The newly-formed committee to organize a civil defense plan in Klamath Target Area schools lacks one member.

The plan deals first with evacuation of children, then with emergency information service.

The committee's row will not be an easy one to hoe. It will have, among other tasks, to confer with school administrators to master-plan evacuation procedures, survey the county for communications devices such as mimeograph machines and loudspeakers, conduct a perpetual public education program, sketch out transportation needs and compile a list of available vehicles and drivers.
