Aide Requests State Backing Of Dam Work

DUNSMUIR — Development of Box Canyon Dam as a state project was advocated by W. A. Barr, second district supervisor of Siskiyou County, in a letter to the Business and Professional Women's Club.
Barr, originally scheduled to speak at the meeting, was unable to attend and expressed his views by letter. Barr said if a state agency built the dam it could be held at maximum level during the summer recreational use period and lowered in the winter for flood protection.
He described the dam as a 260 feet dam impounding about 45,000 acre feet of water and covering four to five acres. Permanent docking and launching facilities, plenty of campsites and summer home sites were described as possible under the state development.
He said the State Department of Water Resources is now requesting a budget revision to allow \$100,000 for a feasibility study of the project and cited that upstream development of water resources was now being included in state plans. "There is no upstream development on the Sacramento River," Barr said.
Barr felt any development of Box Canyon by the California Oregon Power Company would be impractical from the standpoint of high costs and insufficient water. He felt that any diversion of the Sacramento River to another watershed should be discouraged.
Dr. V. L. Palmer of Dunsmuir, flying enthusiast, was also on the program of the BPWC dinner meeting at the Travelers Hotel on Monday night. Palmer is advocating a boron tank equipped plane to be stationed at Moff Airport to provide fire protection for Southern Siskiyou County.
He outlined the setup as a protection for communities and countryside, state, federal and privately owned land and from either natural causes or full scale war. He said provisions for water and for a three-man crew would be partially the responsibility of the area and he is seeking support of various civic and service organizations.
Frank Melo showed colored slides of Mt. Eddy and described access to beauty spots, camping and fishing areas. He showed fish planting operations and told of three prospectors living on the mountain who rarely leave the area. Mrs. Nellie Masson also showed slides on places in the area worth visiting and available to the average motorist.
Table decorations featured native rocks and gems. Mrs. A. D. Hurd, Mrs. G. H. Dunlap and Mrs. Nellie Masson provided special centerpieces and Noel Grayley displayed rare ore rocks.
Richard Bastian played piano numbers as special entertainment and a tape recording was played of organ music played by Laura Melo.
Mrs. Marie Glover, program chairman for the evening, explained the evening was planned to give the employed women a special insight into available diversions in the vicinity of Dunsmuir. She also displayed a variety of wood fiber flowers on sale by the club as a Crippled Children benefit and announced her participation in a traffic survey to determine the uniformity of safety signals in Dunsmuir as compared with those in other areas.

Soil District Holds Meeting

NEW PINE CREEK — Eleven farmers and land owners were present at the Goose Lake Soil Conservation District meeting in the Willow Ranch School last week, which was conducted by Carroll Cloud, president of the group.
An announcement was made by Amy Cloud, secretary, that at the special meeting of the district earlier in the month, a working plan which would meet the requirements necessary to obtain war surplus equipment was drawn up. When this plan has been approved by the Modoc County Board of Supervisors, the equipment will be obtainable.
Ray Bishop, chairman, along with Carroll Cloud and Earl Brunner, comprise the war surplus equipment committee.
Ronald Echert of Davis Creek and Charlie Vincent were appointed by the president to the committee on water resources. Cloud also explained that the GLSC district includes the Willow Ranch and Davis Creek fire districts and the Willow Creek ranch out on the Devil's Garden.
Arnold Bullock, soil conservationist with the federal Soil Conservation District, was present and served as advisor to the group. He also announced that May 3 to May 10 would be the nation-wide Soil Stewardship week and he read the national president's report of a recent meeting of the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts.
The members decided that signers should attend the meetings to sign up and when doing so, designate his or her intentions as to just what sort of help was desired on the land, in order to avoid trouble on questions of priority on assistance use of equipment at any later date.

Bay Area Pair Arrested; Linked With Big Dope Ring

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A man and woman were arrested Wednesday night in connection with the indictment of 22 persons as alleged members of a 10 million dollar international narcotics ring.
The FBI identified the two as Azalea King, 22, of Oakland, and Lennit Semian, 37, of Los Angeles. Miss King, a stripper, was arrested in Salinas. Semian was picked up here while walking along a downtown street.
Other arrests were expected in New York, Los Angeles, Oakland and Texas.
Seventeen persons were named in federal grand jury indictments returned Feb. 18. These included Leroy Jefferson, 37, of Portland, described as one of the ring's top men.
Assistant U. S. Attorney Fred Watson said the arrests coming from Wednesday's indictment will close the best sources of the alleged Jefferson operation. He said heroin was supplied to the ring by a group of New Yorkers, headed by Nelson Hermdia, 35, whom he described as a close associate of important members of the Mafia.
He said cocaine was obtained by West Coast narcotics pushers from a Mexican mob headed by Rodolfo Arriola, 45, of Ciudad Acuna.
Narcotics agents said Wednesday's indictments resulted from admissions made by 14 persons in the earlier indictment.
Thirty nine alleged ring members have now been indicted. U.S. District Judge Louis E. Goodman has set bail for seven at \$50,000 each, and for others in amounts down to \$5,000.

nities over the nation similar to Klamath Falls.
In breaking down the four major areas of the council's activities, Birk said that police-safety projects could include integration of the Air Force personnel into community safety campaigns and the utilization of on-base safe driving schools to promote better driving habits among airmen and civilians.
The housing-commercial services committee could assist in finding homes for incoming Air Force personnel and set up a system of credit references for the Air Force men and their families.
Under recreation-welfare and religion, that committee could make the names of incoming personnel belonging to particular churches and fraternal organizations available to the churches, clubs and lodges. They could also sponsor many special activities such as hunting, fishing and golf participation and supervise the organization of mass activities such as baseball, basketball and similar mass interest events.
The prestige-public relations committee will sponsor orientation meetings for groups of airmen soon after they arrive at Kingsley Field. These orientation meetings would be used to acquaint the new Air Force personnel with the base-community resources and recreation, church and school facilities and would serve as a means of letting key civilians of Klamath Falls meet the new airmen and their families.
Birk stressed that integration of incoming airmen and officers into the community life must be accomplished as soon after their arrival in Klamath Falls as is practicable.
In closing, Birk stressed that the objective of the Base-Community Council will be all inclusive in the goal of integration of the Air Force personnel of Kingsley Field into the life and community of Klamath Falls and surrounding area.

The total proposed budget of \$71,295 with no increase in instruction exceeds the total proposed income of \$56,775.27. Any difference in the past years has been met with the use of Forest Service reserve funds but these funds will not be available this coming school year.
The proposed budget for 1959-1960 includes costs of administration which is \$600; certificated salaries and other salaries \$39,450; textbooks and other books \$300; other expenses of instruction \$3,000; auxiliary services \$20; operation of plant \$8,300; maintenance of plant \$1,000; fixed charges, including teachers' retirement, custodian retirement and special instructions \$3,325; transportation \$3,300; tuition \$11,000; food service, capital outlay and undistributed reserve \$500 and general reserve \$500.
The proposed income for 1959-1960 is state apportionment \$31,087; secured taxes \$21,432.15; unsecured taxes \$1,236.12; transportation \$2,000 and beginning balance \$1,000. This proposed income includes tax money from the Greenview district. The taxes above shown are at the current rate of 96 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.
During this school year the peak enrollment from kindergarten through the sixth grade has been 201 pupils. This represents an increase of 31 pupils over last year. With the addition of the Greenview first, second and third grades and expected enrollment for next year will be between 215 and 220 pupils.
In addition to regular subjects being taught, students have been offered a music program which includes vocal music for all grades, tonette for the fourth grade and instrumental music for the fifth and sixth grades. Also, the fifth and sixth grades have a special glee club which meets before school twice a week.
For the past two years a special reading program to help bring boys and girls up to reading level has been taught. These classes are handled by two teachers and are offered to pupils of grades four through six. The need is determined by a testing system and through teacher's observation.
The seventh and eighth grades are also financed by the elementary school district and have as a supplement to their regular program, industrial arts, home economics and a music program which includes chorus, band and music appreciation.
From September through January an average of 157 meals per day were served at the high school cafeteria with about a daily average of 45 meals being served to elementary boys and girls.
A total of 25,350 bus pupils were carried to and from school during the period from September through December. Of this number 11,920 were elementary (kindergarten through sixth grade), 7,372 were seventh and eighth graders. It costs a total of \$49.97 a day to operate the four buses.
The junior high costs are \$350 per pupil. The state gives the high school from the elementary apportionment \$159.57 per pupil. The difference of \$190.43 times 47.1 average daily attendance, making a total of \$9,063.51 tuition for this year.
The current costs of education, which is everything exclusive of tuition and capital outlay are \$277.76 per pupil. From the state \$159.57 per pupil is received and \$86 per pupil from taxes, totaling \$255.57.
Without even adding tuition or capital outlay the school is short on income. Last year the current costs of education were \$395.96 per pupil, \$159.44 coming from the state and \$113 from taxes. This added together, totals \$272.44. This shows a shortage of income for last year.
With more pupils, the costs per pupil this year have decreased but to maintain the present level of education the Etna Union Elementary School District will need to raise the taxes to \$1.50.
Prior to the election, John Berry, Etna Union Elementary School principal, announced that there will be several public meetings at the high school to discuss and to answer any questions the public may have concerning the proposed increase in taxes.

Wool Growers Get Reminder

YREKA — John N. Foster of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office last week notified all Siskiyou County wool producers planning to receive government incentive payments that they should be certain sales documents they receive for wool contain all information necessary under the program.
Foster stressed the importance of sales documents showing the true net sales proceeds, including freight and other marketing charges that have been deducted.
According to Foster, the county ASC office may adjust sales proceeds where charges are not shown, and where false information is filed, and to proceed with legal steps against both the producer and the purchaser of the wool.
Eligible for payments from the 1958 market are wool and unshorn lambs marketed not later than March 31, while later marketings will be eligible for payments under the 1959 program.
Foster stated that applications for 1958 payment must be filed in the county office no later than April 30.
Foster added that payment rates and payments made to producers will be announced this summer when the average price received for shorn wool has been compiled.
