban Redevelopment Committee is working toward qualifying for federal aid to correct the blighted areas of the city. Electrical, plumbing and building codes must be enforced to meet federal standards, he said.

Hughes, a Southern Pacific employee, will work part time as the city inspector. He replaces Harry Bender who resigned as electrical inspector due to the press of other business. He also will relieve John Petty, superintendent of public works, of plumbing inspection duties.

Hughes will be paid from building permit fees and electrical inspection fees, with details of his duties and reimbursement to be worked out in the next 90 days.

The council also gave approval of purchase of 1,200 feet of new fire hose, a new fire alarm for north Dunsmuir and paint for the fire truck purchased through civil defense, an expenditure totaling about \$1,400.

A motion was passed protesting the closing of the Railway Express office in Dunsmuir.

The council failed to reach a decision on a request from Marjorie Young, chamber of commerce civic beautification chairman, asking the city to buy new trash cans for downtown Dunsmuir.

Unanimous approval was given a request to support full recreational development concurrently with state water development projects, a proposal from Carmen Fleming, president of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland Association.

George Wendell, councilman, was named by Mayor Jones to serve as mayor pro-tem during Jones' absence from the city, March 20-30.

Mishap Takes Gazelle Man

YREKA — The body of Glenn Grant Maxwell, 58, Gazelle, was found about 10:30 Sunday morning in the barn on his ranch, the victim of his own gun.

Sheriff deputies assume that Maxwell, who had been going coyote hunting on the ranch, had apparently attempted to climb a ladder and fell, and the rifle discharged. His body was found lying beside a feed bin in the barn. The accident was thought to have occurred about 9:30 a.m.

His body was discovered by a friend, Leonard Halsey.

Glenn Grant Maxwell was born in Iowa on December 25, 1900, and he came to Gazelle in 1909. He had operated his own ranch since 1924.

He was a member of the Gazelle Horsemen, Siskiyou County and the Siskiyou County Cattle-men's Association.

He is survived by his wife, Edna, one daughter, Mrs. Virginia Njaa, both of Gazelle; one son, Donald Maxwell, Colton, California, and two grandchildren.

Funeral services for Mr. Maxwell will be held Wednesday, March 25, at 2 p.m. in Girder's Funeral Chapel in Yreka. The Rev. Harold Engdahl, pastor of the Mount Shasta-Gazelle Methodist Church, will officiate. Interment will be in the Gazelle Cemetery.
