Today is Easter Sunday.  
What do we do on Easter?  
We do many things.

We color eggs, and hide them for the children to find.  
We buy new clothes. Having bought new clothes, we want to show them off. Hence the Easter Parade—of which the Fifth Avenue parade in New York is the best known in our country.  
All too often, we eat too much. We go to church.

Why do we do these things?  
It's a long story—for Easter goes far back into human history. The venerable Bede, generally accepted as the earliest Anglo-Saxon historian and scholar (at least he was among the first to write it down) says Easter originated in a heathen festival held at the vernal equinox in honor of the Teutonic goddess of dawn. Her name, Bede tells us, was Eostre.  
Hence, by derivation, our word Easter.

Why do we color eggs?  
That, too, is an old one. It comes down to us from Egypt and Persia. Eggs are a sign of new life—and new life tends to begin in the spring.  
Why the colored eggs? Egyptian and Persian legend has it that colored eggs were laid by the Easter rabbit on Easter eve. Rabbits too are very old. They go as far back into history as legend goes.

Why the new clothes?  
In the spring, the earth dresses itself in a new cloak of greenery. So, at Easter, people also dress up. When people dress up, they want to show off their new clothes.

How about over-eating on Easter?  
The origin of that is equally simple. As far back into history as we can reach, festivals have tended to be preceded by fasts. Why? Your guess is as good as anybody's. Possibly it was because one enjoys a feast more when one is hungry. So (maybe) people fasted before feasting so that the feast would be more enjoyable.

So much for the dim past. We come now to the final question:  
Why do we go to church on Easter?

We go to church on Easter because Easter is the Christian festival that honors the resurrection of Jesus. The Christian religion changed the world as no other religion ever changed it.  
The TEACHING of Jesus changed the world as no other TEACHING ever changed it.  
Jesus came into a world in which for countless centuries TOO MUCH POWER HAD BEEN HELD IN TOO FEW HANDS. His teaching was a flaming protest against too much power held in too few hands too long. His crucifixion was encompassed by those who held too much power in too few hands and proposed to KEEP it there—at any cost.  
His resurrection symbolized the TRIUMPH of his teaching—upon which the progress of the modern world has been founded.

In conclusion:  
Whenever in the modern world human progress has faltered it has been because of too much power held in too few hands too long, and the resulting abuses thereof.

Whenever—as in Martin Luther's case and in the case of our American colonies—someone has arisen to challenge successfully the holding of too much power in too few hands too long, human progress has been resumed.

## U.S. Suggests Berlin Access Control Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States was reported Saturday willing to let East German Communist temporarily control access to West Berlin—but only as agents of Russia.

The Western Allies will discuss this possibility here this week at the North Atlantic Council.

Informed sources said such an interim agreement would be intended to ease tensions while the Western powers and Russia negotiated on a long-range settlement of the broader matters of German reunification, a peace treaty and European security.

But these sources said the Soviets would have to acknowledge the East Germans as their agents, instead of just turning over such authority to them unilaterally and without qualification.

An agent, in the broadest legal sense, is any person acting for another by his authority.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles indicated last Nov. 28 in a news conference that the United States had tempered its refusal to recognize East German authority in Berlin. He said this country "might" permit the East German government to act as a Soviet agent in administering Western communications to Berlin.

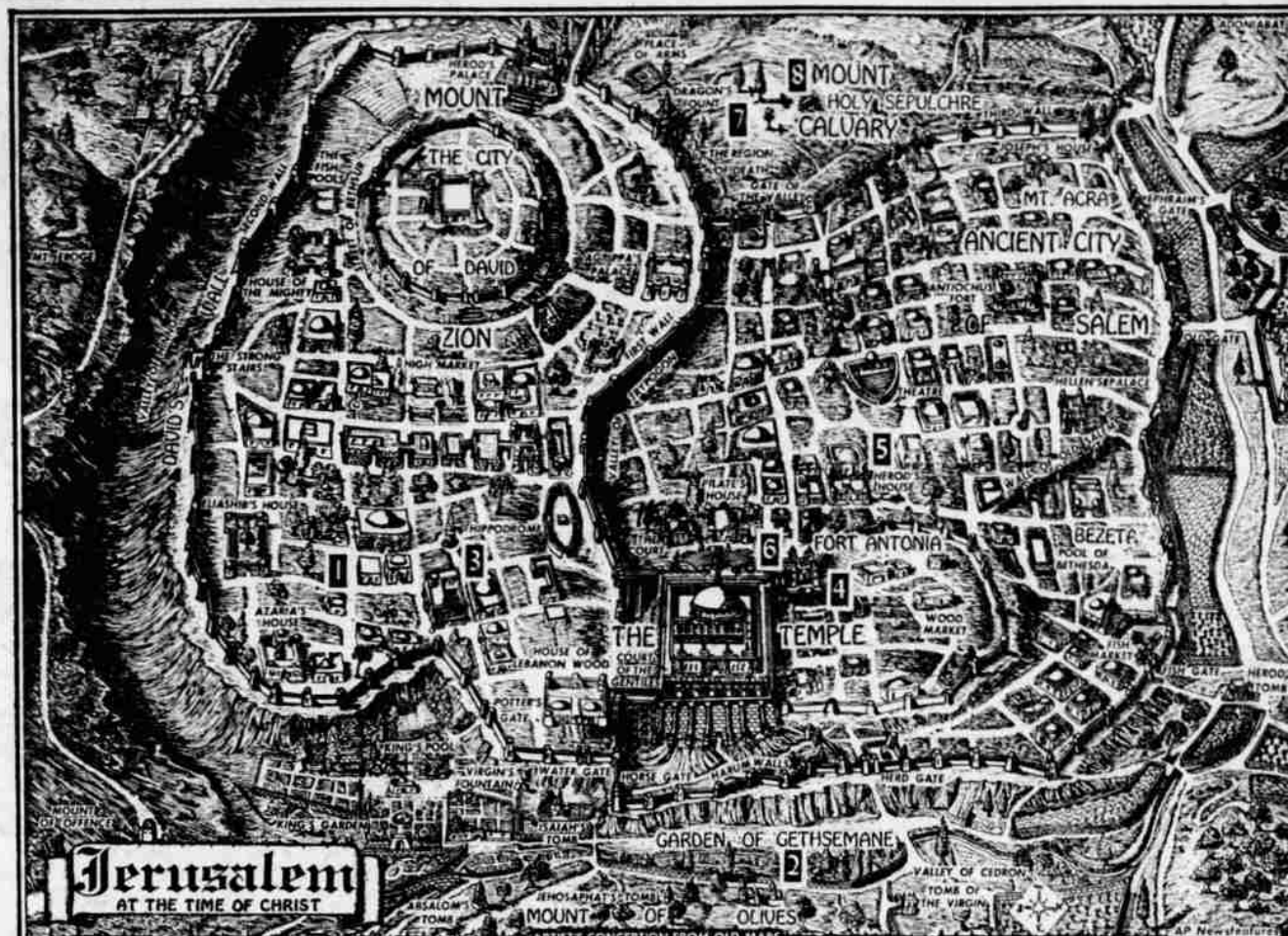

## Easter Week Ceremonies Near Climax

JERUSALEM, Jordan Sector (AP)—Easter Week ceremonies Saturday approached a joyous climax with solemn Holy Saturday rites in the Basilica of the Holy Sepulchre at the altar near the scene of Christ's burial and resurrection.

Hundreds of pilgrims and tourists crowded the church within the old walled City of Jerusalem shortly after dawn broke on a clear bright day.

Outside, warm spring sunlight flooded the basilica courtyard as Christians of many creeds from all corners of the globe prepared to celebrate the anniversary of Christ's resurrection.

The Roman Catholic Patriarch of Jerusalem, the Most Rev. Alberto Gori, entered the church at 6:30 a.m. to preside at the rites of the blessing of the fire—symbolic of Christ as the Light of the World—at the Stone of Anointment where Christ's body is said to have been anointed after His death on Calvary.

The patriarch then proceeded to the Altar at the Sepulchre, where he offered pontifical high mass. The basilica was jammed until late Friday night, when the patriarch conducted the traditional "burial" service in the series of chapels within the church marking the final stations of the cross.

At the ornate Byzantine Altar of the Crucifixion, which marks the traditional spot of Calvary, the figure of the crucified Christ was taken from the cross. While the choir, priests, and altar boys sang hymns, priests lifted the crown of thorns and withdrew the three nails.

A priest raised the crown and each nail aloft for the congregation to see, then kissed each nail.

The patriarch then proceeded to the Altar at the Sepulchre, where he offered pontifical high mass. The basilica was jammed until late Friday night, when the patriarch conducted the traditional "burial" service in the series of chapels within the church marking the final stations of the cross.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (UPI) — The 59ers, a group of pioneers from Michigan who plan to homestead Alaska's Kenai Peninsula, ended their troublesome 4,600 mile trek late Friday when they arrived here amid the cheers of a 3,000-member welcoming committee.

The 59ers, who had been on the road several weeks, had the advantage of modern highways, but they had more problems with their antique trucks than their ancestors had with the Indians.

A 1934 model vehicle broke down in Canada last week and delayed the caravan's arrival here several days. Before that they suffered a breakdown in Montana to go along with a couple others in the Midwest.

But when they finally hit this city, 50 miles from Kenai, they got a welcome that would have made grandma forget Geronimo.

The welcoming committee included chamber of commerce, city, military and business leaders, plain citizens and a handful of Eskimos. Besides that, the sun was shining and for the second time this year the temperature was above the freezing level.

A huge red carpet was laid out, on which the 37 pioneers were escorted to the lawn in front of the city hall. Then Mayor Hewitt Lounsbury gave the official welcome to what he called "our new friends from Michigan."

John Anderson, manager of the Alaska Railroad, gave a brief address and told the pioneers he was here when the Matanuska Valley colonists arrived 24 years ago.

"We're sure you'll be able to overcome the problems which will beset you," he said. "The Matanuska Valley group proved it can be done."

The 59ers themselves had little to say over the reception but seemed to be quite moved.

## Clear Skies In Prospect For Easter

Clear skies, flavored with considerable sunshine, dominated the nation's weather Saturday in the wake of a springtime storm that plastered the Northeast with winterlike fury.

Only some scattered light rain-fall and patches of cloudiness scarred the clear weather pattern—a good sign for Sunday's Easter parade.

A storm front, which deposited a snow carpet from 1 to 9 inches from the fringes of the Great Lakes through New York State into New England, moved Friday into the Atlantic Ocean.

Heaviest snowfall, generally ranging from 6 to 8 inches, caused at least 7 deaths Friday in New York State. Geneva, N.Y., caught 9 inches. Buffalo had a 5-inch spread while Syracuse reported 2 inches. Boonville saw a 6-inch drop boost the cover there to 47 inches. Albany had 3 inches.

Six persons were killed in traffic accidents as the slushy snow caked to make hazardous driving. Soggy snowfall up to 5 inches smacked southern New England. At Haverhill, Mass., 11 cars of a Boston and Maine freight train jumped the tracks in an accident blamed by officials on the snow and sleet storm. There were no injuries. Farther south, Nantucket, a Massachusetts island community, was doused by about a third of an inch of rain.

# China Claims Tibet Rebels Under Control

TOKYO (AP) — Red China claimed Saturday it has smashed an uprising in Tibet and installed the Panchen Lama—a pro-Communist rival of the rebellious Dalai Lama—as head of a new regime.

An order by Premier Chou En-lai abolished the Tibetan government nominally headed by the Dalai Lama. Peiping said the Dalai Lama "under duress by the rebels" tore up the treaty he signed in 1951 with Red China.

A broadcast by Peiping said the 23-year-old Dalai Lama had been abducted by rebels who rose against the Red Chinese overlords last week.

Peiping charged the rebels had been armed by supplies air-dropped by the Chinese Nationalists. The supplies included radio equipment.

The rebels attacked Lhasa on March 19 and were defeated in two days of battle, Peiping said. It listed rebel casualties at 4,900. The Red Chinese troops seized 3,000 small arms, 81 machineguns, 27 mortars, 6 mountain guns and huge amounts of ammunition, the broadcast said.

Peiping carefully refrained from assailing the Dalai Lama, the living Buddha of Tibetans and the most popular man in the land of the Lamas.

The revolt was blamed on the "Tibetan local government and an upper strata reactionary clique" backed by imperialists.

Chou said the 23-year-old Panchen Lama will be chairman of a committee set up for what he called the Tibet Autonomous region. Committees in so-called self-governing regions of Red China take orders from Peiping.

But the broadcast made it clear that the Chinese Red military will be in charge. Peiping said a military control committee was set up in Lhasa Monday and other cities and areas had been placed under firm control of the Red army.

The Dalai Lama presumably is with the rugged Kampa tribesmen who have been in revolt against the Chinese Reds for three years.

Peiping radio in announcing the shakeup acknowledged for the first time the Tibetans had rebelled against their Red masters.

Chou's order emphasized that while the Dalai Lama is under "duress by the rebels" the Panchen Lama will act as "chairman of the preparatory committee for the Tibet Autonomous Region."

The elevation of the Panchen Lama to head a new regime had been expected. The Panchen Lama long ago threw in with the Chinese Communists.

When the Dalai Lama proved hard to handle after the Chinese Red invasion of 1950, there was much speculation that the Panchen Lama was being groomed by Peiping to take over in Tibet.

The Panchen Lama by tradition is the spiritual equal of the Dalai Lama. But he never has had political power.

The Panchen Lama and the Dalai Lama are supposed to be the incarnations of two great disciples of the 13th century holy man of Tibet, Tsong Ka Pa.

The Peiping broadcast indicated that the revolt was still in full swing.

The rebellion broke out nine days ago, Pei said, with a general uprising in Lhasa against the Communist forces occupying the Tibetan capital on the roof of the world.

Peiping Radio said the Tibetan local army "launched a general offensive against the people's liberation army garrison in Lhasa."

HALSEY, Ore. — Braced by new clues, armed police searched throughout the night for a dangerous gunman in this Willamette Valley area.

"We found some evidence to indicate the man still may be hiding in this area," said Sheriff George Miller.

Miller said milk and other food stolen Friday from a nearby farm gave fresh impetus to the search for Richard Allan Hunt, 27.

Hunt, a dairy worker, is accused of abducting one police chief briefly at nearby Harrisburg, and shooting another at Brownsville.

Police also set up road blocks early Saturday in the Junction City area just south of here where a pickup truck and clothes were reported stolen.

E. J. Robertson, Lane County's chief deputy, said the theft was made at the home of a long-time friend of Hunt.

Miller said bloodhounds owned by Ed Strieby of Lakeview will try to pick up a trail at the farm-house.

The hounds also may be used, Miller said, to follow down two other leads.

Those fresh clues came Friday night as a band of 25 state policemen and deputies conducted a house-to-house search in an area five miles west of here.

State police said they were operating on the theory Hunt never got away from this area after Tuesday abduction and shooting.

In the Friday night hunt, police came across two areas on the banks of the Willamette River where they said it appeared a man had slept and camped.

In addition, police reported finding a suitcase and clothing that might have belonged to Hunt.

More than 100 men searched hills near Brownsville after Ernest McPhee was abducted and Robert Kemnow shot.

That search was called off after a motorist reported he was taken prisoner at gunpoint and forced to drive a man to Portland.

State police said Friday, however, that they believed Hunt was still in this area, and they resumed the manhunt.

Police here also said they doubted if Hunt was the man sought by police in Northern California after an officer Friday was knocked down by a burglar who

escaped on foot, leaving behind a possible stolen car.

The latest search scene here is not far from where Hunt, an ex-convict from Montana, worked on a dairy farm.

"Everybody's pretty jittery around here," Sheriff Miller said. "Every time they hear a twig snap they call us."

Chief McPhee, who tried to arrest Hunt for a license plate violation, was unhurt in the ordeal. Chief Kemnow, who suffered a head wound, was reported improving.

PORTLAND — Two big Carpenters Union locals appeared ready Saturday to avert a construction strike in Oregon and Southwest Washington.

There was no indication, though, whether the key Portland local would follow suit.

Ivor Jones, secretary of the Oregon Carpenters Council, Friday said "the trend of balloting at upstate union meetings appears to be predominantly in favor of accepting the agreement."

And at Longview, Wash., Emil Schlecht, said the Southwest Washington Council of which he is secretary appeared to be following suit.

"I doubt two per cent of the carpenters will vote against it," he said Friday.

Oregon votes will be announced Tuesday in Salem.

There still was no indication, however, whether the big Portland local, which embraces only this area, would follow through on an announcement to strike April 1.

The Portland local rejected terms of a new contract offered by management representatives.

A strike by the Carpenters would shut down construction valued at an estimated \$14 billion dollars.

One segment of the Carpenters Union already has gone out on strike.

That walkout was begun Thursday by the Pile Drivers Union, which recognizes the Carpenters as its parent body.

About 600 Portland local Pile Drivers walked off the job, shutting down construction projects at the John Day Dam and the Interstate Bridge between here and Vancouver, Wash.

Sources here estimated that, in all, about 2,000 men were idled.
